Your little brochure "Unbidden Guests" is just about the most useful thing of the kind—we have found many effective helps in it for ridding the house of cockroaches, ants and fleas. But there is one pest, a dangerous one, you failed to deal with—the black widow spider.

Po-ko-moo is one name (unknown origin) for the spider otherwise known as black widow, hourglass spider, shoe-button spider, T-dot spider, or, scientifically, Latrodectus mactans.

Distinguishing feature of this spider, whose bite produces painful but rarely fatal poisoning, is the brilliant red or yellow hourglass-shaped patch on the belly of the otherwise shiny black spider.

An hour or two after a person has been bitten by a black widow, nausea, profuse sweating and severe cramps in the belly and in arms and legs begin. At the same time there is a feeling of constriction of the throat and spasm of masseter muscles similar to that of lockjaw (tetanus) so that the victim can speak only with difficulty. Skin becomes hot and moist, blood pressure rises, some fever occurs, there is increased breathing rate and the victim becomes extremely restless and thrashes about screaming with pain. The belly becomes rigid as a board but not tender to pressure. Blood count shows leucocytosis of 25,000 or more (increase in number of white corpuscles above the 8000 or so per cubic millimeter in normal blood).

So there you are. Now what to do? First a shot of morphine with atropine, to relieve or at least moderate the pain, spasm and shock or anxiety. Then intravenous calcium chloride solution—injection into a vein. Effect of this is dramatic—within ten

minutes or less the patient experiences almost complete relief. Of course only a physician can inject this into a vein. In the absence of medical care anybody can give the victim of black widow bite grains given dissolved in half a glassful of water, or better, 15 grains of glucose (which is more agreeable to the stomach) similarly dissolved in sweetened water and repeat this dose every four hours for a day or two, or immediately if cramps and pain return.

Health department investigators in southern California found a 10 per cent solution of an organic thiocyanate in light oil, which they called Lethane, fatal to spiders, especially black widows, when used as a spray in garages, barns or wherever spiders may take up their abode, but comparatively harmless to man and animals.

Saltwater
I notice canned ham and canned tongue contain sodium nitrate. As I use these meats for sandwiches I wonder whether such ingredients are wholesome for working men.

Answer—(Mrs. B. D.)
Nitrate and Chilli saltwater (sodium nitrate) have been used in the brine for pickling or curing meat both in domestic and commercial practice for generations. They are harmless. Amount of nitrate that may form is insignificant.

PILOT OF FIGHTER FINDS ADVENTURE IN CHINA MISSION

Routine Jaunt Develops Battle With Five Jap Planes; Two of Five Shot Down.

A fourteenth Air Force base in China, Aug. 2.—(U.P.)—It was only a routine ferrying mission for Irvin A. Erickson of Oakland, Calif., and seven other fighter pilots flying in formation over China.

Then Erickson's plane fell behind. Its cooling system had broken down and his radio compass and radio went out. By the time Erickson reached base, he had intercepted five Jap dive bombers and shot down two of them; was himself shot down and made a belly landing in a rice paddy where he was strafed by pursuing enemy planes; was beaten by Chinese coolies who mistook him for a Japanese; was rescued by Chinese soldiers.

Returns in Style
Erickson returned to an American base in a sedan chair with a platoon of Chinese soldiers for escort.

The veteran pilot was flying alone when he saw five Jap bombers over their target. "I attacked immediately," said Erickson. "With a long burst directly astern, one Jap burst into flames and fell straight down and crashed on the edge of the town they were bombing."

"Then I closed in on another straggler and made two attacks. Each time, the enemy ship turned, enabling his gunner to get hits on my ship. My third attack apparently killed the pilot because his ship suddenly dove toward the ground and crashed in flames."

Engine Heats
"I could now see only two enemy ships in the air. My engine was overheating, but I managed to close in astern and fired a long burst. But at the same time his gunners got to me and my engine suddenly quit."

Erickson's plane landed in a rice paddy, bounced over a retaining ditch and came to rest in the next paddy. There, he got out of the plane and tried to make his way to a nearby farm house. One enemy plane began diving and strafing, but Erickson escaped injury by burrowing in soft mud.

"Thinking myself safe I approached a farmhouse where I noticed a group of coolies," said Erickson. "They appeared excited but I didn't think much of that. Before I realized their intentions I was struck on the head with a club."

When Erickson came to, he was tied to a post and being beaten about the neck, shoulders and back. One angry coolie arrived with a two-bladed knife used for harvesting rice crops.

Soldiers Save Him
The arrival of Chinese soldiers saved Erickson. They dispersed the muttering mob, opening a few scalps in doing so. "The next morning I was

taken to the headquarters of a Chinese division, and the commanding general treated me as a very welcome guest and apologized for the behavior of the coolies who had mistaken me for a Jap," said Erickson.

He was escorted back to the nearest communication junction the next day.

Before his departure, he was given a letter—in Chinese and English—by the general. The letter confirmed his two "kills" of the Jap bombers. The commander had taken the guns out of the Jap planes and wanted to give them to Erickson as souvenirs. He declined, but took a small motto that one of the Jap pilots had carried, reading: "We Shall Not Fail."

LIFE-RAFT SEARCHLIGHT
Washington.—(U.P.)—Rubber rafts are now equipped with a new midjet searchlight no bigger than a walnut, but capable of projecting a 1500-candlepower beam visible for 60 nautical miles. The new lamp, with the

most powerful beam ever obtained from an incandescent unit that small, gets its current from a hand-cranked generator.

LABOR RENTING RACKET HIT BY FEDERAL ACTION

Washington, Aug. 2.—(U.P.)—A house military affairs subcommittee reported today that the government has gone a long way toward halting a nationwide labor-renting racket which, in one instance, led a war industry to pay \$2,112,583 for services normally worth \$728,974.

"If both government and industry continue their efforts," the report said, "not only can this practice be completely abolished but also untold millions of dollars can be saved to the taxpayers in the consequent reduction of unnecessary costs of war."

The subcommittee first revealed the labor-renting racket in a March 14 report which charged that certain "engineering companies," with the apparent approval of the war and navy departments, rented skilled workers to war plants at rates from \$2.60 to \$12 an hour when the men themselves received from 65 cents to \$2.75 an hour. Traveling and living expenses were often added on.

Today's report said that one Detroit firm paid its employees from 50 cents to \$2.75 an hour base pay and in some instances rented them out "at a flat rate of \$275 to \$350 a week." Under cost-plus-fixed-fee government contracts, the report noted, these charges had to be reimbursed from the public purse.

The television industry, it is predicted, will provide 4,500,000 new jobs within ten years.
