

NAZI WAR LORD VISITS FINLAND

Stockholm, Aug. 17—(UP)—Reports circulating here today said Field Marshal Wilhelm Keitel, supreme commander of all German armed forces is now in Finland for an important conference with Baron Marshall Carl Gustav Mannerheim, new president of Finland.

The nature of the conference was not revealed, but it was reported that a number of high-ranking German and Finnish army officers participated in the discussions.

Mannerheim assumed the presidency of Finland less than two weeks ago, replacing Risto Rytty, for the reported purpose of obtaining an armistice from Russia and withdrawing his country from the war.)
