

3,000 PLANES IN DOUBLE SWEEP ON GERMAN TARGETS

Destructive Bomb Loads Are Dropped on Munich, Leipzig, Other Key Cities.

London, July 20.—(U.P.)—Two great American fleets totaling some 3,000 planes smashed at a dozen Nazi war plants and air-dromes today in a two-way onslaught from Italy and Britain which scattered destructive bomb loads through Munich, Leipzig, Friedrichshafen and other cities.

More than 1,200 Fortresses and Liberators of the Eighth Air Force with a formidable fighter escort swept from Britain deep into central Germany to hit at least eight prime targets, while the 15th Air Force heavyweights hopped over the Alps from Italy and plastered five or more objectives around Munich and Friedrichshafen.

Key Centers Hit
The pincers assault from west and south covered key centers in most of central, western and southern Germany.

The Eighth Air Force bombers and fighters flew over scattered cloud formations and found good hunting among aircraft, ball bearing and synthetic oil plants strung through Germany from the Rhineland to Leipzig, 90 miles south of Berlin.

In some quarters they ran into stiff German resistance. It was the most stubborn over the Junkers engine factory at Dessau, where more than 100 Messerschmitts rose to challenge the raiders during their bomb runs.

Mustang fighters tore into the German formation, and one of the biggest dogfights in weeks broke out. Outnumbered about two to one, the Mustangs broke up the attack on the bombers, and one pilot said he saw six enemy fighters go down under the first Mustang sweep.

Italy Unit Luckier
The bombers from Italy with their Lightning and Mustang escort found relatively weak fighter opposition. The Liberators bombed three objectives in the Friedrichshafen area and Fortresses hit two air fields south of Munich.

It was the third straight day that the 15th Air Force bombers were in action over southern Germany.

Wall Street

New York, July 20.—(U.P.)—Stocks turned irregular today after the announcement of the attempt to assassinate Adolf Hitler.

The market opened on a firmer note and scored substantial early gains under the leadership of Rails before meeting profit-taking that eliminated the rise in many instances and scaled gains sharply in most others.

Wall Street experts viewed the early rise, in the face of normally bearish news such as the formation of a new cabinet in Japan, as a direct reflection of the "good feeling" resulting from lessened nervous tension.

Late in the session steel shares were slightly lower while in the rails small gains were pared in almost every case. Pere Marquette Preferred showed a loss of more than a point.

Chemicals were irregular. Motors had small losses.

FRESH PLUM JAM IS EASY TO MAKE

This Delicious Recipe Saves Sugar and Fruit

(Using Sour Clingstone Plums)

6 Cups Crushed Plums

8 1/2 Cups Sugar

1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash and pit 3 1/2 pounds fully ripe plums. Do not peel. Cut into small pieces and crush thoroughly. Add 1/2 cup water and simmer, covered, for 5 minutes. Measure exactly 6 level cups of the crushed plums (add water to fill last cup, if necessary) into a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin, stir well and bring to a boil, stirring constantly.

NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), mix well and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.

(Using Sweet or Freestone Prunes)

4 1/2 Cups Crushed Plums

7 Cups Sugar

1/2 Cup Lemon Juice

1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Sour clingstone plums make the best jam. If sweet or freestone prunes are used, be sure to use the recipe given directly above, following the same method of handling as for sour plums.

45,000 ACRES AT CAMP ADAIR WILL BE PUT ON SALE

Training Grounds to Be Disposed of; Camp Abbott to Be Abandoned, Word.

Portland, Ore., July 20.—(U.P.)—Confirming unofficial reports that the Polk county portions of

Camp Adair would be sold back to private persons, both the U. S. department of agriculture and the Washington, D. C., office of the Portland Chamber of Commerce have announced that the government will dispose of 45,000 acres of Camp Adair.

Although it was indicated that the Reconstruction Finance Corporation would be in charge of the re-conversion of the training grounds, William Kennedy, regional manager for the Surplus War Property Administration and manager of the RFC's Portland loan agency, has not received official word from the government regarding any sale of the property.

O'Byrne in Charge
The Washington office of the SWPA announced that Col. M.

J. O'Byrne, formerly director of the real estate division of the SWPA, would be in charge of the undertaking but he has not yet arrived at the Portland RFC office.

The Surplus War Property Administration has announced that in cases where original owners are seeking to repurchase land, they will be given preference and that agricultural land will be disposed of in family sized farms.

No other directions for disposal of the agricultural and timber land has been received and Kennedy advises that they may either advertise for public bids, hold a public auction or negotiate sales to a specified contractor.

The property being disposed

of originally was intended for maneuver space which is no longer needed for military training, army officials advised. Approximately 11,000 acres on which buildings are located will be retained under government supervision.

Camp Abbott on the Deschutes river also is being abandoned following unsuccessful efforts to retain the camp as post-academy training ground for engineers or for hospital purposes.

SILVER USE TO EXPAND
Washington, July 20.—(U.P.)—The war production board estimated today that use of silver will increase 10 per cent this year, but domestic production and foreign imports will be lower than in 1943.
