RELIGIOUS EDITOR TO BE SPEAKER AT FIRST METHODIST

Dr. Louis C. Kirby, pastor of the First Methodist church, has invited Ernest W. Peterson,

Portland Journal religious editor and nationally prominent Methodist layman, to occupy his pulpit at the 11 o'clock service

on Sunday. Peterson will speak on "Methodism Faces the Future."

Mr. Peterson recently was one of two laymen to represent Oregon Methodists at the denomination's general conference. He also represented Oregon at the Western Jurisdictional conference in Salt Lake City. At this gathering he was elected chairman of a council for the next four years to set up a post-war program for the Methodist church in ten western states, Hawaii and Alaska.

Mr. Peterson visited southern Oregon regularly for twenty years in his pre-Pearl Harbor capacity as travel editor for his newspaper. On these trips he gathered data for his weekly travel articles designed to promote tourist travel into this area. He also worked hard for the improvements of Crater Lake National park.
