NAGS SELL FAST TO WAR WORKERS IN DETROIT AREA

Factory Farmers Use Horses To Work Small Places—Some Used For Food.

Detroit—(U.P.)—"Factory farmers" are among the best customers of Julius Jacobs, who does a thriving business almost in the shadow of Chrysler Corp.'s sprawling De Soto plant—selling horses.

Factory farmers are war workers who farm a small patch of ground, Jacobs explained. Four or five of them chip in together and get a work horse for \$75 or \$80 for spring and summer, and in the fall sell it to a horse butcher for table use or dog meat, depending on the horse.

No meat baby, Jacob's business has operated in the same spot for 31 years, he said, and business is good, thank you. Before the war he said sales ran as high as 170 head a day.

"Best business today is saddle horses," he said. "People got more money than they know what to do with. Lots of big farms in Michigan now have two, three head of riding horses where before they didn't have any. Gas rationing helps too."

Good riding horses today bring anywhere from \$100 to \$300 at auction, he said, with a good market for broke western ponies sent here by train or truck from Montana, Nebraska and Wyoming.

Jacobs himself is proprietor, auctioneer and the hired help. On auction days every Friday dealers from all over the state bring their own or pitch in to chase horses around the ring. Though almost within neighboring distance of the Ford Motor Co.'s Dearborn plant, the barn has authentic atmosphere. You can almost see the Lone Ranger looking calm and purposeful, or hear Gene Autry caroling about sage brush and desert moons.

Feeds His Retinue
Bow-legged characters right out of Republic pictures lounge around wearing high-heeled boots, noisy plaid shirts and 10-gallon hats. Jacobs feeds them, at least part of them, on a table with a bona fide red-and-white checked table cloth.

Though business is good, Jacobs looks unhappy when he starts talking about the future of work horses.

"In another year there'll be no work horses at all if people don't raise more feed and keep them through the winter instead of working them to death and then selling them in the fall," he predicted.

"In New Jersey alone they kill 100 head a week just to feed people. Then there's the dog-food packers everywhere. Used to be they canned the meat, but now with rationing folks buy fresh horse meat for 15 to 17 cents a pound and keep it at home in the refrigerator for their dog."

Sees Death of Horses
"Isn't dearth of horses good horses any more. One of these days people will wake up and there won't be any horses for small farmers and factory guys who raise their own food."

Jacobs said farmers and breeders in Indiana and Illinois used to raise the best work horses, but they aren't producing them any more because of the uncertain market and high feed prices.

"You can't saddle and disk and harrow with plow horses," he said. "But they're right pretty to look at."
