IODINE AS FIRST AID DISINFECTANT

After all, iodine, in the form of Mild Tincture of Iodine (C. S. P.)—officially called Tinctura Iodi Mitis—or in the form of Weak Solution of Iodine (B. P.)—officially called Liquor Iodi Mitis—has its own characteristic color, odor and when applied to a fresh wound bite, then, too, somehow we have come to think it penetrates into every nook or crevice of a wound, at least when the tincture 'alcoholic solution' is used. Mild Tincture of Iodine—the preparation introduced to meet the public demand for an efficient wound disinfectant—contains approximately 2% of iodine, slightly more than 2% of sodium iodide, and slightly less than 50% of alcohol. It is the preparation I suggest not only for use as a first aid disinfectant of wounds, etc., and for painting the skin over swellings, sprains or the like but also for the Iodine Ration. Weak Solution of Iodine contains approximately 2 1/2% of iodine and 1 1/2% of potassium iodide in water—it contains no alcohol.

Many readers have asked me how much alcohol tincture of iodine should contain. The old standard Tincture of Iodine (U. S. P.) contains approximately 7% of iodine (about three times as strong as Mild Tincture of Iodine) and about 80% alcohol. But this old standard tincture should be left exclusively to physicians, surgeons, dentists. When a layman uses 'iodine' or asks for it at the drugstore Mild Tincture of Iodine should be dispensed and without any argument.

There is not good reason why mild tincture of iodine in small containers fitted with glass rod in stopper or similar contrivance facilitate application, should not be obtainable everywhere.

Answer—No, except septicemia (blood poisoning), which is a germ disease rather than a blood disease.
