

YANKEES TIGHTEN GRASP ON SOUTH PORTION OF PISA

Germans Battle Hard Farther East to Avoid Threat of Flanking Movement.

Rome, July 25—(U.P.)—American armored forces tightened their grip on southern Pisa today despite heavy shellfire from German long-range guns emplaced on the north side of the Arno river, and smashed two strong enemy counterattacks along the Pisa-Florence highway to the east.

Official reports said the Americans were firmly in control of the south bank of the Arno along a 32-mile front extending inland from the Tyrrhenian seacoast to within 18 miles west of Florence.

Bridges Wrecked
Yankee patrols overran all of the modern section of Pisa lying below the river and found that the retreating Nazis had demolished every bridge linking the new and the old cities.

No resistance was reported inside the modern city, but German 88-millimeter cannon and mortars poured a steady drumfire into the American positions in an effort to disrupt preparations for a frontal assault across the broad stream.

Further to the east, however, where the Germans faced the threat of a flanking assault that would cut off their forces in Pisa, the enemy put up a furious battle before falling back across the Arno.

Counters Fall
German shock troops hurled two powerful counterattacks against the American lines around Ponte a Ewoia, 20 miles east of Pisa, and San Miniato, two miles to the east, but both were beaten off by American infantrymen and artillery fire.

On the Adriatic front, Allied forces drove to within striking distance of the important German supply road linking Sengallia and Ostra, and forward units closed in for a direct assault on Ostra itself.

German long-range guns maintained a desultory fire on Ancona, now some 15 miles behind the battle lines, but headquarters spokesmen said repair operations on the big port had not been interrupted.

Postwar Rights Agreed For Vets

COUNTY REACHES "E" BOND QUOTA

Given a last-minute boost by pay-roll allotments from corporations with main offices out of the county, Jackson County's quota for Fifth War Loan drive "E" bonds was reached yesterday, one day before the end of the drive. Word of the allotments came from the Federal Reserve bank in Portland, through which such allotments are announced, and while exact figures are not available at present, it was understood that the "E" bonds had been oversold about three percent. The county's quota was \$600,000.

Total figures for the drive had reached \$2,985,033, it was stated yesterday, considerably over the total assigned quota of \$2,262,000. Complete sale totals will be announced from the Federal Reserve bank later this week, it is expected.

Successors Eyed For Sen. Truman

Washington, July 25—(U.P.)—Sens. Carl A. Hatch, D., N. M., and James M. Hend, D., N. Y., were mentioned in informed quarters today as among the most likely to succeed Sen. Harry S. Truman, D., Mo., as chairman of the special senate war investigating committee whose inquiries have saved the government billions.

Truman, nominated last week

as the 1944 Democratic vice-presidential candidate, plans tentatively to quit the committee post on Aug. 1, when congress ends its summer recess. He may also resign as a committee member.

CHINESE REPULSE NEW ATTACKS ON SIEGED HENGYANG

Chungking, July 25—(U.P.)—Chinese troops repulsed new Japanese attacks on the besieged Hunan province stronghold of Hengyang, a communique reported today, and a delayed dispatch asserted that Japan's summer offensive to cut China in two has been stopped in its tracks as a cost of more than 50,000 casualties to the invaders.

The Chungking communique said heavy fighting was continuing around Hengyang, but reported new successes for Chinese troops north and east of the encircled city.

One Japanese column striking southward toward Anjen, 43 miles southeast of Hengyang, was annihilated by Chinese forces, the communique said, while other Chinese troops battled into the streets of Japanese-held Siansiang, 55 miles north of Hengyang.

Meanwhile, Gen. Hsueh Yueh,

commander of Chinese forces in central China, told the United Press at his field headquarters that the Japanese have been so badly riddled by casualties that they will have to abandon their current offensive unless they pour strong reinforcements into the battle area.

Hsueh credited fliers of the U. S. 14th Air Force with killing almost 15,000 Japanese between May 15 and July 5.
