DOERR ENJOYING  
BEST SEASON AS  
BOSTON'S SPARK

Second Sacker Has Perfect Day In Sox Win Over Tigers; Yanks Cop Again.

New York, July 7.—(U.P.)—Robert Pershing Doerr, the silent second sacker for the Boston Red Sox, who leaves it to the record books to sing his praises was getting eloquent statistical support today as the American league's top flight candidate for "most valuable player award."

"The California 'clam,' whose main distinction for years was that he was even less loquacious as a second baseman than Charley Gehringer of Detroit, quietly is monopolizing the league's batting honors to go with the fielding laurels he usually captures."

Long noted for his prowess at field, Doerr has come up as a hitter this season and currently is challenging Thurman Tucker of Chicago for the batting lead in the American league with a .339 record, only seven points off the pace. In addition he is second in runs batted in with 44, first in hits with 95, first in runs with 55 and second in doubles with 22. He has hit eight homers to rank next to four players tied for the league lead with nine each and is tied for third in triples with five.

Doerr's present average is .69 points better than his final figure of 1943 and 52 points over his seven-year major league figure of .287. He boosted his batting mark nine points yesterday by getting four hits for a perfect day in Boston's 13 to 3 victory over Detroit.

Good pitching prevailed elsewhere in the American league with Hank Borowy of the Yankees, Bob Muncie of the leading Browns and Mickey Haefner of Washington all turning in four hit shutouts.

Borowy kept lead over the Philadelphia Athletics enabled the Browns to maintain a two and a half game margin over the Red Sox.

Borowy turned in his 11th victory, 4 to 0, over Cleveland, yielding only two scratch hits until the ninth.

Haefner pitched his best game of the season in beating the White Sox 5 to 0.

The Cincinnati Reds were guilty of a waste of batting punch with their ace, Bucky Walters, pitching his 14th victory. This made 13 hits off the doddering Brooklyn Dodgers in a 10 to 4 victory. It was Brooklyn's 10th straight defeat.

Bill Voiselle, New York Giants' top moundsman, ended the St. Louis Cardinals' winning streak at seven, holding the league leaders to eight scattered hits in gaining his 11th victory, 10 to 1.

The Pittsburgh Pirates made all their runs in the sixth inning to defeat the Philadelphia Phillies 6 to 5.

The Chicago Cubs moved out of eighth place again, pushing in the Boston Braves by beating them 11 to 2, making 15 hits off three pitchers.

Chicago, July 7.—(U.P.)—Mack Stewart, 31-year-old right-hander who won 18 games last year, has been purchased from the Nashville, Tenn., club by the Chicago Cubs. Dale Alderson, who came up from Nashville last year, will return to that club on option.

PAAVO KATONEN  
DEFEATS WAGNER  
IN 2-FALL BOUT

Paavo Katonen, employing some of "Gorgeous George" Wagner's own punching tactics, whipped the glamour boy in two straight falls in the main event of the weekly grapple program at the armory last night, while Jack Lipscomb defeated Buck Davidson in the middle bout and Herb Parks drew with Billy McKuin in the opener.

Wagner did all right against the Pacific coast light-heavyweight champion until he started swinging punches and winding Katonen's arms around the ropes. This was too much for the Finnish southpaw to take and it didn't take him long to "liquidate" Wagner once he got started.

Katonen got his initial fall after swatting Wagner on the kisser several times with left-handed shots, giving him a couple of reverse flips and pressing his shoulders to the deck. Much of this action occurred while Referee Earl Yoakley was re-connecting the top strand of the ring rope, which broke as the two wrestlers were tugging and hugging.

Seven minutes later Katonen wound up the match. Again, he belted Wagner on the chin with left hand punches, then slapped on a reverse chin-lock and poured on the pressure until Georgie Davidson in a torrid, rough contest in which both slugged, pulled hair, choked, gouged eyes and committed other mild forms of mat mayhem. The winner took two straight falls, in the second and third rounds, and both were obtained with his famous self-strangle, which he augmented with blows at Davidson's Adam's apple.

McKuin took the first fall in his match with Parks, employing a chin lock and reverse toe hold for the tumble in the second round, but the latter, Canadian light-heavyweight champion, evened the match in the third heat with a swing and body press.

COLISEUM GRID  
DATES MIXED UP

Los Angeles, July 7.—(U.P.)—A thundering row over football dates at the Coliseum was in the mill today as the sixth district agricultural commission said it intended to use the saucer on four days already assigned to major games.

