

AIRPORT PROGRAM TO COST BILLION IS URGED BY CAA

COL. CHAMBERLIN HAS KIND WORD FOR PEOPLE HERE

Survey Shows 3,000 More Fields Needed After War; Ask Community Planning.

Washington, July 25 (U.P.)—Congress soon will receive from the Civil Aeronautics Administration a survey showing the need for a \$1,000,000,000 airport construction program, including thousands of small fields for "personal flying."

Assistant Secretary of Commerce William A. M. Burden said in a Sunday radio address that the survey would show that the nation's 3,088 airports should be increased by 3,000 within five to 10 years after the war, while 1,625 existing airports should be improved.

Joint Program
Burden said the study contemplated a joint federal-state program, under which the federal government would appropriate \$100,000,000 yearly while state governments would provide another \$100,000,000. In this way, he said, the \$1,000,000,000 program could be completed within five years.

He called on all communities to plan now the part they would play in such a program. While some additional large air terminals will be needed, he said, 2,900 of the 3,000 new fields probably would be small types of landing areas.

1,827 Big Airports
Burden explained that under the plan, 1,827 cities would have airports which could accommodate "anything from charter service and small local or feeder lines to transcontinental express service, according to the travel market the area offers."

The cost of facilities for the 1,827 cities would be about \$630,000,000. The remainder of the proposed \$1,000,000,000 fund would be spent to spot the country "with small airports for personal flying," Burden said.

In a farewell statement yesterday, Col. F. T. Chamberlin, former medical director and post surgeon for Camp White, stated that in all his 27 years of army experience he had never before found citizens or agencies as cooperative as those of Medford and the Rogue River valley. Col. and Mrs. Chamberlin, here since February, 1943, left this morning for Camp Lockett, Cal., where the army is establishing the first army service force convalescent center which the colonel will command.

"I never asked for anything that wasn't forthcoming," Col. Chamberlin declared, and added that the cooperative spirit of both persons and agencies had been "remarkable." The officer stated that he and his staff members were leaving with the deepest regret, and said that the rush of army business prevented him from calling personally on the many civilians in this area who had worked with him in various ways during his stay at Camp White. Many officers, noncommissioned officers and nurses are being transferred to Camp Lockett from the colonel's staff here.

ATTENDANCE AT BOY SCOUT CAMP HITS NEW HIGH
