Little Rock, Ark., July 25 (UP)—Sen. Hattie Caraway, the only woman in the upper house of congress, staked her political future today on the outcome of the balloting in the Democratic primary election in Arkansas, where her renomination was contested by four men.

Principal opposition to Mrs. Caraway, who is seeking election to her second full term in the senate, was offered by Rep. J. W. Fulbright, 39-year-old author of the "Fulbright resolution."

Bottle Bombs Save Needed Materials For German Army

With British Second Army, Normandy, July 25 (UP)—The Germans are using beer bottles for mines in another of their makeshiftes to overcome their equipment shortages, it was disclosed today.

The bottles are filled with explosive, a detonator is inserted and a trip wire is attached and extended to a place where an Allied soldier may strike it. The crude devices have been found in the grass in some parts of the front.

Recently captured German orders revealed other tactics and uses.
One ordered the placing of signal pistols in wire defenses and fire them from a distance to simulate an active line of troops.
Road blocks were faked by simply piling up dirt and stones.
Troop movements were to be faked by racing the motors of stationary vehicles.
