A'S BOUNCE BACK
TO WHIP YANKEES
IN DOUBLE BILLMackmen Score 2-1 and
2-0 Victories; Cubs Cop
11th Straight; Bums Win.

New York, Aug. 5.—(U.P.)—The Philadelphia Athletics, first team to fade in the torrid American league pennant race, produced evidence today that they are ready to make a strong comeback, winning a double-header from the New York Yankees for their seventh victory in 10 games.

The A's, putting Manager Connie Mack off to a fine start in his 51st year as a major league manager, got brilliant pitching in both games. Luke Hamlin held the Yankees to six hits in winning the opener 2 to 1, while Russ Christopher bettered that job in the afterpiece with a 2 to 0 shutout in which he gave only five hits.

The double triumph provided the A's with a measure of revenge against the champions for upsetting Mack's anniversary celebration last night, when they scored a 1 to 0 shutout victory with a run in the ninth inning.

17 for Hughson
The Boston Red Sox, getting their usual superb pitching from Cecil (Tex) Hughson, defeated the Senators 6 to 2. Hughson, winning his 17th game, struck out nine men and had a shutout until the eighth, when the Nats made both of their runs. Bobby Doerr fattened his margin as the American league home run leader by hitting his 14th with a man on base in the fourth.

The Chicago Cubs won their 11th straight game in the National league, getting 16 hits to defeat the usually effective Fritz Ostermuller of the Pittsburgh Pirates. 7 to 2. Les Fleming and Claude Passeau gave up 11 hits for the Cubs but were effective with men on bases, 15 Pittsburgh players being stranded.

The Brooklyn Dodgers were extended to 10 innings before beating the Boston Braves, 8 to 7. Luis Olmo tripping to bring in the winning run. The spunky Puerto Rican youngster also tied the score with a single in the eighth, batting in three runs altogether.

BOB FALKENBURG
CAPTURES JUNIOR
NET TITLE AGAIN

Kalamazoo, Mich., Aug. 5.—(U.P.)—Pvt. Bob Falkenburg, of Hollywood, and Herbie (Buddy) Behrens of Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., won the crowns in the 29th Annual National Junior and Boys' Tennis championships at Kalamazoo College today, both by defeating second-seeded contenders in their respective divisions.

It was the second consecutive junior title for the gangling Falkenburg who repeated a 1943 performance on the Grass-tex courts. However, he came close to losing the title by sloppy and erratic play. The Hollywood glamor boy finally trounced Bernard (Tut) Bartzten of San Angelo, Tex., in hard-fought sets, 6-6, 6-4, 6-4, 6-2.

Behrens annexed the boys' division title from second-seeded MacDonald Mathey of Princeton, N. J., 6-2, 6-0.

As an army private on leave from duties at Merced Field, Calif., 18-year-old Falkenburg made up for his lack of practice by playing himself into shape as the week-long tournament progressed. In earlier rounds he was far from the form that gained him the number seven tennis position nationally. However, the lanky star looked increasingly better and by semifinals had again regained the form of a champion.

Falkenburg's final-round play was poor at the start and he allowed Bartzten to jump into a 3-0 lead in the first set. He lost his long rallies, and he was passed consistently at the net. His temper finally got the best of him as he slugged wildly.

However, he returned in the following sets a more collected court star and as play progressed his shots became increasingly more accurate until he had completely mastered the faltering southern southpaw.

FIRST IN STAKES

New York, Aug. 5.—(U.P.)—Jockey George Woolf, the "ice man" of racing disregarded the record-breaking heat at Belmont Park today by booting in the veteran Princequillo in the 42nd running of the \$15,000 added Merchants and Citizens handicap and the two-year-old Star Pavot in the 42nd running of the \$15,000 added United States Hotel stakes.

The crowd of 29,859, out for Saratoga's first 1944 week-end card at Belmont, saw Woolf bring Princequillo, Boone Hall stable's marathon champion of 1943, in front in the main stretch to come home three-quarters of a length ahead of Ramillies. The four-year-old negotiated the mile and three-sixteenths in the Merchants and Citizens in 1:56 1/5. His backers were rewarded with \$8, \$4.40 and \$2.

HITLER PREPARES
NEW ARMY PURGE

London, Aug. 4.—(U.P.)—Adolf Hitler tonight appeared preparing for a new and ruthless intensification of his army purge in a desperate effort to smash all opposition by German generals as the Reich's military plight becomes increasingly serious.

According to German radio reports, the death trials by the dreaded peoples' courts of the officers accused of taking part in the bomb plot against Hitler will begin in the near future, and death sentences are regarded as a foregone conclusion.

The terms of last night's announcement of the "honor court" indicated that further names probably will be added to the list which already is known to extend through all ranks of the German officers corps — from field marshals to lieutenants.

2,000 AMERICAN
PLANES HAMMER
GERMAN TARGETS

Hannover Area Blasted By
Heavies — Italy-Based
Fighters Hit Romania.

Allied Supreme Headquarters, London, Aug. 5.—(U.P.)—Nearly 2,000 U. S. 8th Air Force warplanes attacked numerous targets in northwestern Germany today in one of the most widespread daylight attacks of the war, as Italy-based American fighters were revealed to have shot up Nazi airfields and communications in Romania in another shuttle flight to Russia.

While 1,100 Liberators and Fortresses, escorted by 500 to 750 Fighters, were slashing at least 12 targets in a great circle around the German rail center of Hannover, hundreds of other fighters and bombers flying from Britain and France ripped Nazi communications and supply depots along the western front.

Land in Russia
A dispatch from the new U. S. eastern air command in Russia meanwhile revealed that Lightning Fighter-bombers of the U. S. 15th air force and Mustang Fighter-bombers flew from Italy Friday, strafed the Nazi airfield at Focșani, in Romania 60 miles northwest of Galati, and undisclosed communication targets, and then flew on to Russia. It was announced that 13 bombers and six fighters were lost in the 8th Air Force attacks on Germany but that they met several groups of enemy planes 25 to 30 strong, including some jet-propelled planes.

The weather was excellent and the American bombardiers heaped perhaps 2,750 tons of bombs on their targets. A late headquarters bulletin announced that the heavyweights made

their final attacks of the war on an oil refinery at Dollbergen, 18 miles east of Hannover; the underground oil storage depot at Nienburg, 33 miles northwest of Hannover; and a tank and armaments works, at Bachau, near Magdeburg.

BULGARIA REFUSES
GERMANY PASSAGE

London, Sunday, Aug. 6.—(U.P.)—A delayed dispatch from Ankara, Turkey, said today that Bulgaria reportedly had refused permission for German troops to cross Bulgaria in the event of war between Germany and Turkey.

United Press Staff Correspondent Leon Kay, in a dispatch filed in Ankara Friday afternoon, said diplomatic quarters in the Turkish capital reported that Bulgaria's decision was transmitted to the Nazi ambassador in Sofia Thursday.

The Bulgarian note, stating that the Bulgars "would not wish" to see German troops traversing their territory for an attack on Turkey, was said to have been delivered following an eight-hour meeting of the cabinet.