Settlement of the conflict posed a problem. The 101,000 seat arena has been without management since Feb. 29 when the joint ownership contract of the city, county supervisors and state body expired.

Only last week, Arnold Eddy, graduate manager of the University of Southern California fired a blunderbuss application for a legal contract covering dates, but nobody appeared to have any authority.

## MANDERS SIGNS

New York, July 7.—(U.P.)—Clarence (Pug) Manders, Brooklyn Tigers' fullback, today signed his 1944 contract and will report to the National league football team's summer training camp on August 6, officials of the club announced today.

Manders was the league's top ground gainer in 1941 and has made the second all-league team twice. He has been with Brooklyn three seasons.

Big-Time Stars Will Return  
From Service In Good Shape

Hillsdale, N. J., July 7.—(U.P.)—Chief Specialist Freddie "Red" Cochrane of the navy, world welterweight champion, braced his elbows on the bar and said, "If the war ends within a reasonable time, the big-name sports guys who went into service will be able to resume operations in big-time fashion when peace comes, because most of them are keeping in shape."

Cochrane is one of the big-name athletes who has kept in perfect condition despite the vicissitudes of Mars that shuttled him all over the south Pacific through lively combats with the Japanese.

The red-headed, square-jawed Irish lad who never drinks anything stronger than "sody water" leaned his elbows on the bar of his own cocktail lounge—midway between the Jersey cities of Elizabeth and Newark—as he chatted. At 29, he looked surprisingly fit—hard and dynamic.

"I'm in pretty good shape," he admitted with a shy grin. "I weigh only 148 pounds. That's just two more than when I entered the navy. Life in the service keeps a fellow in condition. Of course, I'm not sharp. I'll need three or four tune-up bouts, after war—to sharpen up—before I defend the title. Then I'll defend against anybody—against the best fighter who can draw the most money."

It was surprising to hear Red Cochrane talking about money—the medium of exchange that apparently never interested him when he was brand new champion of the world—when he won the title from Fritz Zivie at Newark on July 29, 1941, when he took himself and his valuable crown into the navy less than a week later.

Never in modern ring history did a champion in any division make less with a coveted diadem than this lion-eyed lad who got "peanuts" for winning the 147-pound crown and who garnered less than a total of \$15,000 for non-title bouts with Lew Jenkins and Fritz Zivie and charity brawls with Garvey Young and Bobby Britton while in service.

PEP AND JOYCE  
CLASH TONIGHT

Chicago, July 7.—(U.P.)—Jack Kearns, the megaphone-voiced master of ballyhoo, gives Chicago "the willies" tonight when Willie Pep, world's featherweight champion, battles Willie Joyce, Gary, Ind., negro lightweight, in an outdoor show at Comiskey Park.

Kearns, former manager of Jack Dempsey and Mickey Walker, expects a gate of \$60,000 for the 10-round non-title bout, which shapes up as a natural because of the recent impressive victories scored by both Pep and Joyce in Chicago.

Pep, who will spot his opponent about five pounds, was a 5-5 favorite, although ringside betting was even because of Joyce's upset triumph over P. J. Armstrong here June 2. Pep, one of the classic boxers, the current crop, won local fans last May by his handy defeat of Frankie Rubino.

RAINIER DEFEAT  
PORTLAND AGAIN;  
OAKS REGAIN TOP

The Pacific Coast league teeter-totter flipped the other way today, sending the Oakland A's back to the top on a 7-3 win over San Francisco, and leaving the Seals tied for second with Seattle, a half game behind the A's.

The Rainiers walloped Portland, 8-1, to move into the runner-up deadlock, while San Diego stayed one game behind Oakland in fourth by shading Sacramento, 3-2, in 12 innings. Hollywood evened its "civil war" series with Los Angeles, winning 3-2.

Only the last-place Sacramento, now 5½ games off the pace, have failed to head the league at least once. Oakland jumped into the lead again by slamming Seal hurler Bill Werle for 14 hits, combined with three San Francisco errors for seven runs, while Cotton Phippen was limiting the Seals to a trio of tallies. Jake Caulfield's double for Oakland was the only extra-base hit of the night. It was the third win in four series starts for the A's.

Seattle's Rainiers hit three Portland twirlers almost at will to win 8-1 and take a 3-1 series edge. Carl Fischer pitched six hit ball for the winners. Roy Johnson and Al Libke both batted two for three to lead the Rainier attack. Score:
