Maternity Dresses Added To Garments Under Price Roof

Washington, Aug. 8.—(U.P.)—Maternity dresses and slips today were added to the list of garments in the government's new dollar and cents pricing program for increasing supplies of low-priced garments.

Price Administrator Chester Bowles said the dresses would retail for \$1.89 each and the slips for \$1.05 each in stores which buy directly from manufacturers. In other types of stores the dresses will have a retail ceiling of \$2 and the slips \$1.15. Dress sizes will range from 12 to 20 and slips from size 32 to 44.

These garments will be manufactured under War Production Board specifications as part of the drive to get manufacturers to return to the low-price field.

Bandleader Held For Grand Jury As Draft Evader

New York, Aug. 8.—(U.P.)—Bandleader Teddy Powell, favorite of the hobby-sox brigade, was held in \$3000 bail by U. S. Commissioner Garrett W. Cotter today for grand jury action on a draft evasion charge, although he is 4F.

Powell, composer of "Boots and Saddles" and "Bewildered," was arrested in Detroit July 13 and extradited to New York on FBI charges that he conspired with a clerk of local board 20 to avoid induction. He was subsequently rejected by the army.

Assistant U. S. District Attorney James B. McNally said Powell, whose real name is Alfred Paolletta, gave John E. Wilson, clerk for draft board 20, a case of whiskey and an expensive hat at Christmas, 1942, just prior to Powell's scheduled induction.

Old Waldo Mine Is Reported Sold

Grants Pass, Aug. 8.—The Illinois alley News reports the sale this week of the famous Esterly mine at the Old Waldo mining town to R. F. Oliphant and associates. It was owned formerly by G. W. Hale, of Chicago.

Rich in gold and platinum the property was reputed to have produced half of the platinum mined in the United States a few years ago and was for years the second largest producing mine in this area.

It is reported that operations will be resumed as soon as arrangements can be made. The mine has not been operating for about two years.

CANNED FRUIT PRICE SUPPORT ANNOUNCED

Washington, Aug. 8.—(U.P.)—The War Food Administration announced today a price support program for all apricots, peaches, pears, fruit cocktail, and fruit mix canned in 1944. The agency said that in order to prevent price declines for these products processors will be guaranteed 86.4 per cent of canners' individual gross civilian ceiling prices or 86.4 per cent of area average ceiling prices, whichever are lower.

SKINNER AND EDDY BUY ALASKA S.S. CO. SHARES

Seattle, Aug. 8.—(U.P.)—The Skinner and Eddy Corp. of Seattle today acquired all the capital stock of the Alaska Steamship Co. from the Kennecott Copper Corp. of New York City, thus bringing entire control of the pioneer line to the Pacific Northwest.

The amount involved was not disclosed, but prewar estimates of the properties approximated \$10,000,000.
