UNKNOWN LEADS MEDAL PLAY IN PGA TOURNAMENT

Fred Annon Posts Card of 68 at Halfway Mark—Favored Nelson Has 69.

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 15.—(U.P.) Comparatively unknown among the host of name golfers he is competing against, Fred Annon, 30-year-old professional who teaches golf by day and works a trick in a Stamford, Conn., war plant by night, today led a field of 78 into the second day of medal play in the 26th renewal of the National P.G.A. championships.

Small and bronzed, Annon, who instructs at the Hickory Golf club at Tuckahoe, N. Y., whittled four strokes off tricky Manitou course in yesterday's opening round of medal play by posting twin nine hole scores of 36 to lead a star-studded field at the halfway mark of qualifying play.

Following Annon were Byron Nelson, winner of the last P.G.A. tourney in 1941, of Toledo, O., a heavy favorite to capture this event, Morrie Gravatt, Williamsport, Pa., and P.G.A. president, Ed Dudley of North Field, N. J., who carded 69's. Jug McSpaden, Philadelphia shotmaker and top money winner of the season; Bob Hamilton, Evansville, Ind., and Willie Goggin, White Plains, N. Y., were tied for fourth with a 70 and Joseph Zarbardo, Norristown, Pa., and John Gerten of Salt Lake City followed with 71's.

EUROPEAN CHAMP TO FACE LAMOTTA

New York, Aug. 15.—(U.P.) Marcel Cerdan of the "Free French" navy, middleweight champion of Europe, will arrive in the United States within the next two weeks to fight Jacob Lamotta at Madison Square Garden on Sept. 22 or 23.

The Lamotta bout will open Cerdan's goodwill flake campaign in the United States and Canada, according to Armand Vincent, Montreal promoter who has the Algerian knockout artist under contract.

Cerdan, first "European" fighter to visit the United States since Pearl Harbor, will fly from Casa Blanca, Morocco, to New York. He has a priority on transportation, since he is coming in a semi-official capacity as a representative of Gen. De Gaulle's French provisional government. He is at Casa Blanca now.

HELMS HONOR TO STARS' SLUGGER

Hollywood, Aug. 15.—(U.P.)—Frank Kelleher, Hollywood's slugging outfielder, has been named as Southern California athlete of the month for July by members of the Helms Foundation Athlete of the Month board.

Board members selected the hard-hitting Irishman because of his great hitting during that month. In the 34 games he played, he cracked out 46 hits in 118 times at bat, for a percentage of .389. Included were eight doubles and eight home runs. He also drove home 33 runs, more than one a game.

CHAMPS LOSE
Wichita, Kan., Aug. 15.—(U.P.)—In one of the outstanding surprises of the 10th annual national semi-pro baseball tournament, the Cosma Bobcats, Wichita, Kan., runner-up in the recent Kansas State tournament, defeated the Wisconsin champions, the 76th Wisconsin Infantry team, 9 to 1 here last night in the second round in the 1944 playoffs.

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PIRATES WIN TWO TO DEADLOCK REDS FOR SECOND SPOT

New York, Aug. 15.—(U.P.)—The torrid battle for second place in the National league between Pittsburgh and Cincinnati today apparently had replaced the usual hairline pennant drive so characteristic of the senior circuit in other years.

The Pirates are staging a rush which would gain ground on any club but the Reds and are currently riding an eight-game winning streak and have tucked away 10 victories in their last 11 starts, the latest being a pair yesterday over the Boston Braves.

The Bucs' first win over Boston was in the form of the completion of a game suspended on July 2 with the score tied at 5-5. The score remained deadlocked until the 12th when Relief Pitcher Truett (Rip) Sewell won his 13th decision by driving in Johnny Barrett with a single for a 7-6 edge.

Elwin (Preacher) Roe turned in his best pitching performance of the season when he hurled a two-hitter before the home crowd in the regular game to gain a 5-0 shutout.

The Reds handed the New York Giants their seventh consecutive setback and gained Bucky Walters his 17th victory when their 13-hit attack netted a 6-3 victory.

The Philadelphia Phillies ran their streak to four by beating the Chicago Cubs 6-1.

The Cardinals defeated the last place Brooklyn Dodgers, 4-2. In the American league the Boston Red Sox whittled the lead of the St. Louis Browns to five and a half games as Emmett O'Neill pitched four-hit ball for a 5-1 victory.

The New York Yankees outlasted the Chicago White Sox to win a 13-inning contest, 2-1.

The Washington Senators made it three in a row over the Cleveland Indians when they broke up a 3-3 tie with a four-run fifth inning that led to an 8-5 triumph.

The Philadelphia Athletics came from behind to defeat the Detroit Tigers, 7-5.

EAST GRID TEAMS LIBERALIZE GAME

New York, Aug. 15.—(U.P.)—The Eastern Intercollegiate Athletic association, a usually ultra-conservative body, today announced that it had taken action designed to open up college football in the East and also charged the Parent National Collegiate Athletic association with "inaction" in the face of many needed changes.

Taking an "object lesson" from the professionals, who have opened up offensive play by liberalizing forward passing regulations, the eastern association voted at their secret session here yesterday to permit forward passing from any point behind the line of scrimmage instead of the five yards distance behind the line now required by N.C.A.A. rules.

Spinach Overrated As Food For Human

Washington, Aug. 15.—(U.P.)—Spinach, it now appears, is not quite the food Popeye and health-minded parents have led the youngsters to believe all these years.

In fact, wide-awake nutritionists are easing that leafy green out of the picture in favor of broccoli, kale and some other vegetables. Laboratory tests show that spinach contains an "undesirably high" amount of oxalic acid—which interferes with the assimilation of calcium in the human body.

Lt. Richard Wright Awarded Air Medal For Combat Duties

An Eighth AAF Bomber Station, England—Second Lieutenant Richard Wright, son of Capt. and Mrs. M. C. Wright, 114 West Scharbauer street, Hobbs, N. M., has been awarded the Air Medal. The citation accompanying the award reads:

"For exceptional meritorious achievement while participating in a number of bombardment missions over continental Europe."
