Hopkins Returns to White House Office

Washington, July 7—(U.P.)—Harry L. Hopkins, for years ranking adviser to President Roosevelt, returned to his White House office today after a six months illness.
Hopkins, who had been recuperating at an army hospital at White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., resumed his duties as special assistant to the president, chairman of the munitions assignment board, and member of the war mobilization committee.

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GAS TO WORKERS GIVEN ONLY WHEN USES CERTIFIES

All workers who seek gasoline for a change of residence to another county or state will now be required to give a certification from the United States Employment Service or the Emergency Farm Labor office, which in Medford is located in the Chamber of Commerce building, when they apply at the local war price and ration board for the gasoline. Previously only migratory farm workers were required to obtain the certificates but a new provision of the OPA provides that all workers do so, farm workers at the Emergency Farm Labor office and others at the Employment Service office.

Large amounts of gasoline are being drained from local supplies for changes of residence, according to Edmond Eggen, OPA district mileage rationing representative, making the new plan necessary.

Since boards will require the new forms before a gasoline application for change of residence will be considered, all plant employment offices are being requested to pass this information on to employees planning to leave the county or state, Eggen said. In addition, the applicant must satisfy the board that a bona fide change of residence is being made. No ration will be issued for travel merely to seek employment elsewhere, he emphasized.

Truckers' Dispute Going to Roosevelt

Washington, July 7—(U.P.)—The War Labor Board today voted unanimously to send to the White House a wage dispute involving 103 mid-western trucking companies and 20,000 employees.
The operators, members of the Midwest Operators' association, had refused to comply with a WLB directive ordering a seven-cent-an-hour wage boost for over-the-road truck drivers. Nine other operators involved in the dispute agreed at a show cause hearing at WLB headquarters to comply with the order.
