

COUNTY EXCEEDED ALL BOND QUOTAS IS FINAL REPORT

Final reports on the Fifth War Loan campaign show Jackson county to have exceeded its quota in all types of bonds and to have ranked in eighth place in the state in total sales. Total sales in the county were \$3,238,000, 143 per cent of the quota, \$2,262,000, according to the report which was issued by the Oregon War Finance committee.

Series "E" bonds, which were stressed during the campaign, totaled \$758,000, 126 per cent of the quota of \$600,000. The county ranked ninth in the state on the "E" bonds. Sales to individuals, including the series "E" bonds, were \$1,271,200, 122.6 per cent of the quota. Corporation sales were \$1,066,800, which was 160 per cent of the quota of \$1,225,000 and placed the county in fifth place for that type of sales.

A comparative schedule for the last three campaigns shows that in the third war loan the county purchased \$2,939,000 in bonds of all issues, this being 110 per cent of the quota, and in the fourth drive sales were \$2,722,100, or 128 per cent of the quota.

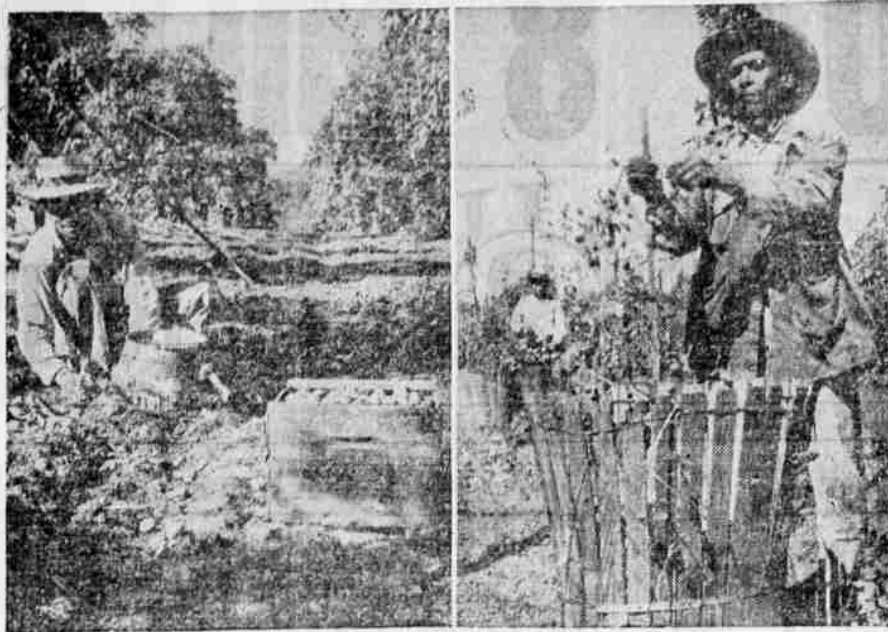

NEWSPAPERS HIT ALL-TIME HIGH IN WAR LOAN HELP

Washington, Aug. 16.—(U.P.)—Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr., disclosed today that newspaper support of the fifth war loan broke all previous records.

In a letter of congratulation and appreciation to Frank Tripp, chairman of the allied newspaper council, Morgenthau thanked the nation's newspapers for their unselfish support of the drive.

"In spite of the difficult paper shortages, newspapers gave greater advertising and editorial support to the fifth drive than any previous one," Morgenthau wrote. "We acknowledge with gratitude the splendid assistance of the allied newspaper council and your fellow publishers."

Tripp released treasury figures showing that daily and weekly newspapers combined carried a total of 203,014 advertisements during the fifth war loan drive, totaling 155,131,405 lines of space with a total dollar value of \$10,160,709.66.

The previous record, set during the fourth war loan drive, was 159,878 advertisements, totaling 120,191,376 lines of space with a dollar value of \$7,849,241.

In addition, Tripp reported that newspapers contributed 45,582,675 lines of news and editorial support of the fifth war loan drive, as compared to the previous record of 35,000,000 lines.

In setting the new record dailies published 106,968 advertisements, totaling 68,505,805 lines with a dollar value of \$7,628,549.66, and contributed 26,153,925 lines of news and editorial support.
