Mexican "Jap" Is Taken From Center For Army Induction

Manzanar, Cal., Aug. 5.—(U.P.)—The strange case of a Los Angeles youth of Mexican parentage who passed himself off as a Japanese-American for two years was revealed today with the announcement he would be released from the Manzanar Japanese relocation center for induction into the army.

The youth is Ralph Lazo, 19, the son of a navy veteran of World War I.

Lazo, who registered as an American born Japanese in May, 1942, and was sent to Manzanar, has been out of the center only twice. In December 1943, he returned to Los Angeles to appear before his draft board and early this month he represented the Manzanar Y.M.C.A. at a Hi-Y conference in Estes Park, Colo.

He gave as his reason for registering as Japanese parentage: "My Japanese-American friends at high school were ordered to evacuate the west coast, so I decided to go along with them. Who can say I haven't got Japanese blood in me? Who knows what kind of blood run in my veins?"

"My enemies are taking advantage of my candidacy for public office," the fighting preacher of the Free Methodist church announced, "to discredit the sincerity of my campaign against gambling and vice."

"They say I am seeking publicity to further my political ambitions, so I am publicly

withdrawing from the campaign."

VITAL POSTWAR ROLE FORESEEN FOR RURAL U. S.

Country Areas Must Provide Food, Market for Industrial Products

Milwaukee —(U.P.)— Those whose conception of rural America is symbolized in the term "country hick" have overlooked the important role farming areas of the nation must perform after the war, in the opinion of educational and agricultural leaders who spoke here recently.

"The communities of rural America have a tremendous task in the turbulent years ahead," Prof. Frank W. Cyr, in charge of rural education, Teachers College, Columbia University, New York, told the recent Midwest conference of the American Farm Bureau Federation. He named five objectives of rural communities, as follows:

1. To build in themselves a strong, healthy, wholesome, satisfying way of life.

2. To provide food, fiber and some of the raw products for industry.

3. To provide a market for the products of industry.

4. To supply the cities with a continuous stream of new blood.

5. To act as a social stabilizer to our national life.

Must Master Machines
"The flood of modern machines released in the next few years when industry directs itself to peacetime work can be used to build the finest kind of community life the world has yet seen," Prof. Cyr asserted.

"Or it can just as definitely destroy rural communities," he warned, "as the weapons of warfare are doing now. Our citizens must be trained to direct the use of the machine."

Higher farm incomes are essential, too, Prof. Cyr pointed out, but he added the warning that higher incomes in themselves would not be sufficient to insure better rural communities "unless the people are trained to use that income to this end."

He said it was the task of rural education to teach its pupils how to solve their problems by offering courses which grow out of and enrich human life under a sound school district organization which will serve rural America today as effectively as pioneer school districts served the pioneer age.

He suggested some special methods to carry effectively education to small communities. Among these were use of circuit teachers, supervised correspondence study, pupil transportation, and mobile units which carry libraries, health services and machine shops from school to school. Prof. Cyr also condemned artificiality in the present organization of rural education and recommended that this situation be remedied by restoring the rural citizen to his former respectable status as a contributor in determining school policies.

Rest With Laymen
"Teachers are trained, textbooks written, educational laws are made and national policies worked out all on a state, regional or nation-wide basis," Prof. Cyr pointed out. "Usually these matters are largely decided by professional educators. They should be decided by laymen, with the help and advice of educators. We must find some way that educators and agricultural leaders working together on a nation-wide basis and in each region and state will develop educational policies for building the kind of public schools rural America needs."

"With properly trained citizens and with the fruits of modern technology rural America can become the finest place to live the world has yet seen."

Edward A. O'Neal, national president of the farm bureau federation, also foresaw a vital postwar role for rural America. "At the end of the war, our country must chart a course for the future," he said. "That course can lead to an age of peace and plenty and happiness for the people, or it can lead to an age of dissension and division, poverty and bankruptcy, the stifling of trade and intercourse with other nations, and finally another war. Farm people need to study the issues in order to fulfill the obligations which rest upon them. The leaders must assume the responsibility of creating among farmers public opinion that is informed and resolute."
