Poignant Drama of War
Bride Tops Craterian Bill;

A romance of "The girl next door" is the sympathetic theme of Ginger Rogers' newest vehicle, "Tender Comrade," which comes today to the screen of the Craterian theater for a three-day showing.

HULL SUSPICIOUS OF NAZI UPEAVAL

Washington, July 21—(U.P.)—Secretary of State Cordell Hull, warning against "over optimism" said today the attack on Adolf Hitler clearly indicates that the realization of Germany's "impending defeat" is spreading in the Reich.

The appointment of Heinrich Himmler as commander in chief of the home front, Hull said in a formal statement, is an illustration of the "steadily deteriorating military position of Germany." But he warned:

"We should intensify our efforts here at home to bring about and make all the sooner and more certain the defeat of our enemies."

CONFERENCE SET ON FOLKES' PLEA

Salem, Ore., July 22—(U.P.)—State supreme court will hold a mid-recess conference Tuesday to discuss the petition for rehearing of Robert E. Lee Folkes, 22-year-old convicted slayer in the "Lower 13" murder, it was announced today.

His attorneys have indicated that if rehearing is denied, an appeal to the U. S. supreme court will be made.

NAVY INCREASES NEXT YEAR PLAN

Washington, July 22—(U.P.)—The strength of the U. S. navy will be boosted 383,000 men above its present authorized strength of 3,006,000 by July, 1945, "to keep pace with the acceleration of operations" against Japan, Secretary of Navy James

Forrestal announced tonight. "We have moved faster than we had expected in the Pacific," Forrestal said.

The war against Japan "is by no means approaching an end," he warned, but he hinted that the time for big operations was approaching.

SAVE TRUCK TIRES BY CENTRALIZING INSPECTION PLAN

"A central truck tire inspection station has been opened in Medford and all truck, implement, pickup or any other vehicle with an O.D.T. certificate will have to have a clearance through this station before the applications can be acted upon by the ration board," it was stated today by J. H. Hedric, associate district mileage rationing representative who is in Medford getting the central inspection station under way. "As far as the applicant is concerned, the method of inspection has not been changed. He must still have his tires inspected at one of the seven authorized truck tire inspection stations. These stations are the Sam Jennings Tire Co., Firestone Stores, Hawkinson Tire and Tread Service, Medford Service Station and Lewis Super Service, all in Medford, Don and Betty's Station at Eagle Point and Krupp's Service Station in Central Point.

"The central inspection station in all communities where it has been tried has done a good job in saving rubber," Mr. Hedric says. "In some boards such as Grants Pass, for instance, more than one tire out of five

found ready for the scrap pile has been re-capped and put to work again. The extreme seriousness of the truck tire situation is just beginning to be realized by truckers and any method that will make it possible to stretch the useful life of these tires must be used," he adds.

"The local ration board cannot possibly supply the demand for large size truck tires," L. L. Ternahan, executive secretary of the local OPA, reports, "but the very best use of these tires for the good of the war effort is promised. In line with a recent ruling, absolutely no large size tires will be released except at the regular bi-weekly meetings." Ternahan states, adding, "In view of the fact that the members of the tire panels are all volunteers who have businesses of their own and who do not like to be telephoned or otherwise contacted during business hours, I have been asked to point out to all tire users that absolutely no tires of any kind will be issued except through the panel at a regular meeting. "There is only one exception to this rule—if a tire is blown out and there is no spare on a truck actually loaded with livestock, a tire certificate may be
