

HARD WORK NEED IS RECOGNIZED BY GOP CHAIRMAN

Albany, Aug. 11—(U.P.)—Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, republican presidential candidate, and GOP National Chairman Herbert Brownell, Jr., today plotted the next move in their campaign to put the GOP back in the White House.

Fresh from conferences with republican leaders of 11 mid-western states, Brownell said he carried an optimistic report. He told the governor, however, that "plenty of hard work" has to be done between now and November and party followers are ready for action.

Brownell was an overnight guest at the state executive mansion and he and Dewey talked until after midnight in the big study. One of the principal topics, it was reported, was President Roosevelt's inspection trip to Honolulu.

On his last visit to Albany, Brownell charged that Mr. Roosevelt was the first of 32 presidents to claim that the title of commander-in-chief made him a soldier and that he was using the title to "perpetuate himself in public office." At that time, Dewey heard reports the President would deliver his speech accepting the democratic

nomination from foreign shores and he said if Mr. Roosevelt did, "I might have something to say about it."

BONG FINISHES TARGET LESSON

Matagorda Island, Tex., Aug. 11—(U.P.)—Maj. Richard Bong, the Pacific war's top ace, was en route to California today, ready to meet more Japs, after completing a course in deflection gunnery at the Matagorda school.

Bong, who has shot down 27 Japanese planes, said he could have had more if his deflection fire had been better.

His future assignment was not disclosed. Matagorda school graduates customarily are made air corps instructors or are returned to their combat units.

Waiter Obsessed By Strange Desire To Run Backward

Seattle, Aug. 11—(U.P.)—Psychiatrists today puzzled over the case of a 40-year-old transient waiter, John Bollinger, 40, held by authorities after three unsuccessful attempts to commit suicide because he "couldn't stop running backwards."

Bollinger was taken into custody today after he had eaten two boxes of headache tablets, recovered, and then slashed his own throat in eight places. Previously, on July 10, he had taken a job as a waiter so that he could "get hold of a large butcher knife."

He worked for several hours and then plunged the blade into his stomach, piercing the liver. He recovered after treatment.

Bollinger told police that his suicide attempts were all because his thoughts frequently were "mixed up" and he found himself running backward, away from places he wanted to go.

Stockton, Cal., Aug. 11—(U.P.)—A few of the 500 German war prisoners who went on a sit down strike three days ago protesting a new nine-hour day at Stockton Army Ordnance depot have agreed to return to work, but the army continued to confine to quarters the entire group of 1800 prisoners at the depot.

Maj. Arthur E. Cook, public relations officer at the depot, said there had been no disturbance or outbreak among the former members of Gen. Erwin Rommel's vaunted Afrika Korps. They were kept on short rations, Cook said.

Under terms of the Geneva convention war prisoners who volunteer to work may be employed up to 12 hours per day.
