PILUSO EXPECTED TO GIVE KATONEN TOUGH MAT TEST

Tony Morelli and Jack Lipscomb Meet In Other Main Event Thursday Night

Popular Ernie Piluso, who made a futile attempt to wrest the Pacific Coast light-heavyweight grappling championship from Paavo Katonen in Portland Monday night, will get another crack at the big Finnish matman here Thursday night in one half of a double main event.

And, while the match is of the non-title variety, the flashy Italian is expected to operate in the same fashion he would if the bout were for the coveted belt. In short, Piluso will bend every effort to nab a victory from the crown-wearer.

Piluso put up a great scrap against Katonen in the title contest in Portland. He took one fall, with his favorite headlock and press, but was finally worn down by his more powerful opponent and lost the third and deciding tumble when he was slammed to the mat.

Clean Bout

The match will be a sparkling exhibition of clean and fancy wrestling, as both adhere to legitimate matwork. Katonen is the bigger and stronger, but Piluso is the faster. Both know all the scientific answers.

The other half of the double main will find two of the ring's most unorthodox characters making life miserable for each other. They are Tony Morelli and Jack Lipscomb, both of them mean men who would rather tear off an arm or a leg for a fall than obtain it by legitimate tactics.

Herb Parks, Canadian light-heavyweight champion, and Tex Porter will stage a clean match in the opener.

A coin will be flipped to determine which of the two main events goes on first.

FINGERPRINTS AND PHOTOS OF FELONS FILED AT CAPITOL

State Bureau of Identification Lists Thousands of Fingerprints and Photos

Salem, Ore., Aug. 9.—(U.P.)—There are more than 280,000 fingerprints and more than 100,000 photographs, most of them of known lawbreakers, on file in the Oregon state capital buildings with the State Bureau of Identification, an agency of the state police.

Created as a separate bureau by act of legislature in 1941, after ten years of struggling along with one man in charge, using prisoner labor at the penitentiary, it now has a staff of experts and assistants, and is housed on the fourth floor of the building, in the same suite as the police offices.

More than 21,000 prints come into the bureau each year, according to George Kan, director. The prints of nearly every known criminal in the northwest are in the files, and prints are exchanged with a great many law enforcing agencies, including the Federal Bureau of Investigation and with states as far away as Michigan.

Filing Efficient

Main feature of the organization of the bureau is the filing system which has been worked out, and which permits ready identification of thousands of criminals. The files are card indexed, and cross indexed, and are indexed by a man can be traced by his fingerprints, or by his last name, or his first name, or even by his nickname.

The majority of the finding of criminal records of persons arrested in various parts of the state or by agencies outside of the state. The arresting officers send the prints and name and whatever other information they have to the bureau, which then checks the man and sends whatever information they have to the originating office.

Descriptions of criminals are on file, along with the fingerprints. The name of the man, his aliases, his height, coloring and age are all available in the complex system of files.

Perhaps the second most important job of the bureau is the tracing of "latent fingerprints," those which are discovered at the scene of a crime. There is a well worked out system for that, too, as the prints are filed according to type and each characteristic can be traced down.

Fascinating Study

The study of fingerprints in itself is fascinating to the layman. Kan explained the well-known principle that no two persons have fingerprints exactly alike, but further said that out of the 20 billion-odd fingers in the world, there are no two prints alike. One of the major achievements of the bureau was the identification of a kidnapped baby last year, who was stolen from the Albany hospital one day after she was born. That particular type of identification, which used the footprints of the child, is an unique case, at least on the Pacific coast, Kan said.

Even in the case of identical

twins, there may be great disparity, as he said, there is in the case of his own children, identical twins. On the other hand, he has on file the prints of another set of twins, and while the prints are not identical, they are more nearly so than any other prints he has ever seen.

Only the very smallest portion of the print is necessary to make a positive identification, he said.
