YANKEES SQUARE SERIES WITH 6-5 WIN OVER BROWNS

New York, July 20.—(U.P.)—The New York Yankees, thanks to a three run homer by Johnny Lindell, squared accounts with the St. Louis Browns in their big series for the American league lead today, but neither team got an atom of support from St. Louis Cardinal Manager Billy Southworth, who still is not convinced that his boys will win the pennant in their own circuit.

While the Yankees were whitening the St. Louis lead to two games with a 6 to 5 victory last night, Southworth was as fretful as ever over his Cardinals, now a fat 12½ games in front in the National league.

Shrugging a discussion of possible world series opposition for fear of putting a "whammy" on the Cardinals, Southworth said "it is downright foolish to talk about such things with matters as uncertain as they are in baseball, particularly in a wartime season like this."

Victories by the Detroit Tigers and the Cleveland Indians produced a three way tie with Washington for fourth place in the American league.

The Tigers, winning their fifth game in seven starts, defeated Washington 2 to 1 in 10 innings.

Cleveland went after Louis (Bobo) Newsom for 12 hits to defeat the Philadelphia Athletics 7 to 1. Ed Klieman gaining his seventh victory.

The Chicago White Sox won their first game of the year from the Boston Red Sox, 5 to 4 after 11 previous failures.

The Brooklyn Dodgers snapped back from their 15 game losing streak to knock out Bucky Walters, the National league's best pitcher, in beating Cincinnati 10 to 5.

The Boston Braves defeated the Chicago Cubs 6 to 1 on Nate Andrews' seven hit pitching, which brought him his 10th victory.

Ken Raffensberger of the Philadelphia Phillies struck out seven batters in a 4 to 2 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates.

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NEW COACH NAMED BY ASHLAND HIGH

Ashland, July 20.—John A. Stromberg, 35 year old graduate of the University of Minnesota, has signed a one year contract with the Ashland school board to coach football and basketball at Ashland high school, according to an announcement released from the office of School Superintendent Theo. J. Norby today.

Stromberg received his BA and BS degrees from Minnesota in 1932 and his MA degree in the summer of 1942. He coached at Stewartville, Minn., from 1942 until the close of school this year. In the two years his football teams lost but one game, winning the district championship last fall. His basketball teams won the consolation championship last year and the championship this year, the first time in the history of the school.

Stromberg is married and has two children. He and his family will arrive in Ashland about September 1.

Stromberg will succeed Al Simpson, who will be head coach at Medford high the coming school year.

AUG. 1 DEADLINE FOR DOE PERMITS

Hunters wishing to take part in any drawings for special cow elk and doe deer tags must have their applications on file at the Portland office of the state game commission not later than August 1. If at the end of that day's business, more applications are on hand than the number of tags to be issued, drawings will be held. In making application for these tags, a person should specify the type of tag desired and give his hunting license number if license has been purchased. No fee is to be remitted with applications.

For a specified portion of the Hart Mountain National Antelope Refuge there will be an open deer season from October 7 to 15, inclusive. The number of tags is limited to 300 deer and 200 buck deer.

Application for an antelope tag should be accompanied with the fee of \$2.50 for residents and \$5 for non-residents, together with information as to hunting license number. No drawing will be held for these tags although the maximum number of tags to be issued is limited to 2500.

Coast Grid Loop Prexy Has No Quarrel With New League

San Francisco, July 20.—(U.P.)—Mr. J. Rufus Klawans, as you may have read, is the new president of four-year-old Pacific coast professional football league.

Now, Mr. Average Fan up and down the coast could well ask himself "who in 'ell is J. Rufus Klawans and what does he know about running a football league?"

Well, we might inform Mr. Average Fan that J. Rufus is what might be termed, in baseball parlance, "a player's player," or to be more specific, in this case, the answer to a prayer by the league's club owners. For he's a man who knows the business from top to bottom, has studied it from all angles for a long span of years.

Mr. Klawans, an attorney was the man picked by the league when it decided that something must be done on a sound basis to fight the competition that looms on the horizon in the shape of Bill Freelove's newly-organized football league which, incidentally, recently hired as its president another attorney of some renown in the person of Jerry Giesler.
