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WHAT I DON'T KNOW ABOUT TEETH

An obscure dentist sends me pages torn from a throw-away publication, containing a characteristically scurrilous attack on me and my teachings. The mincing little man suggests that I should attend a dental school for, say a year before I try to teach the public about the care of the teeth.

Don't misunderstand me. I concede there are a few things, quite a few, that I don't know about dentistry. In fact I imagine it would be easier to mention the things I do know about dentistry. One thing I do know is that the science of dentistry is far, far behind the art, so far as the rank and file are concerned. I mean that you would do well to temper your admiration for the technical skill of the dentist in designing, constructing and installing inlays, crowns, bridges and the like with due consideration for his shortcomings as a doctor.

This is no petty quibble. As an illustration of the medical shortcomings of the average dentist there is the case of the girl (aged 27) whose plight was described in the talk here the other day entitled "Conspiracy Against Happiness." She had a lot of trouble with her teeth, spent a great deal of money on them, but her family dentist had been able to save most of them for her. Now there was what I call a good dentist. She married, moved down to another city, became pregnant, had more trouble with her teeth. The new dentist, having filled a few teeth, evidently wanted to go fishing or something, for next thing she knew he had persuaded the poor girl to let him extract five teeth. Now there was what I call a can't print the right word for it.

But that is just warming up for the crime to follow. With the loss of the five teeth the unfortunate young woman of course began to age rapidly, as must any one who has but seven teeth, all front teeth,

left to chew with. As soon as she was old enough so that she could no longer put up a fight in self defense, the wretched dentist and the stingy husband urged her to have ALL of her remaining teeth extracted, as that would require only one or two visits to the dentist and save the husband the extra carfare etc.

Don't think I'm exaggerating the enormity of this crime of depriving unwary customers of all their teeth. It is a shameful and scandalous kind of malpractice and those responsible for it, whether they be dentists, doctors or laymen ought to be made to suffer the penalty.

And the layman, particularly the wisecracking layman, needs to wake from nineteenth century nap and get some modern ideas into his head, concerning the value of each and every tooth dentistry can possibly save, in building and maintaining health, vite, happiness, longevity.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

No Change

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that on the 27th day of July, 1944, 21 Jars of the above-mentioned Apple Butter, more particularly described as "Catalina Brand Pure Apple Butter California Preserving Co., Los Angeles, Calif., Net Contents 1 lb. 12 oz." were arrested and taken into the possession of and now are in the possession of the United States Marshal for the District of Oregon, pursuant to a warrant and process duly issued by the Clerk of the United States District Court for the District of Oregon, in a suit for condemnation and forfeiture entitled, "United States of America, Libellant, vs. 11 Cases, more or less, each containing 12 jars of APPLE BUTTER," brought under the provisions of Section 334, Title 21, U.S.C.A., wherein it is sought to have the above-described article of food condemned and forfeited for the following reasons: That on or about January 18, 24, 1944, California Preserving Company did sell, ship and consign

from Los Angeles, California, in interstate commerce to Medford, Oregon, the said 11 Cases, more or less, each containing 12 jars of Catalina Brand Pure Apple Butter; that the said Apple Butter is adulterated within the purview of Title 21, Section 342(b)(2) U.S.C.A., in that an apple product insufficiently concentrated by heat has been substituted wholly in part for the Apple Butter, a food for which a definition and standard of identity has been prescribed by regulations promulgated pursuant to Title 21, Section 341, U.S.C.A.; that the said article of food is misbranded within the purview of Title 21, Section 343(a), U.S.C.A., in that the name of the article "Apple Butter" is false and misleading as applied to a product which fails to conform to the definition and standard of identity for Apple Butter; and, is further misbranded under Title 21, Section 343(g)(1), U.S.C.A., in that it purports to be and is represented as Apple Butter, a food for which a definition and standard of identity has been prescribed by regulations promulgated pursuant to Section 341, Title 21, U.S.C.A., and it fails to conform to such definition and standard, since the soluble solids content of the finished article is less than 43 percent, whereas such definition and standard prescribes that the soluble solids content of finished Apple Butter is not less than 43 percent, determined by the method in such regulations prescribed; that all persons claiming any right, title or interest in and to the said article of food are hereby notified to appear on or before the 5th day of September, 1944, in the Federal Court at Portland, Oregon, to show cause, if any there be, why the same should not be decreed against and forfeited to the United States as adulterated and misbranded food. UNIONS MOBILIZE FOR PRESIDENTIAL CAMPAIGN EFFORT

CIO Committed to Roosevelt
—AFL Council May Condemn Some F.R. Policies.

