EXTREMES IN MAT TECHNIQUE SLATED FOR CARD TONIGHT

Katonen-Pilusso Clash Offset
By Brawl Between Morelli
and Lipscomb.

Grappling fans will witness in the armory tonight two main events whose participants represent just about the extreme in mat techniques.

Displaying their scientific talent in one half of the twin top battles will be Paavo Katonen, Pacific coast light-heavyweight champion and Ernie Pilusso, the sensationally-fast Italian from Portland.

Pounding each other from pillar to post in the other feature struggle will be Tony Morelli the ferocious Floridan and Jack Lipscomb, the Muncie, Ind. mauler.

Both clashes will be for one hour or the best two out of three falls, with the flip of a coin determining which match is staged first.

The card will be completed with Herb Parks, the popular light-heavyweight champion of Canada, meeting Tex Porter, another clean operator. They will meet in the three-round opener at 8:30 sharp.

While both main events are drawing almost equal interest from regular armory customers, it is expected that the Morelli-Lipscomb embroglio will "steal the show." Both gents are big, tough and uncouth as all get out and their brawl is figured to be one of the most rugged to be staged here this year.

DREAM REALIZED WHEN HORSE WINS

Goshen, N. Y., Aug. 10.—(U.P.)—A dream of a quarter of a century was realized today for Arch L. Derby, wealthy Wichita, Kans., oilman, as he saw the name of his fleet filly Yankee Maid written into the record books as winner of the Hambletonian trotting classic.

For 25 years, Derby had hoped to send a horse out to win the richest prize in harness racing, but never had he bred one worthy enough for a shot at the corn-tassel classic. Never, until yesterday, in which his first entry in the blue ribbon event showed a clean set of heels to 10 other top three-year-olds and carried off top money of \$18,467 with a straight heat triumph.

The Kentucky-foaled and Kansas-bred Yankee Maid came from behind to win the first one-mile heat in 2:05 and then, under a front running drive by Henry Thomas of Lexington, Ky., she walked off with the second heat and the Hambletonian in 2:05. It made her the first filly to score in the race since Thomas won with Shirley Hanover in 1937 and was his third driving victory in the event.

BROWNIES STAVE OFF NEW YORK WITH 3 TO 2 WIN

New York, Aug. 10.—(U.P.)—The last ditch campaign of the New York Yankees to "break up the St. Louis Browns" was off to a very shaky start today.

Yankee Stadium fans, accustomed for years to seeing games decided by homers got in on a typical finish in the ninth inning yesterday, but this time it was the "Brown Bombers" and not the "Bronx Bombers" who were the victors, 3 to 2.

It was 2-all when Al Zarilla delivered the winning wallop off Yankee Ace Hank Borowy. The homer gave the Missourians their ninth straight triumph, equalling their string at the start of the season, and enabling them to stay six and a half games ahead of the second place Boston Red Sox.

Sig Jakucki, who relieved Starter Bob Muncieff in the two final innings, received credit for his 10th victory, while Borowy was tagged with his seventh defeat and his second in a row at the hands of the Browns.

Manager Luke Sewell of the Browns was elated over the "psychological advantage" of the victory in the important series, which marks the start of the team's final eastern road trip.

"I'm happy about the spot we're in now," he said. "There isn't any pressure on us. It is all on the other clubs. We can lose a couple or more here and still be all right. The Yankees and the Red Sox have to win to stay with us."

The Red Sox did win yesterday, trouncing the Chicago White Sox at Boston 9 to 1, but it was the valedictory victory for navy-bound Cecil (Tex) Hughson, making it problematical how often they will win from now on.

The Washington Senators lost their 12th game in 15 starts to the Detroit Tigers, 4 to 2, in an unsuccessful opening of their home stand.

Manager Lou Boudreau paced the Cleveland Indians' 12-hit attack in a 4 to 3 victory over the Athletics at Philadelphia, getting two singles and a double.

The Brooklyn Dodgers, who failed to win a game on their last western trip, started the current one at Chicago with a 5 to 2 victory, ending a string of nine straight losses to the Cubs. Luis Olmo started Pitcher Curt Davis off to an early lead with a two-run homer.

Boston got an 8 to 0 lead over the Reds at Cincinnati, then coasted to a 9 to 6 victory.

Harry Brecheen pitched a six-inning no-hitter but wound up by not even getting the victory in the Cardinals' 4 to 2 triumph over Philadelphia at St. Louis.

The Pirates defeated the New York Giants 4 to 3 at Pittsburgh.

Sixty-two professionals have signed for the tournament, including Ralph Guldahl, Harry Cooper, Denny Shute, Tony Manero, Toney Penna, Jimmy Hines, Ellsworth Vines, Bob Hamilton, Joe Turnesa, Ernie Ball and Pvt. Buck White.

Chick Evans, Harold Foreman and Jim Frisina are among the 82 amateurs entered. Two pros, Lt. Patty Berg of the marines and Betty Hicks are included in the 12 women entrants.

JACK CHASE HELD TO
DRAW BY TIGER WADE
Oakland, Cal., Aug. 10.—(U.P.)—Jack Chase, Denver middleweight who twice had defeated Little Tiger Wade of San Francisco, was held to a 10-round draw in their third meeting last night.

Ringsiders disagreed with Referee Billy Burke's decision giving Wade a draw after a last-minute spurt. Chase outboxed his opponent, but Wade forced much of the fighting.

GERMAIN, RUCKER PAGE FIELD IN WOMEN'S WESTERN

Lake Forest, Ill., Aug. 10.—

(U.P.)—Led by a confident, hard-hitting champion, Dorothy Germain of Philadelphia, and a slow moving, methodical challenger, Betty Jean Rucker of Spokane, Wash., the women's western amateur golf tournament moved into the quarter-finals today with shooting technique on the upswing.

The Germain-Rucker match tops the billings today, and the 20-year-old Washington girl looms large as the biggest hurdle in Dorothy's bid for her second straight crown, a trick turned by only five other golfers in the 44-year history of this western feature.

After a general round of bulky scores during opening play Tuesday, the field settled down to mostly par golf yesterday, high-lighted by the blistering incomplete round of Miss Rucker, a tall, powerfully-built junior from Stanford university.

Playing Ruth More, Peoria, Ill., Betty Jean fired a two-under-par 36 on the first nine yesterday bunching four par holes, two birdies and an eagle. Gaining momentum at the turn she grouped four birdies around

a bogie on the back nine, winning her quarter-finals berth on the 13th. Unaware that a course record was in the offing, Miss Rucker broke for the clubhouse instead of finishing the round because it was "so hot."

LAYDEN SCOFFS AT RIVAL LOOPS

Philadelphia, Aug. 10.—(U.P.)—Commissioner Elmer Layden, of the National football league, visited Philadelphia yesterday on his annual inspection tour of affiliated cities and scoffed at reports that the league was concerned over possible player

raids by rival gridiron circuits. Layden said he had received no official report that other leagues were trying to obtain National league stars, but added he was prepared to invoke the rules. The organization of such new loops as the U. S. Football association, the American Football league and the Pacific Coast conference would make football more popular "and help us all," Layden said.
