BROWNS TO WIN

Redsox Defeat Chisox and
A's Win Pair; Cubs and
Reds Triumph.

New York, Aug. 12—(U.P.)—George McQuinn, once passed on by the New York Yankee farm system as a player who had no future, came back to plague them today by hitting two home runs to pace the St. Louis Browns to an 8 to 3 victory over the world champions.

It was McQuinn's ball game, both at bat and in the field. He started the Browns off to a 2 to 0 lead when he hit a home run in the first inning and added another homer in the ninth to account for five of the Browns' eight runs. In addition, he made two brilliant stops from his fielding post.

The Boston Red Sox maintained their six-and-a-half game margin in second place in the American league by defeating the Chicago White Sox 5 to 4. Taber's homer in the eighth inning broke up a tied ball game. Eddie Lopat allowed only one hit after the fifth inning and that was Taber's homer.

The Philadelphia A's took their second game in a row over the Cleveland Indians, putting across three runs in the fifth inning to win 4 to 3.

The Brooklyn Dodgers, after winning three games in a row at Chicago, lost to the Cubs 2 to 0, with Japhet (Red) Lynn holding them to five hits for his second victory since joining the Chicagoans a month ago. The victory put the Cubs in fourth place.

The Pittsburgh Pirates defeated the New York Giants for the fourth straight time, winning 8 to 0 on Max Butcher's six-hit pitching.

The Cincinnati Reds defeated the Boston Braves 5 to 4 in 10 innings. Ray Mueller driving home the winning run with a single, Frank McCormick staked the Reds to an early lead with his second homer in as many days and his 13th of the season. Charley (Red) Barrett of the Braves, seeking his second victory in the series, relieved Ira Hutchinson in the ninth and was debilitated with the defeat. Arnold Carter, who lost an earlier game in the series to the Braves, was the winner, chalking up his fourth victory over Boston this year.

Helser Rings Up 17th Win

San Francisco, Aug. 12—(U.P.)—The great Portland pitching staff blanked the San Francisco Seals again today—the fourth time in a row—to score a 3-0 victory and run the string of innings in which the Seals have been unable to score to 36.

The victory was the fifth straight for the northerners and the second in the series for Roy Helser, who beat the local club in the opener, 7-2. The win was Helser's 17th against 10 losses for the season.

In a decided hitting slump, Manager Lefty O'Doul's boys could get only four safe blows off Helser's offerings. Meanwhile, the Beavers jumped on Bill Werle for all their runs. They counted once in the fifth when Ted Gullic tripled and scored on Manager Marv Owen's infield out; and they added two more in the sixth on doubles by Johnny O'Neill and Frank DeMaree, followed by Norman Deweese's single.

Five of the 10 hits garnered off Werle and his successor, Knowles Percy, were good for extra bases—four two-baggers and a triple.

COMMISH RULES
PUBLIC SEARCH
FOR TOUGH TONY

Tough Tony Morelli, the mat maniac who makes a business of employing various gadgets against his grappling foes, will be forced to undergo a public search in plain view of armory customers whenever he wrestles here in the future.

This was the decision of the Medford boxing and wrestling commission which met Friday afternoon to decide whether the ferocious Floridan should be suspended or allowed to continue operating in Medford.

The search will take place in the center of the ring, and will be conducted by unnamed officials who will see to it that Morelli hasn't secreted any hard objects in his trunks, shoes, mouth or under bandages.

The commission, which also warned Morelli that any more monkey business would result in his immediate disbarment, took the action following Thursday night's brawl between Morelli and Jack Lipscomb.

In that affair, Morelli used the handle of a water faucet to emphasize his blows to Lipscomb's back and head. The handle was hidden by tape around Morelli's knee, and caused Lipscomb many unhappy moments.

In previous matches, Morelli had used a pop bottle to beat Katoen and a rubber stamp to scrape across Herb Parks' face. Now, by the commission's action, he will find it extremely difficult to get his hands on anything he shouldn't.

With Morelli given the green light to continue wrestling here, after being searched every time he appears, Promoter Mack Lillard said Saturday that he would try to bring Tony and Lipscomb together again next Thursday evening.

Lipscomb, Lillard said, wants to meet Morelli on a winner-take-all basis.
