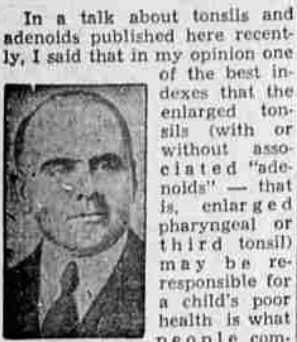

KERNELS IN THE NECK

In a talk about tonsils and adenoids published here recently, I said that in my opinion one of the best indexes of the enlarged tonsils (with or without associated "adenoids")—that is, enlarged pharyngeal or third tonsil—may be responsible for a child's poor health is what people commonly call "kernels" in the neck, and doctors call cervical adenitis. That is to say the lymph nodes (popularly called "glands") along the sides of the neck from under the ears to the top of the breastbone are enlarged; sometimes somewhat tender, and can be felt as small lumps, or seen as small swellings when they are quite inflamed.

This is merely my opinion, remember, and I speak only for myself, not for any part of the medical profession. I am not too positive that such "kernels" are sufficient to indicate tonsillotomy (and I mean merely tonsillotomy, "clipping" the tonsils, not the atrocity of "complete removal")—which is "complete" in the theory only, but if I were to decide whether a child with large tonsils and adenoids and, say, ear trouble or obstruction of normal breathing should have a tonsillotomy and adenoidectomy, provided the tonsils and adenoids had failed to shrink under X-ray treatments, I'd advise the operation if the child had "kernels" in the neck.

It must be remembered that kernels in the neck may be due to several other causes than tonsils or adenoids. Generally a child with middle ear infection or "running ear" has kernels on the same side of the neck. If the child has one or more decayed teeth—which no well cared for child should be permitted to

have nowadays—there is usually more or less cervical adenitis which clears up after the cavities are properly filled. Any chronic infection in the nasal cavity or in one of the sinuses may cause kernels in the neck. Even chronic eczema about the face, head or neck is usually associated with kernels in the neck.

Tuberculosis of the lymph nodes in the neck or elsewhere is the condition formerly called "scrofula." This condition, tuberculous adenitis, whether lymph nodes or "glands" in the neck alone are involved or whether lymph nodes in other parts of the body, say those around the bronchial tubes back of the windpipe and those behind the intestines in the abdomen, are likewise involved, is so important that we shall only mention it here—it merits more detailed discussion in talks to follow.

U. S. RESTRICTS ARGENTINE GOLD

Washington, Aug. 17.—U. S. Official sources said today that free movement of Argentine gold from this country had been terminated.

Argentina has enjoyed the privilege of exporting the "earmarked" gold it owns in the United States just as freely as other allied and associated nations. Now, it was explained, Argentina has been put on the same restrictive basis applicable to neutral nations such as Sweden, Spain, Portugal and Eire.

Confirming previous disclosure by the United Press of the move, officials described it as being entirely "logical" since the United States government has classified Argentina as a neutral which is not cooperating with the Allied war effort.
