Living Standard Will Stay Down Until Japs Yield

Washington, Aug. 16—(U.P.)—Return of the nation's prewar standard of living must await the defeat of Japan, despite official estimates that production of civilian goods will climb to the 1939 level after Germany's surrender, it was emphasized today.

War Production Chief Donald M. Nelson told a press conference late yesterday that this country would boost its output of consumer goods by 30 per cent—to 1939 levels—after the end of the European war and still turn out enough war material to beat Japan. He indicated, however, that many vital
