

REDS WOULD PUT COMPLETE CRUSH ON GERMAN FOES

Would Leave Warlike Nation Unable to Ever Again Threaten European Peace

Moscow, Aug. 16—(U.P.)—The trend toward development of post-war projects, including the establishment of a peace organization, increased among Soviet political writers today as the military victories on the East Prussian border and in central Poland augured a speedy termination of the war against Germany.

Many suggestions have been offered, including formulation of some organization of nations but without a unanimity rule by which small nations could block action, although nothing concrete has been adopted because the Russians still live too close to the realities of total warfare to be unduly preoccupied with the details of the future peace structure.

Cannot Forget
Behind all the plans, however, is a general determination in the Soviet mind of crushing Germany industrially and militarily to prevent her from ever again threatening European peace.

The Soviet people cannot forget the millions of dead and crippled and the devastation of the better part of European Russia.

There also is some misgiving lest the United States and Britain, particularly the United States, insist on a soft peace or that Britain endeavors to resume the balance of power policy by aiding in the reconstruction of Germany.

This uncertainty over Germany's future undoubtedly is the reason the Russians as yet are not ready with concrete schemes concerning the post-war situation.

As result, there have been few indications of the precise position Soviet representatives will take at the forthcoming conference in the United States.

Technicians Coming
The Soviet delegation, headed by Audrey A. Gromyko, ambassador to Washington, consists essentially of foreign office technicians, experts of international law and representatives of the Red army and navy.

It does not include such policy makers as Foreign Commissar Vyacheslav Molotov, and Marshal Klementy Voroshilov, who is chairman of the defense council, or top-notch diplomatic advisers like Maxim Litvinov, assistant people's commissar for foreign affairs and former ambassador to Washington, and

Ivan Maisky, vice-commissar of foreign affairs.

Washington, Aug. 16—(U.P.)—The Soviet Union today was expected to oppose vigorously, at next week's talks on a world security organization, the principle of full equality and responsibility of all nations and to contend instead that all powers—great and small—are equal only in the right to justice.

The Russian argument will be similar to this:
The small and the great nations must not have the same influence or the same right to a voice in the determination of international policy. The big powers admittedly must carry the responsibility for keeping the peace and suppressing aggression and they must therefore be granted formal authority corresponding to their actual responsibility.

That point of view will find wide support among the post-war planners of other nations who long have recognized that the rule of the old League of Nations requiring a unanimous vote on resolutions was one of its major defects. The history of the league is filled with cases of one or more small nations vetoing league action.

Plan Received
A comprehensive idea of the plan the Russians are thinking about became available here last night with arrival of the text of a recent article in the Leningrad "Zvezda."

Some of the best Russian sources believe that the author of the article, signed as N. Malinin, was really none other than Maxim Litvinov, vice-commissar of foreign affairs and Russia's leading exponent of collective security and expert on the League of Nations.

The core of this Russian plan is a "union of great powers" bound together by special treaties as well as an international security organization. The special treaties among the Big Four—amounting to a military alliance—would define "as precisely as possible the role of each power in extinguishing this or that center of aggression."

GANGSTER TOUHY SUES FOX FILM CORPORATION

Chicago, Aug. 16—(U.P.)—Roger Touhy, former Chicago gangster, has filed a \$1,000,000 damage suit in federal court against 20th Century Fox Film Corp. and Balaban and Katz, Chicago theater owners, for producing and distributing the film, "Roger Touhy, Gangster."

Touhy, who now is serving a 99-year kidnapping term in Sateville penitentiary, charged unlawful use of his name and that the film induces the public to believe the scenes were actual incidents in his life.

TWO-YEAR PANIC TO FOLLOW WAR: SAYS EDUCATOR

Mass Unemployment Expected During Transition From Wartime to Peace

Chicago, Aug. 16—(U.P.)—Dr. John Childs of Columbia university today predicted a great mass unemployment in the United States for nearly two years after the end of the war.

During the transition from war to peace, we shall be confronted with a demobilization of 30,000,000 from the armed services and the war production industries, Childs told the 28th annual American Federation of Teachers convention.

"At present over 6,000,000 people are employed in three industries—shipping, munitions and aircraft. The most optimistic estimates do not assume that even one-sixth of this number can be continued in these three industries once the war is over," he said.

Must Move Workers
The re-employment of these workers involves a geographical as well as an occupational redistribution of war workers now living in temporary communities far removed from their home states, he said. Reconversion would require at minimum a period of from 18 to 24 months.

"The defeat of the Murray-Kilgore bill, which was designed to prevent a grave situation of mass unemployment from developing, will make it difficult for America to play its part in the post-war reconstruction either at home or abroad," Childs said.

Irvin R. Kuenzli, secretary-treasurer of the federation, charted that labor and public schools have been subjected to "unwarranted nationwide attack" in a campaign "carefully organized, highly financed and effective in its impact on public opinion."

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Green Light Given Household Gadgets

Washington, Aug. 16—(U.P.)—War Production Chief Donald M. Nelson today issued the much-disputed order No. 4 in his program of limited reconversion—an order permitting restricted

production of vacuum cleaners, sewing machines and many other civilian items long off the market.

The order authorized WPB field officials to permit local manufacturers to resume production of the designated items provided labor and facilities are available and vital war production is not adversely affected.

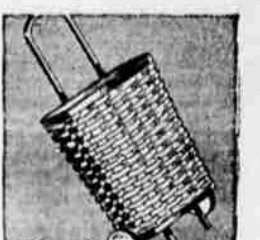

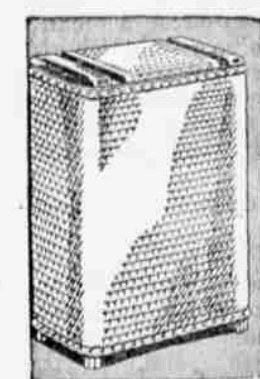
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
