CRIPPEN CHOICE TO HURL AGAINST NAVY NINE SUNDAY

Fred Gay to Pitch For Naval Air Station; Harvey Storey Star of Visitors.

Paul Freer, manager of the Medford Crabs, white league all-stars who will face the powerful U. S. Naval Air Station nine from Klamath Falls at the fairgrounds park Sunday afternoon, said today that Steve Crippen, ace hurler of the pennant-winning Medford Crabs, would start on the mound against the visitors. The game will begin at 2 o'clock sharp and, in line with navy policy, no admission will be charged.

Crippen will probably be opposed by Fred Gay, star southpaw of the Crabs, during his professional ball-playing days prior to entering the service, was with San Francisco, Oakland, Hollywood and Portland in the Pacific Coast league, and pitched for the Kansas City Blues in the Little World Series in 1939.

Crippen will be backed up by Ted Bergold, the little WPRC lefthander and Don Safford, southpaw of the Crater staff. The naval air station, in case Gay weakens, will have on hand Jim Olsen, who elbowed for the San Diego Padres before the war.

RAMPAGING TRIBE WHIPS YANKS, 8-1 ON HOAG'S HITS

New York, July 28.—(U.P.)—The Cleveland Indians have on their war paint and it's devil take the hindmost when the other teams of the American league invade their battlefield.

Currently, the New York Yankees, backtracking world champions, are feeling the sting of the Indian war club.

Yesterday, the erstwhile Bronx brenners were consistent to their present trend. The pitching was shoddy, their fielding butter-fingered and their hitting ineffective, as witness the fact that they made but a single run on 11 hits as Cleveland triumphed 8-1.

The victory brought the Tribe to within 11 percentage points of the Yankees, now tied with the Boston Red Sox in second place, 3½ games back of the pace-setting St. Louis Browns. Walter Dubiel went the distance for the champs and allowed 13 hits, including two doubles and two singles by Myril Hoag, who was a Yankee himself once.

The Red Sox gained their tie for second place by virtue of a 6-1 win over the Detroit Tigers.

The hapless Washington Senators bowed to the four-hit pitching of Orval Grove of the Chicago White Sox losing 4-0. The tail-end Philadelphia Athletics sneaked up from the cellar to slap down the St. Louis Browns, 7-5.

In the National league, the Cincinnati Reds regained second place over the idle Pittsburgh Pirates by taking the measure of the Boston Braves, 4-2.

The lading Cardinals stretched their advantage to 14½ games and completed a clean sweep of their four game series with the Philadelphia Phillies by taking both ends of a double header, 8-7 and 5-0.

Chicago at Brooklyn and Pittsburgh at New York were postponed because of rain.

KATONEN DEFEATS MORELLI IN HARD ARMORY GRAPPLE

Paavo Katonen finally got his revenge against Tony Morelli in the Medford armory grappling ring last night, defeating the ferocious Floridian two falls to one in a knock-down-drag-out battle that followed the same pattern established in their two previous bouts.

The Pacific coast light-heavyweight champion took the deciding fall with a resounding body slam and press after three times climbing back in the ring from whence he was hurled by the burly Morelli.

It looked like Katonen was about done in as Morelli, unleashing a savage series of punches, hammered the Finn to the ropes and tossed him into the customers. This happened three times, but Katonen wasn't so bad off as he appeared.

The last time he crawled back into the squared circle Morelli rushed in for what he decided was the "kill." It was that, all right, but not for Morelli. Katonen met him with a bang, wrapped his powerful arms around him and flipped him to the deck.

The champion took the first fall with a body press after both had cut loose with everything in the book. Morelli evened the count a short time later with a headlock and press.

Jack Lipscomb defeated Herb Parks, the Canadian light-heavyweight, in the semi-windup, taking falls in the first and third rounds with a self-strangle and press and with a leg-breaker. Parks got a fall in the second with a toe hold.

Pat "Rowdy" O'Doudy and Billy Konke went to a fall-apiece draw in the opener. O'Doudy, a scowling character who wasn't too orthodox, obtained a fall in the first heat with a reverse leg-breaker, while Konke used a press for his tumble in the third.

PORTLAND EDGES SEATTLE BY 3-1

A two-run rally in the last of the ninth, sparked by French Uhalt's booming 385-foot triple, gave the San Francisco Seals a 4-3 win over Los Angeles last night and cut the Angels' Pacific Coast league lead back to a single game.

Hollywood won its 17th game in 18 starts against Oakland this year, 4-2, while San Diego turned on Sacramento to squeeze out a 2-1 triumph in 11 innings. Portland moved into fifth place by trimming Seattle 3-1.

Roy Herlert twisted a six hitter for Portland against Seattle, but had to help from Ad Liska to stave off a Rainier threat in the ninth before the Beavers won 3-1 and squared the series at two all. Joe Demoran, Seattle hurler, was banished in the eighth for arguing with the umpire.

MURRAY IS 2-1 OVER THOMPSON

New York, July 28.—(U.P.)—In a clash of "dark dynamite," big Lee Q. Murray of Connecticut is a 2-1 favorite to beat Squat Turkey Thompson of Los Angeles tonight in their 10-round bout at Madison Square Garden. Both negro heavyweights are knock-out artists.

Murray is favored to ruin Thompson's debut because of his advantages in range—height and reach. Although both scale virtually 206 pounds, Murray of South Norwalk, Conn., stretches up six feet two inches, whereas no-neck Thompson, the "Black Galento", is sawed off at five feet eight inches.

Because of their punching prowess, the bout shapes up as a black natural which is expected to attract about 15,000 fans and a gate of \$50,000.

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Railway Unions Alarmed by CIO Political Plans

Washington, July 28.—(U.P.)—Labor, the official newspaper of 15 railway unions, today expressed alarm over the program of the CIO political action committee and said PAC was "full of ominous possibilities for the entire labor movement."

The newspaper said editorially that it was concerned about the plans of PAC Chairman Sidney Hillman and about "great slush funds" and raised Hillman's "open alliance with the communists in New York state and elsewhere."

"... If Mr. Hillman or anyone else imagines that a proposal to raise \$6,000,000 to control a presidential campaign will not cause the most serious repercussions from one end of this country to the other, he simply does not know the American people," Labor said.
