Ex-Medford Man Is "Voice" In Craterian Disney Film

The return showing of Walt Disney's "Snow White and Seven Dwarfs", ending tomorrow night at the Craterian theatre, has started quite a bit of reminiscing around Medford, especially among those acquainted with Vance Colvig, better known as "Pinto". Pinto, son of Judge and Mrs. William Colvig, formerly of Jacksonville and Medford—Judge Colvig was at one time district attorney of Jackson county—is the "voice" of two of the dwarfs, Grumpy and Sleepy. His talent for expression enlivened many another Disney cartoon. He was formerly the voice of Pluto the pup, Goofy, the halfwit, the Big Bad Wolf, one of the Three Little Pigs, as well as several other characters. He also authored original lyrics for "Who's Afraid of the Big Bad Wolf" and "The World Owe Me a Living." For now years with Disney, Pinto is now free lancing and his talents are heard not only in Disney cartoons but those of other studios as well. As a matter of fact, one never can tell when Pinto's voice will be heard or in what character. A quarter of a century ago, Pinto was playing a clarinet in the Oregon Agricultural college band along with Fred Strang, well known Medford business man. The difference in Pinto's and Fred's playing was that while Fred followed the written music, Pinto was as likely to go tooling off with some wild strange notes never meant to be heard. But it was Pinto's "little clarinet" that started him in Hollywood fame, the resultant notes placing him in demand. Pinto still keeps in touch with his old home town through his sister, Mrs. W. J. Warner, who resides at 519 S. Oakdale.
