Seabees Capture Largest Jap Flag

San Francisco, July 29.—(U.P.) J. P. Sheridan, chief carpenter's mate, USN, of New York city, today displayed at 12th naval district headquarters what was believed to be the largest Japanese flag yet captured—a hand-stitched banner measuring 9 by 13 feet.

Sheridan was one of six seabees unloading supplies at Kwajalein who were caught by enemy gunfire as American tanks attacked a Japanese pillbox. Diving into another enemy pillbox, Sheridan and the Seabees captured two wounded nips they found there. A Japanese colonel apparently had hauled down the garrison flag and killed himself on top of it.

JOCKEY ARCARO HURT. New York, July 29.—(U.P.) Jockey Eddie Arcaro suffered a possible fractured knee when he fell off a horse during the running of the fourth race at Empire Friday. Arcaro was taken to Mercy hospital for observation, while Johnny Longden, who was also thrown during the race reportedly suffered only bruises.

ADENOIDS AND STUPIDITY

What has become of the "trained" nurse, the teacher, or the doctor, forsooth, who used to take an appraising second look at the unhappy school kid caught with his mandible down and his attention wool-gathering and forthwith sentence the poor kid to an operation for adenoids? That

sort of malpractice was an everyday occurrence when you and I were young, Maggie.

This snap diagnosis was made on the mere facial expression—the "adenoid facies." Classical example of the "adenoid facies" is, or was, Van Leyden's portrait of Ferdinand I of Spain—open mouth, stupid expression, dull hollow eyes, short upper lip, exposing upper teeth, narrow high arched palate, crowded uneven upper teeth, pinched or narrow nostrils, mouth breathing and generally more or less impairment of hearing. All these features may go with simple enlargement of the tonsils, whether there is significant thickening, hypertrophy or "vegetations" of the pharyngeal tonsil (third tonsil, adenoids) or not.

As a matter of fact a child with sufficient obstruction of breathing to give rise to such features of the "adenoid facies" has the same I. Q. as a child without such trouble, if you allow for (1) the handicap of under oxygenation which, of course, impairs or weakens all vital functions, physical and mental, as well as growth and development; (2) the handicap of defective hearing, which, as I see it, is one of the very few consequences of tonsil and adenoid enlargement that may justify surgery—not that deafness in such cases necessarily warrants surgical removal of the tonsils or adenoids, for in many cases a few X-ray treatments in the hands of a physician skilled in that field will suffice.

If there is any special mental deficiency, stupidity or dullness associated with adenoids or enlarged tonsils, other than the general vital handicaps mentioned, it is the stupidity and incompetency of the doctors, nurses, teachers, social service agents and parents who conspire to subject children with large tonsils to operation.

Some readers may remember that I was formerly more enthusiastic about the removal of enlarged tonsils and adenoids than I am now. In my book "Personal Health," now out of print, I represented the operation as comparatively free from risk and productive of uniformly good results. QUESTIONS & ANSWERS. Diabetes Versus Intoxication. Isn't it true that a person with

diabetes may behave as though drunk when suffering from insulin shock or overdose or when going into coma? Have not innocent people been thrown in jail to die from such a state when police have assumed they were drunk? (M. M.)

Answer—Yes, that mistake has happened. A diabetic taking insulin may become quite irrational if for some reason the patient fails to take food soon after the insulin, or if the patient is working or playing harder than usual and so using up the blood sugar faster than ordinarily.
