

U. OF ILLINOIS BIDS FOR LEAD IN AIR TRAINING

School To Launch Largest
Aviation Program By a
University.

Chicago (U.P.)—The University of Illinois, with the opening of its airport in November, will launch the largest university-sponsored aviation program in the nation.

Students will be trained as specialists in aviation and will cover every aspect of the field, from the construction and production of all types of airplanes and engines and the design of airports, to medical and agricultural aspects of aviation and aviation law.

Special degrees in aeronautics may be conferred for advanced university study, and graduates will be able to take their places in what will probably be the greatest post-war field in commerce and industry. "The situation confronting planners for the future of domestic aviation is without a parallel in the history of education, and indeed of civilization," President Arthur C. Williams, internationally-known engineer who has headed the university for 10 years, stated in announcing the university's new program of aviation education and research.

Myriad of Problems
"No other industry ever has made such broad demands on so many fields of human knowledge."

For instance, he pointed out, the air transport of foods and perishable cargoes, including vine-ripened or tree-ripened fruits, quick-frozen food, etc., will be only one of the thousands of problems that will have to be worked out.

The delivery of baby chicks to Europe by air, and the effect of flying on tubercular patients are but two more of the multiple problems for research of the University of Illinois air program.

What kind of flier planes, airports and hangars will permeate every section of America in the future when Americans will be hedge-hopping the country in cub planes and taking week-end trips to London and Paris?

How can airplanes be better adjusted to human beings and how can they aid in world trade and the conflict or cooperation of nations?

What kind of turf is best for the grass runways that will be in use by communities all over the nation?

Board Set Up
These problems already are under consideration of the University of Illinois Advisory Board on Aeronautics made up of seven nationally-known persons identified with various aspects of aviation and related activities. Dr. Baldwin M. Woods, of the University of California, a pioneer in engineering research, is chairman of the board.

The other members are Dr. Bruce Uthus, director of aviation education service, C.A.A.; Comdr. A. F. Bonnalie of the U. S. Navy and former official of United Air Lines; W. J. Blanchard, general manager, aeroproducts division, General Motors Corp.; L. R. Inwood, executive assistant, Transcontinental and Western Air, Inc.; Col. A. D. Tuttle, medical director of the United Airlines Transport Corp.; Chicago, and Mr. A. E. Smith, engineer, Pratt & Whitney Aircraft Corp., of Kansas City, Missouri.

The board members claim that the University of Illinois airport, scheduled to open in the fall, and large enough to accommodate even the B-29s, is the best planned airport in the country. The airport, which will be used to provide flight instruction to members of the

Reserved officers' training corps and high school teachers of aviation courses, also will be used by commercial air transport companies, and will have facilities for private planes.

DEATH PREFERRED TO ARMY SERVICE

St. George, Utah, July 27.—(U.P.)—George Bruce, 40, today had carried out his pledge to commit suicide rather than return to Los Angeles to face draft evasion charges.

Said to be a native of Indiana, Bruce was discovered by the FBI working in a coal mine at Price, Utah, July 6. He was arraigned in Salt Lake City the following day, and released on bail.

On July 13, the FBI office at Salt Lake received a letter from Bruce, saying that his body would be found in the Virgin river. Sheriff Antonio B. Prince, after the body was recovered, reported that death was caused by self-inflicted pistol wounds.

STARLET DIVORCES LT. RUDY VALLEE

Hollywood, July 27.—(U.P.)—Brunette Film Starlet Bette Greer today was granted a divorce from Coast Guard Lt. Rudy Vallee in a streamlined hearing lasting only a few minutes.

Carefully dabbing at tears clouding her eyes, Miss Greer testified that Vallee humiliated her on many occasions.

"I wanted to make a go of our marriage," she said, "but he had been a bachelor too long."

"He never put a hand on me but he has humiliated me," the former Washington, D. C. model explained.

"He said he didn't like marriage—he preferred bachelor life."

