

\$3 BILLION CUT IN WAR SPENDING DUE THIS YEAR

Expected Developments in
Europe May Permit Big
Reduction, Says Chief

Washington, Aug. 3 —(U.P.)—The budget bureau today forecast a reduction of at least \$3,000,000,000 in currently indicated war spending during the present fiscal year on basis of its "hope" that Germany will be knocked out of the war before next summer.

Budget Director Harold D. Smith said war spending now actually was running at an annual rate of \$93,000,000,000, but that expected developments in Europe would permit a decline in the latter part of the

BOIL EXACTLY 2 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, skim. Pour into sterilized glasses, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.

fiscal year that would bring the over-all spending figure for the 12 months ending next June 30 down to \$90,000,000,000.

If German resistance should "collapse earlier than assumed," he said, "expenditures . . . may be somewhat below the \$90,000,000,000 estimate."

War Takes Most

In a revision of the 1945 budget estimate submitted to Congress by President Roosevelt last January, Smith estimated total government expenditures, including those of corporations, at \$99,029,000,000 as compared to the January forecast of \$99,769,000,000. He estimated that war spending would require almost \$90,000,000,000 of the total, the same amount forecast by the president.

"This year's estimates," he said, "are influenced by the hope that the liberation of Europe may be accomplished before the end of the fiscal year 1945, while the Japanese phase of the war is assumed to continue all through that fiscal year and beyond."

The budget director said government receipts were expected to reach a new high of \$45,663,000,800, almost \$5,000,000,000 more than forecast by Mr. Roosevelt. This, together with other improvements in the financial picture, will mean that neither the deficit nor the public debt will assume the proportions estimated by the president in January, he said.

THUNDERSTORMS HIGHLIGHT JULY WEATHER CHART

Thunderstorms were recorded on five days during the July just past, one less than the record of six days in 1935 according to the monthly summary of the weather bureau, Medford airport. Average number of days with thunderstorms for the month is two, records on the storms having been kept since 1927. It was pointed out by Robert D. Church, meteorologist in charge of the station, that only those storms are recorded when the bureau attendants can hear the thunder at the station.

In spite of a 15-day period with temperatures above 90 degrees each day, the month is recorded as somewhat cooler than normal, days averaging about one degree cooler than normal. Highest temperature of the month was 102 degrees on July 17. Temperatures of 108 in July are not uncommon, the records show, and the highest ever recorded was 110 in 1911. Average maximum temperature for July, since 1911, is 90.2 degrees, while average maximum for the month just past was 88.5, the summary shows. Lowest temperature of the month was 44, July 2. Lowest maximum temperature ever recorded for July was 94 degrees in 1940.

During the two-weeks period of high temperatures and thunder storms, two storms of unusual force hit the district, one doing much damage in the Rogue River and Grants Pass areas, and the second striking in the Ashland district.

Precipitation was slightly below normal. Recorded was .17 inches, which is .13 below the average of .30 for the month.

CANNING FACILITY OFFERED WOMEN

Home Demonstration Agent Marian J. Farrell announced today that the management of the Grants Pass Cannery has notified her that they will be able to accommodate a group of Jackson county homemakers who may be interested in canning fruits and vegetables on Monday, August 7. Anyone interested in this project should notify the Jackson County Extension office in the courthouse or phone 3453 by four o'clock Friday afternoon, August 4.

The community cannery fur-

nishes tin cans and all equipment; the homemaker bringing the produce and any sugar or other produce needed in the process. The cost of this service is seven cents per can for fruit and eight cents for vegetables. The cooperators may start preparing their product at 8:00 a.m. and first processing begins at 9:00 a.m. Each person will have to make her own arrangements for transportation.

DIES LISTS 15 WHO QUIT GOVERNMENT TO WORK FOR CIO

Washington, Aug. 3 —(U.P.)—Chairman Martin Dies, D. Texas, of the house special committee to investigate un-American activities, today listed names of 15 former government officials he said left their jobs to become officers in the Congress of Industrial Organizations' political action committee.

Robert E. Stripling, Dies committee chief investigator, said all but one of them—Clark Foreman, former Public Works Administration official—gave up their government jobs this year.

The 15 are among 72 persons included in a report of the Dies committee as subject to investigation by Attorney General Francis Biddle for violating the Hatch act by participating in political activities while in government service.

Among the 15 were: C. B. Baldwin, assistant PAC chairman, former farm security administrator at a salary of \$10,000 a year.

Charlotte Carr, New York state PAC director, formerly a \$6500-a-year employee of the War Manpower Commission.

Amer Lehman, PAC director for Colorado, Wyoming, New Mexico, Utah and Arizona, former \$4600-a-year FSA employee.

Leiss Bronson, PAC Los Angeles office, formerly employed by the library of congress.

Sidney Hillman, PAC chairman, formerly of the office for production management.

Thomas Burns assistant to Hillman in PAC, formerly assistant to Hillman in OPM.

Bt. Falls Mourns Pvt. Robert Kent, Killed in Action

Butte Falls, Ore., Aug. 3—The community was saddened by the death of Pvt. Robert Joseph Kent who was killed in action July 10 in New Guinea.

Pvt. Kent was born March 22, 1925, at Weiser, Ida. He lived most of his life in and around Butte Falls. He graduated from Butte Falls grade school, and entered high school, being a sophomore when he felt it his duty to enlist. He went to Portland to enlist in the navy but was rejected on account of eye trouble. He was accepted in the army on July 8, 1943 and inducted July 27. He was sent to Fort Lewis and from there to Camp Roberts, Calif., where he received a diploma as a rifleman.

In February, 1944, he was transferred to Fort Ord, Calif., and on March 27, 1944, he was sent overseas. He was a member of the 32nd Infantry and as far as known now he was lost in action in New Guinea.

He leaves to mourn his loss his father, mother, two sisters, Mary and Dorothy; also his grandmother, Mrs. Clara Kent, and a host of friends.

A letter from Gen. Douglas MacArthur to the father, Homer Kent, reads as follows:

"In the death of your son, Private Robert J. Kent, you have my heartfelt sympathy. His service was characterized by his devotion to our beloved country and in his death we have lost a gallant comrade in arms."

"Very faithfully,
Douglas MacArthur."

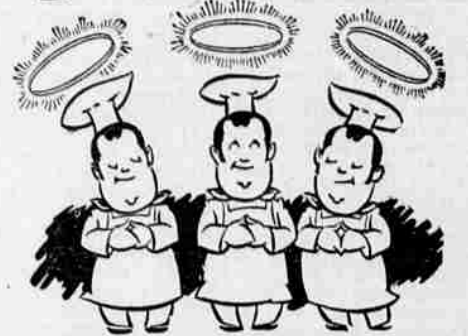
