

SLOVAK PATRIOTS BATTLE GERMANS FLEEING POLAND

**Martial Law Proclaimed—
Panic Hits Cabinet; Re-
port Nazis Revolt.**

London, Aug. 12—(U.P.)—The Czechoslovak puppet government proclaimed martial law throughout Slovakia today after patriots clashed with German troops retreating from Poland through the Carpathian passes and attacked Nazi military transport and supply dumps.

A authoritative Czechoslovak sources said underground information had reported revolts among German troops billeted in Slovakia and among Slovak troops who refused to be sent to Italy and Romania to bolster the wavering Nazi forces.

Meanwhile near panic seemed to have seized the Slovak cabinet, and the German Transoceanic News Agency reported in a dispatch from Bratislava that the death penalty had been decreed for anyone caught taking part in "revolutionary activities, robbery or sabotage of transport, communications and health services."

A Czechoslovak spokesman said that patriots for the past three weeks have been carrying out large-scale sabotage attacks against German military transport and that there have been numerous open clashes between patriots and Germans who now have taken over all the frontier area between Poland and Slovakia.

Information from the Czechoslovak underground reaching the exile government here said roving bands of guerrillas are waging war against German troops retreating through the Carpathian passes as the Soviet armies approach the Slovak frontier.

F. E. SAMSON CO. ENLARGING FOR SEED CLEANING

The F. E. Samson Co., in order to afford the most modern seed cleaning facilities for growers will soon install a new type "Oliver" separator at the local mill. This will be in addition to a large capacity cleaner and draper machine. The "Oliver" separates seed by gravity, an air cushion floating lighter weight seeds to one end of the table. Mr. Samson points out that proper separation of this kind converts mixed seed, worth a mediocre price, to top quality seed, bringing premium prices.

Installation of the "Oliver" separator and other equipment will make his plant one of the most modern in the state, Mr. Samson said.

The seed cleaning will be in charge of Bill Wahlert who came here recently to head that department. Mr. Wahlert, who has purchased a home here, spent 15 years with large seed companies and has had much experience in small seeds.

Growing of small seeds has spread rapidly here, Mr. Samson states, the small seeds crop in Jackson county amounting to \$225,000 last year. Harvest of this year's crop is just starting and the yield is expected to far exceed that of 1943.

Seeds grown here give good results in most export territories, Mr. Samson asserts, and the industry aids in advertising the Rogue River valley throughout the world.

SON PHONES LAW HE SLEW MOTHER

Sunland Cal., Aug. 12—(U.P.)—A woman identified as Mrs. Elizabeth Barnes 58, was found strangled to death at her home today after her son telephoned police, "I've just killed my mother."

The son Stanley J. Barnes, 35, told officers he choked his mother during an argument.

Los Angeles, Aug. 12—(U.P.)—Stephen Bender 47-year-old promoter, today was convicted of first degree murder for the brutal slaying of his wife, Mrs. Rena Bender 44, whose body was found stuffed in a wall of their apartment.

Bender, also known as Bennett, will be given a sanity hearing. He entered a double plea of not guilty and not guilty by reason of insanity.

An all-woman jury deliberated less than two hours and no recommendation of leniency was made.

Postwar Jobs

Babson Says: "Prepare for Them Now"

Babson Park, Mass., Aug. 11—(Special Correspondent)—Many inquiries are coming to me from the families of servicemen regarding what their boys should do after returning home. Of course most of those who left good positions will be taken back by their old employers. On the other hand, a larger percentage of the men in our armed forces never had worthwhile, if any, positions. To these men I make the following suggestions:

A prominent magazine which was especially interested in developing national advertising once employed me. The publishers were especially desirous for me to discover some product not now profitably marketed. After three months of intensive study I was forced to report that I was unable to find a single industry in which some concern, somewhere, was not already making millions. This included everything from cradles to coffins.

This is even more true today than it was at the time of this study. It shows that success depends upon the man rather than industry in which he is engaged or the locality where he works. This is especially important for young men to remember in this new age when they expect everything to be planned for

them and when they will temporarily be seeking security rather than freedom.

What About Small Business?

Opportunities are found everywhere for those with integrity, industry and the pioneering spirit. This will be truer after the war than ever before although the temptation to "let George do it" will also be far greater. Although the small businessman has a harder row to hoe than the big corporations, yet there may be more opportunity for the individual with the small businessman. This is probably what the Reader's Digest has in mind in offering \$25,000 in prizes in its August issue. The published answers to this inquiry will be very interesting.