Washington, Aug. 8.—(U.P.)—Labor union leaders are mobilizing their 13,875,000 members for what they regard as labor's most important Presidential campaign.

The union membership, which is 26 per cent of the nation's total labor force and equal to 27 per cent of the total 1940 vote for president, is composed of 7,000,000 in the American Federation of Labor, 5,500,000 in the Congress of Industrial Organizations, 600,000 in the United Mine Workers, 400,000 in the five independent railway brotherhoods, and 375,000 in independent unions.

The CIO, through its political action committees, has already endorsed President Roosevelt and Sen. Harry S. Truman, the democratic nominees. The committees are raising funds to assure their election.

The executive council of the AFL, which is adhering to its traditional policy of not endorsing candidates in a national election, is scheduled to hold its quarterly meeting in Chicago beginning Aug. 21 and may adopt resolutions condemning some administration labor policies. The council is free to speak its mind, though it cannot commit the AFL.

An AFL spokesman said that the council, composed of President William Green, the secretary-treasurer and 13 vice-presidents, will discuss the policies in executive sessions expected to last 10 days. Most of the meeting will be devoted to assembling the report for presentation to the annual AFL convention in New Orleans in November.

John L. Lewis, UMW president, is expected to announce his campaign position at the annual UMW convention opening in Cincinnati Sept. 12. Representatives of the mine leader, whose hostility to the Roosevelt administration is no secret, were understood to have received "very satisfactory" treatment of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, the Republican presidential nominee, at conferences in Pittsburgh a week ago.

A UMW spokesman, discussing political trends among miners in the past two years, said there has been a drift to the Republican ticket in local elections in West Virginia, Kentucky, eastern Tennessee and Pennsylvania.

The Railway Labor Executives' association, which endorsed Gov. Homer Atkins of Arkansas for a senatorial seat at their meeting here last week, refrained from making an endorsement of the top national candidates in accordance with long-established custom.

Other independent unions, biggest of which is the telephone workers, according to department of labor records, vary in their practice as to endorsement of presidential candidates.

George Peckham At Preflight School Continues Singing

Friends of George Peckham, former Medford resident now a warrant officer in the air corps and stationed at San Antonio, Tex., at the pre-flight school of the army air force aviation cadet center, will be interested to hear that he is continuing his musical activities at the Texas center. Officer Peckham, a bass singer, was identified with many musical groups and activities when he resided here and is well known.

Writing recently to friends here, he said, "They keep me busy singing here and I do about all I can of it. It keeps me warm-

ed up. Today I broke my record for services when I sang for seven different chapel services between 8 and 12 noon. Tomorrow I am doing a little show, as you can see by the poster. The man accompanying me is from the Metropolitan Opera concert bureau and had toured all over the Pacific northwest. He was in Medford with the boy, Barre Hill, some years ago and likes the place and the people. I feel very fortunate to have met him and to have him accompany me."

The accompanist referred to is Pvt. Rafael Mertis. The young man left here about five years ago, going to Seattle where he did radio work of various natures and sang from time to time over NBC networks. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Peckham, Sr., of 219 Beatty street.

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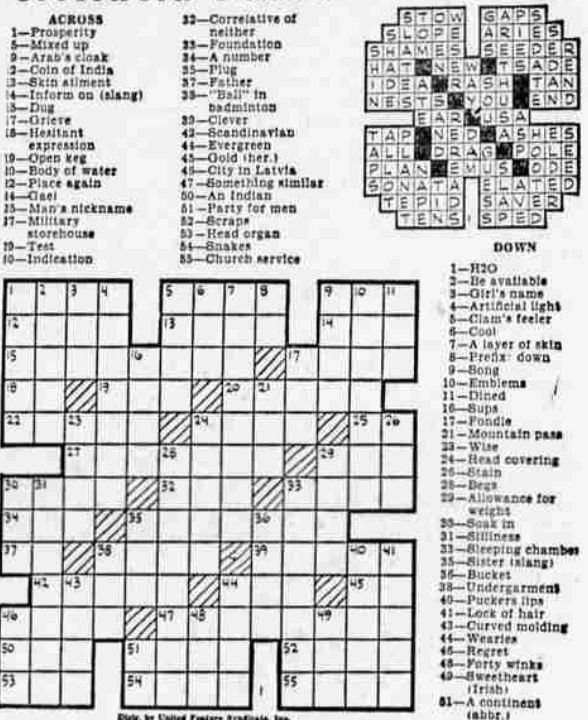
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Crossword Puzzle
