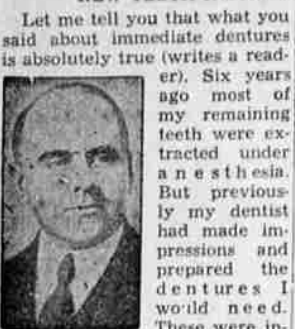

NEW TEETH INSTALLED WITHOUT WAITING

Let me tell you that what you said about immediate dentures is absolutely true (writes a reader). Six years ago most of my remaining teeth were extracted under a general anesthetic. But previously my dentist had made impressions and prepared the dentures I would need. These were installed in my mouth when I awoke—the nurse brought a mirror and when I looked I was disappointed, for I thought they had not extracted any teeth after all. I wore the new plates home that same day, and they fitted so well that I could not remove them for cleansing until three days later when I visited the dentist and he showed me how I have never had any trouble or even enough discomfort to prevent me from wearing the dentures constantly ever since. And my digestion and health were never so good as during these past five years. So I know you are right about immediate denture service, if that's what this is called, for I was there! Don't let any old fogey dentists anywhere cramp your style.

Immediate denture service is the name dentists give such service—preparation of the denture in advance, so that it will be a perfect replica of the patient's original teeth, gums, etc., an installation of the denture immediately after extraction of tooth or teeth, before the patient leaves the office.

Denture means a set of artificial teeth from a partial denture (two or more teeth) to a full denture (all the teeth in upper or lower jaw).

The immediate denture is not

always so nearly ideal as the reader's proved. In most cases some further care and adjustments or even remodelling are required, but in a good many instances patients can and do wear their new teeth without serious discomfort from the hour after extraction. Wearing plates immediately controls the healing process and favors formation of normal or natural gum or other supports for the plates or dentures. Wearing the new teeth constantly, instead of imposing disuse upon the mouth, teeth, gums, jaws, mucous membrane, glands, muscles, face, tongue for weeks or months, favors maintenance of good digestion (salivary digestion occurs not only in the mouth but continues in the healthy person, for half an hour or more after starch food has entered the stomach), good nutrition, vitality, efficiency and good looks, if any.

Weak Ankles

My sister has very weak ankles. Can you suggest anything to strengthen them? (Miss C.)

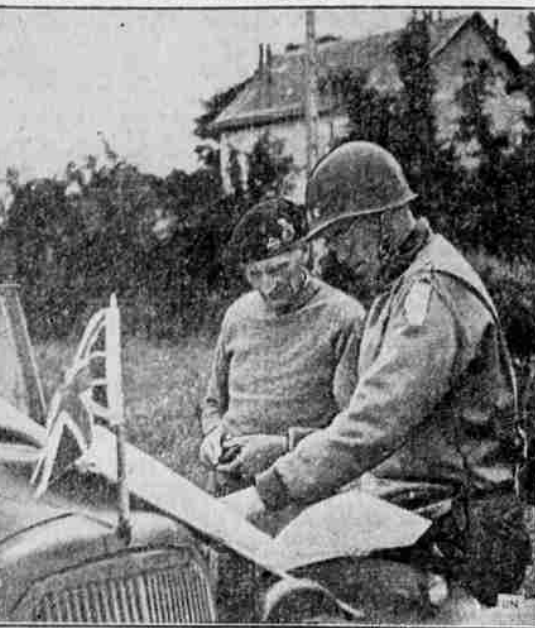
Answer—Usually that means pronated feet, potentially or functional flatfoot. Commonly occurs in growing boys and girls whose intake of vitamin D and calcium is deficient. Insomnia Versus Dope
If you can help me to sleep it will be a miracle. Haven't slept more than four or five hours a week without taking sleeping medicine for several years. (L. B. J.)

Answer—Even allowing for the customary exaggeration I suggest that remaining awake for several hours when you think you should be sleeping is much less harmful to health, much less dangerous to life, than taking sleeping medicine. The popular conception of insomnia is far too morbid and frightful. On request I'm glad to mail pamphlet "How to Sleep Well"—if you provide a stamped envelope bearing your address. But it does not suggest any sleeping medicine or any drug to substitute for sleeping medicine. You're headed in the wrong direction about that.

Vatican Employees May Get Pay Hike

Vatican City, July 6.—(U.P.)—

Cardinals forming the administrative board of the Holy See will meet within the next few days to consider raises in salary for all Vatican employees, both cleric and lay.

Since the start of the war the Vatican has raised salaries three times, but the increases still are not considered sufficient to meet present costs of living. Cardinals now receive a salary of 7,000 lire, or \$70 a month.

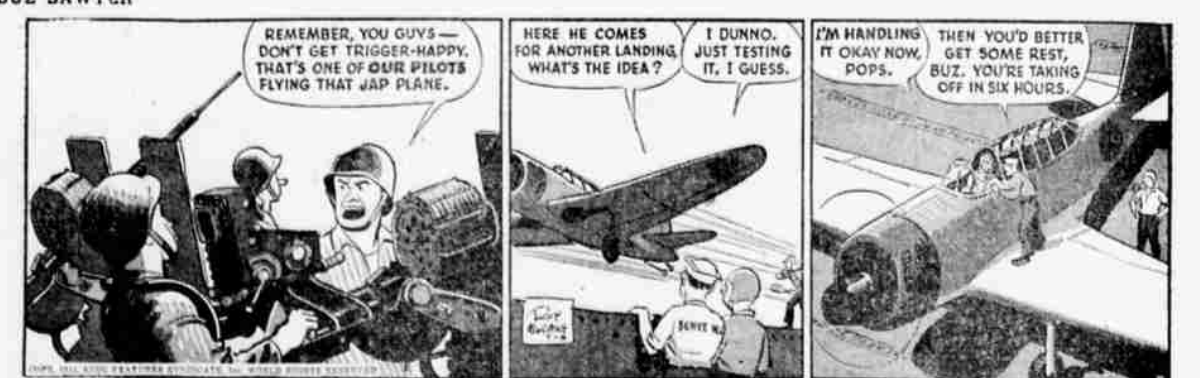
