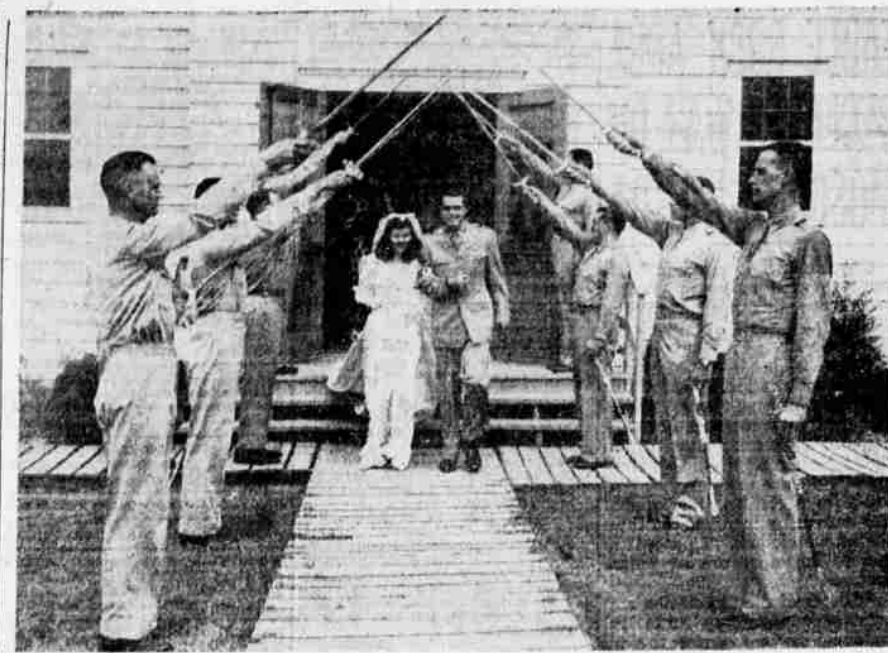

JACKSON COUNTY FSA COMMITTEE ANNOUNCES PLANS

Plans for the new fiscal year, together with reappointment and new members of the Jackson County FSA Committee, were announced this week by Bruce E. Stewart, County Farm Security Supervisor, 211 Fluhrer building, Medford, Oregon.

Edward Chamberlain of Eagle Point has been named to the committee, replacing James R. McCracken. Ashland, whose term expired June 30, 1944. Mr. Chamberlain has had a well rounded experience in the operation of the family type farm, and his services on the committee should materially benefit the County FSA program.

Members with unexpired terms still serving on the committee are Earl Ulrich of Prospect and Edward P. Vilas of Medford.

First, important new work being taken over by the County FSA committee for the new fiscal year which began July 1, is an inventory of community and individual borrower needs for Farm Security loans and services. This will provide the basis for fitting the FSA program to meet local farm conditions both in terms of individual, community and county needs.

All FSA loan applications for operating goods, water facilities, group services and farm ownership are reviewed and approved by the committee to make the best possible use of available credit and management assistance, reported Stewart. Funds appropriated for the new year provide about the same amount for rehabilitation loans as last year, but farm ownership loans will be heavily curtailed due to difficulties in securing good farms at reasonable prices.

Work of the County FSA committee has been largely responsible for the local accomplishments of the program and I want to publicly thank them for the time and thought they have given to this important job, Stewart said.

NINE-HOUR DAY AT CAMP WHITE

Camp White — A nine-hour work day will go into effect for all civilian personnel at Camp White, Tuesday morning, except for persons employed in shops now working three full shifts.

The new day was ordered here in compliance with a new army service forces regulation, extending the work day one hour for all ASE personnel to "meet a critical situation in the army service forces" arising from an accumulation of unfinished work.

The longer day went into effect for military personnel yesterday. Working hours at Camp White will now be from 7:30 a. m. to 5:30 p. m.

All leaves and furloughs for both military and civilian personnel have been cancelled indefinitely by the order.