CANADIAN SHIPYARD WORKERS IN WALKOUT

Halifax, N. S., July 27.—(U.P.)—Some 3,000 workers in three yards of Halifax Shipyards, Ltd., at Halifax and nearby Dartmouth, struck today despite a last minute telegram from Deputy Labor Minister Arthur Macnamara urging the walkout be postponed pending new proposals from the federal labor department.

The dispute involves a closed shop issue at the yards and resulted from the company's alleged refusal to accept a conciliation board compromise offering check-off and maintenance of membership clauses.

APRICOT JAM RECIPE SAVES SUGAR, FRUIT

Make It This Quick,
Easy Way

4 Cups Ground Fruit
4 Cups Sugar
1/4 Cup Lemon Juice
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash and pit 4 pounds fully ripe apricots, grind. Do not peel. Measure exactly 4 level cups of the ground fruit (add water to fill last cup, if necessary) into a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin and lemon juice, stir well and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let the boil subside, stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.

SEXTON HIGHWAY TO BE MODEL IN FUTURE BUILDING

Klamath Falls, Ore., July 27.—(U.P.)—The state highway commission has announced that the recently constructed Sexton mountain section of the Pacific highway, between Roseburg and Grants Pass, will be used as a model for future mountain road construction in Oregon.

R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, estimated the cost of

the project, covering about five miles, at \$500,000.

The commission, on a highway maintenance inspection tour, proclaimed the project as probably the most outstanding mountain road in the state.

Addressing a civic group in Klamath Falls yesterday, Baldock said he was elated over the satisfactory condition of the Oregon highways, with respect to maintenance, considering that field crews of the commission now were 500 men under normal personnel.

The commission is traveling over the Willamette highway from Klamath Falls to Eugene today, and will proceed to Bend to spend the night.

BRIDGES BATTLE ADVANCES ROUND

San Francisco, July 27.—(U.P.)—The fight to prevent deportation of Harry Bridges to Australia on grounds he is an undesirable alien advanced another round today as attorneys for the west coast labor leader filed a petition for rehearing of an adverse U. S. Ninth circuit court of appeals decision.

The circuit court handed down a 3-2 decision June 26, upholding U. S. Attorney General Francis Biddle's deportation order. Bridges' attorneys, Richard Glad-

stein and Aubrey Grossman, have indicated they would carry the case to the U. S. supreme court if necessary.

How to make a "Jiffy" cake

THIS CAKE is the magic answer, when you're really in a hurry. Takes only a few minutes to make the batter, and a half-hour to bake. Here's the recipe:

JIFFY CAKE
1 1/2 cups enriched flour 1/2 cup milk
2 1/2 tps. baking powder 1/2 cup softened shortening
1/4 tsp. salt 1 egg
1 cup sugar 1 tsp. vanilla extract

Sift flour; measure; sift into large bowl with baking powder, salt, and sugar. Measure milk into cup; add shortening to fill. Dump milk, shortening, unbeaten egg, and flavoring into flour mixture. Beat with rotary beater 2 to 3 minutes, or until batter is smooth. Pour batter into well greased shallow square cake pan (8x8x2). Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 30 minutes, or until done. Serve warm or cold, plain or with sauce. Serves 8.

Cup Cakes, too, require surprisingly little time to prepare (summertime suggestions: serve them split and covered with crushed fresh fruit, or with frosting, or with powdered sugar). The recipe:

CUP CAKES
1 1/2 cups enriched flour 1 cup sugar
2 1/2 tps. baking powder 1 tsp. vanilla extract
1/4 tsp. salt 1 egg
1/2 cup shortening 1/2 cup milk

Sift flour; measure; mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt. Cream shortening until smooth; gradually add sugar, creaming until fluffy; beat in vanilla and egg. Add flour alternately with milk, beating until smooth after each addition. Turn into greased muffin pans and bake in moderate oven (375° F.) about 25 minutes. Makes 18 cakes.
