SHORTAGES PERIL WAR'S PROGRESS

Washington, Aug. 1.—(U.P.)—Shortages in 320 vital categories of war material are threatening to delay victory and increase the toll of lives which victory will cost, Lt. Gen. Brehon Somervell, commander of the army service forces, said today.

In 90 of these categories, Somervell told a press conference, supplies on hand constitute less than 50 per cent of minimum requirements.

Allied battle successes and the increased tempo of advances toward Berlin and Tokyo have stepped up the requirements for weapons, ammunition and transport, while actual production has declined, he said.

He said peak production for the army service forces was reached in November, 1943, amounting to \$2,122,000,000. Production in June fell to \$1,852,000,000. If requirements are to be met, Somervell said, production amounting to \$2,308,000,000 must be reached in October.

Somervell laid the shortages mainly to problems of manpower.

DEMOCRATIC COMMITTEE ELECTS STATE OFFICERS

Henry Aiken of Heppner was elected chairman of the Oregon State Democratic Central committee and Cella Gavin of The Dalles was named vice-president at the committee's organization meeting in the Portland hotel Saturday. Edison Vickers of Willamina was elected treasurer.

Attending the meeting were Moore Hamilton, who returned Sunday and Mrs. Edward C. Kelly, who returned Monday. They were elected state committeeman and committeewoman by their own county organization.

Dewey Terms Gerald Smith Race-Baiting Rabble Rouser

Springfield, Ill., Aug. 1.—(U.P.)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey opened his republican presidential campaign in Illinois today with a charge that Gerald L. K. Smith, America First leader, was a race-baiting rabble rouser comparable to Adolf Hitler and was seeking to "smear" Gov. John W. Bricker, of Ohio, the GOP vice-presidential candidate.

Dewey assailed Smith here in a brief comment on the announcement that the latter's more or less phantom America First party had nominated Smith for president and Bricker for vice-president. The report got Dewey's first and urgent attention when he arrived here at 11:05 a. m., CWT, on a campaign organization swing which took him into Pennsylvania yesterday and will lead him to St. Louis tomorrow.

Like Hitler
At a press conference he read the following statement: "Gerald Smith is one of those rabble rousers who, like Adolf Hitler, makes racial prejudice his stock in trade. This contemptible attempt to associate himself with Gov. Bricker is a sinister effort to smear the republican candidate for vice-president."

The America First party action came after a series of blasts by Smith against Dewey, including a suggestion that he resign the presidential nomination and permit Bricker to take over.

Smith is a former Protestant preacher who joined the forces of the late Huey P. Long in Louisiana and subsequently has been variously attached to the Townsend Old Age Pension movement and in collaboration with the forces of the Rev. Charles E. Coughlin.

He is a powerful orator with the ability to persuade his listeners to drop money—folding money—in the hat after hearing him.

Columbus, Aug. 1.—(U.P.)—Gov. John W. Bricker, republican vice-presidential nominee, said today that the action of the America First group in nominating him as the running mate to Gerald L. K. Smith in Detroit yesterday was "ridiculous."

"I will not accept such a ridiculous offer," Bricker said. "I shall not permit myself to be used in any such connection."

BUILDING PERMITS DECLINE IN JULY

Value of 22 building permits issued by the city inspector in July was \$5,530, a sharp decline from the \$152,835 figure for last year's corresponding month, when many defense houses were constructed.

Nine of last month's permits were for the remodeling of residences costing \$2375, five were for the re-roofing of residences costing \$1400, four were for the remodeling of private garages at a cost of \$505, two were for making additions to businesses at a cost of \$1000 and two were for the construction of private garages costing \$250.