The big business corporation has a momentum which carries it along through the power of organization and money together with the ability to use national advertising profitably. It is not so dependent upon the energy and imagination of any one individual. The small businessman, however, is absolutely dependent for success upon a few exceptional men. Although as an investor I prefer to put my money into a large corporation, yet as a returning serviceman I would

seek to help some small businessman.

Telephone Directories Aid in Selecting Job

I understand that it is difficult to send a book to a serviceman unless you have a letter from him asking that it be sent. If you think your boy is wondering what he is to do when he gets back, have him ask you to send him a Classified Telephone Directory for your city. These directories may be little gold mines for those who are willing to study them. When someone asks for my idea as for what he is best fitted, I give him a classified telephone directory and suggest that he read it through as to headings while waiting in my office. This very often solves his problem so that he does not need help from me.

There will be a great temptation after the war for returning soldiers to get into politics or labor unions or farmers' leagues or something of the kind to "secure justice for the serviceman." Some of these organizations may have been useful in the past; but those men will get on best in this postwar era who depend more on their God and themselves and less upon politics and man-made organizations.

May I add one more suggestion without being misunderstood? Many prayers are said in vain. American and German boys cannot expect God will answer the prayers of both groups when they pray for victory. Both American and German boys, however, can logically pray for peace and for guidance as to what they should do after peace

comes. Hence, my final advice regarding postwar jobs is that the family should take God into their confidence more. Don't try to decide this or any other important question alone.

DORSEY ACCUSES HALL OF "PASSES"

Hollywood, Aug. 12—(U.P.)—Band leader Tommy Dorsey late today accused handsome Film Star Jon Hall of "making passes" at his beautiful wife, Pat Dane, at a party in his apartment that preceded a bloody battle on the balcony outside.

"It was very embarrassing for her," Dorsey said as he appeared at the district attorney's office to make a formal statement on the fighting a week ago tonight that resulted in a smashed nose and deep cuts for Hall.

"I was on the verge of ordering him to leave. But I have known Hall's wife, Frances Langford, for a long time and hesitated. We were all relieved when Hall finally left."

Dorsey said that Hall returned a few minutes later and put his arm around Miss Dane when she answered the door.

"He held her," Dorsey said, "as she tried to draw away and began running his hands over her body."

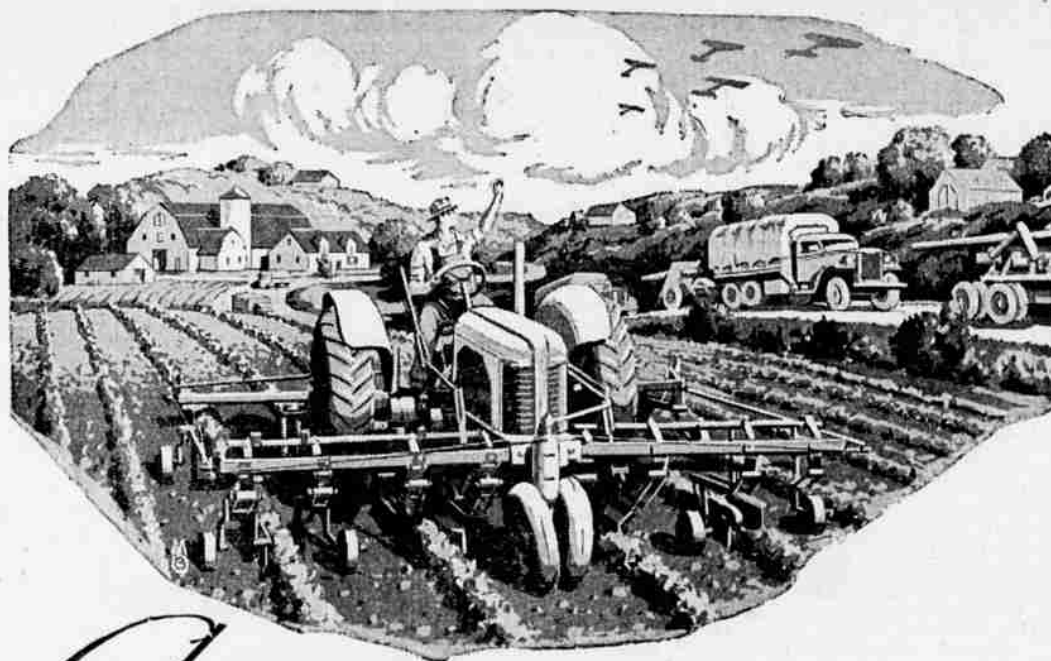
