

MANY OFFICERS AT CAMP WHITE ARE REASSIGNED

22 Doctors, Seven Nurses
Leave Hospital For Camp
Lockett, Calif.

Camp White.—Military orders transferred many officers and enlisted men from the post last week, the largest group being from the Station hospital, transferred to the new convalescent center at Camp Lockett, Calif.

Capt. Woodbury K. Hall, post intelligence officer, leaves soon for Santa Barbara, Calif., where he will serve as manager of an officers' hotel.

Capt. Hall came to Camp White December 13, 1943, from Ft. Lewis, Wash., where he served in the classification section of the reception center and as post intelligence officer.

Capt. Lucky Leaves
Capt. Kenneth A. Luckey, post range officer since last January and founder of The Grenade, left this week for Seattle, where he will receive eight weeks of training at the port of embarkation prior to being assigned to regular duties with the inspector general's division.

Coming to Camp White July 22, 1944, from Ft. Ord, Calif., Capt. Luckey was assigned as assistant intelligence officer under Lt. Col. John W. Horsley and was named the first public relations officer.

Staris Grenade
On January 28, 1943, he started The Grenade, remaining in the public relations office until his transfer to the position of range officer on January 7.

Among officers transferred is the post adjutant and senior WAC officer on the post, Capt. Dorothy G. Selby. On this post since February 15, Capt. Selby served for several months as assistant post adjutant.

First Officers' Class
A member of the first OC class at Des Moines, Capt. Selby first assisted in the activation of the Second WAAC Training Center at Daytona Beach, Fla., and then proceeded to Boston, where she was assigned as CO of the WAC detachment at the anti-aircraft artillery command. Capt. Selby will be assigned to WPRC.

In addition to Col. Frank T. Chamberlin, former post surgeon, 22 doctors and seven nurses have been transferred from this station to Camp Lockett, Calif.

TURKEY ABOUT TO BREAK WITH NAZIS OBSERVERS AVER

London, July 31.—(U.P.)—Allied sources in Ankara told the United Press today that Turkey was about to break off diplomatic relations with Germany, and might do so within 24 hours.

(The passage of the report through the tight Turkish censorship appeared to put it in the semi-official class as the most authentic version so far of a number of forecasts that a major decision by the Turks was approaching.)

United Press Correspondent Leon Kay reported from Ankara that allied quarters said a rupture of Turkish-German diplomatic relations was imminent.

"Turkey is taking the initiative, possibly within 24 hours, according to reports current in diplomatic circles this morning," Kay reported.

(The German transoceanic news agency was quoted by the FCC as saying that a talk between German Ambassador Franz von Papen and Turkish Premier Sukru Saracoglu "has been postponed until Tuesday.")

After Ankara dispatches predicted a diplomatic break between Turkey and Germany, Berlin newspapers said that the Turks would cede air and naval bases to the allies.

FILM INCREASE WON'T HELP FANS

Washington, July 31.—(U.P.)—The War Production Board announced today it has authorized continued full-capacity production of military, professional, and amateur film but cautioned amateur photographers not to expect any increase in snapshot film.

Film production in 1943 increased 30 per cent over the 1941 output, WPB said. With military requirements continuing at a high level, WPB said 85 per cent of the film output by eight companies will continue for essential war use and the remaining 15 per cent will be controlled for use by the professional and amateur cameramen.

A revision to the limitation order has been made to facilitate production of each type of film in line with predetermined military and essential civilian requirements.

ELKS WILL PLAN AID FOR FIGHTERS

Chicago, July 31.—(U.P.)—More than 3,000 Elks convened today for the opening session of the war conference of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks.

The conference which will continue through Thursday will discuss postwar aid to servicemen and consider sponsoring psychological clinics and employment bureaus to help orient servicemen to the domestic situation.

Speakers for tonight include Grand Exalted Ruler Frank J. Loneragan, Portland, Ore.

First Man Drafted Killed in Action

Washburn, Wis., July 31.—(U.P.)—Lt. James B. Manning, the first man to be inducted into the United States army under the selective service law, was killed in action in Normandy June 28, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Manning, announced today.

Manning, who was widely publicized as the first inductee when he entered the army in October, 1940, had been overseas only a short time.

His wife, Lt. Daisy Manning, of the army nurses' corps, is stationed at Camp Blanding, Fla.

CLERGYMEN, AUTHORS DECRY MASS SLAYING

New York, July 31.—(U.P.)—Twenty-eight prominent clergymen and authors today made a special plea to all governments for adoption of measures to lessen the mass slaughter of women and children and particularly to end the wanton cruelty of robot plane attacks of London and other English cities.

Earlier in the year the same group protested the American and British policy of "obliteration bombing" and destruction of civilian life of Germany and satellite countries.

Death by Rattler Fails to Impress Revival "Healer"

LaFollette, Tenn., July 31.—(U.P.)—The Rev. O. V. Shoupe, Cumberland, Ky., "faith healer,"

said today he would continue to use rattlesnakes in his ritual for his followers to demonstrate their faith in God, despite the death of one of his laymen.

Johnny Hensley, 30, of Corbin, Ky., took a snake from Shoupe Friday night to show his

faith. Hensley was bitten and died yesterday.

"He died in the faith," Shoupe, who is holding a revival meeting here, declared today. "He didn't want any doctor. Brothers and sisters gathered in and prayed for him and the revival continued during his illness."

Supplies of Food Will Be Plentiful

Washington, July 31.—(U.P.)—The agriculture department reported today that food supplies for civilians this fall and winter will be relatively plentiful, with somewhat smaller amounts of

meats and dairy products, but more fresh fruits, vegetables and cereal products.

The drop in meat supplies, it said, will result from a small reduction in meat output and increased demands by the military forces and other non-civilian claimants.

DR. BAUSCH DIES

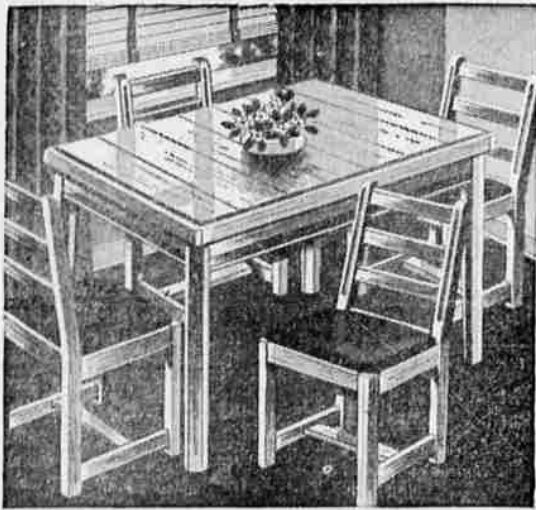
