

GENERAL BOR OF POLISH PATRIOTS DRAMATIC FIGURE

Leader of Underground Battle for Liberation Known Only to Few Army Heads

(Here is everything military security will permit to be told about the dramatic General Bor, commander of a Polish underground army now battling the Germans inside Warsaw. John A. Parris of the United Press, whose beat in London is the underground, has obtained these facts about Bor from his closest Polish collaborators.)

London, Aug. 9—(U.P.)—The battle for the liberation of Warsaw began a few minutes after the Polish capital surrendered in 1939.

A two-star general changed his uniform for civilian clothes and gathered about him a small group of patriots. They went underground.

As his fellow Polish staff officers fled south into exile, the man who today is directing Warsaw's dramatic fight, sat in a room of the Europejski hotel overlooking Pilsudski Square, where rows of Hitler's blitzkrieg armor were drawn up, organizing a new Polish army which

trolled by his guerrillas. But with the start of the Warsaw campaign, he moved into the capital and into a cavern which had been one of his secret hide-aways. Here he directs the battle of Warsaw.

A Polish underground courier, formerly a staff officer in Bor's headquarters, said the hideaway is so well hidden the Germans will never find it.

It is only a small place with rough walls covered with maps showing where various Polish divisions and regiments are operating. Tiny red flags mark spots and areas. There is a similar map in Polish secret headquarters here in London which is altered from day to day on information from Bor detailing the distribution of his forces.

Couriers Used
Bor uses couriers extensively to maintain contact with his forces in the field and contact with his commanders in the Warsaw fighting.

A Polish military authority here said Bor also maintains close contact with Russian commanders whose armies are approaching Warsaw.

On occasions, Bor personally slips through German lines to visit his units.

His messages to his commanders are given orally to couriers as a safeguard against information falling into the hands of the Germans.

Two or three times daily, Bor sees that the population of Warsaw knows of the progress his troops are making by the use of loudspeakers set up in various parts of the city and also through the underground press, which distributed newspapers and special communiques.

COMMISSARY AT CAMP WHITE TO BAR OUTSIDERS

Camp White—Authorized patrons of the sales commissary store at Camp White who live in or near Medford were advised today by Captain Folkey L. Johnson, sales officer at Camp White, that the Sales store will be closed to individual purchasers after Monday, August 14.

The store has more than 500 authorized purchasers, many of whom live in the Medford area, Captain Johnson said. Announcement of the closing is made to save these persons from unnecessary trips to Camp White.

The sales store opened in November 1942, and since that date has recorded more than \$150,000 in sales of groceries to individual purchasers, Captain Johnson said.

In recent months sales have fallen off as personnel at this post has been reduced. In June 1943 individual purchases were \$12,250, but last month were only \$4,000.

Persons authorized to make purchases at the Sales store have included dependents of naval, marine corps and coast guard personnel as well as dependents of army personnel.

APOPLEXY, HEART ILLS LEAD COUNTY DEATHS
Of the 36 persons whose deaths were recorded in Jackson county during June, 1944, seven died of apoplexy and six of heart disease, according to a bulletin from the Oregon Health association.

Claiming lesser numbers of victims were cancer and tumors, five; nephritis, four; digestive diseases, three; accidents, other than motor accidents, three, and

tuberculosis, influenza and sulicide, one each. Five died of other known causes.

aggregate of more than 17 pounds—six pounds one ounce, five pounds 15 3/4 ounces, and four pounds 15 3/4 ounces. The mother and daughters are doing well.
