COUNTY PLANNING HIGHWAY BUILDING WHEN WAR ENDED

\$3,000,000 Program Outlined by County Engineer Rynning at Luncheon.

Jackson county is tentatively planning a big three million dollar five-year postwar highway program, according to Paul Rynning, county engineer who addressed the Ashland Rotary club at their regular Thursday noon luncheon meeting in the Lithia city yesterday. The post-war program would require the services of 150 men for five years, he stated, and the county now has some \$285,000 in the sinking fund toward this program. The fund developed since the county has not been able to spend the regular allotment for highway construction.

The program may be changed, Rynning said, to make allowances for avoiding the duplication of work by the county and the federal government, which also plans to expend funds on highways in this county. It is also understood that in the post-war program, the state highway department will increase its maintenance crew in this county by some 25 men and that many state-financed projects will be underway at the same time.

52 Miles Grading
The tentative county program, as outlined by Rynning includes 52 miles of grading at a cost of \$1,000,000; 86 miles rock resurfacing, \$750,000; 60 miles oiling \$400,000; 6 large bridges, \$200,000; 70 small bridges, \$150,000; and maintenance, \$500,000, making a total of \$3,000,000.

Combined with the state highway program, the road project will call for approximately 275 men for five years after the war. The county road and bridge budget during the last several years has been \$300,000 annually.

Monterey County Superior Judge H. C. Jorgenson refused an eloquent request by Defense Attorney Leo Friedman to quash the indictment, postponed a hearing on a motion for bail until Aug. 23, and set Sept. 19 as the trial date.

In rejecting Friedman's motion to throw out the indictment, Judge Jorgenson said: "That indictment was returned by 19 of the best people in Monterey county."

"They thought she should go to trial. We so rule."

The only interpreter at the farm labor camp decided that he'd rather work in the fields than translate conversations and was nowhere to be found when 100 new workers arrived from the Dayton, Wash., and Nyssa, Ore., camps.

Failing to understand either their duties or the pay scale, the bewildered Mexicans milled about camp while War Food Administration officials threw up their hands in dismay believing a strike must be in progress.

The interpreter returned to his job and the Mexicans, finally satisfied, willingly went into the field.
