Miss Ellenburg is an instrument technician, specializing in the testing and overhauling of gyroscopic instruments on bombers and other planes. She has been employed by the army air service command at Spokane since August of 1942, receiving a release to accept the overseas appointment for the duration of the war.

Before entering the air service employment, Miss Ellenburg was with Gates & Lydiard as a cashier and bookkeeper.
