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POSTAL CARDS ARE READILY COMBUSTIBLE

Some one signing "Postcard Jennie" asks whether Burger's disease ends in gangrene, says a friend she is suffering from much pain, burning and numbness in both feet, and asks whether I can explain about Burger's disease.

I talked about it here recently and had a series of articles about it here a few months ago. There is a chapter about it in booklet CVD—for copy send ten cents and a stamped envelope bearing your address.

Postal cards seldom get to my desk but "Postcard Jennie" got through for one good reason—she refers to a woman with Burger's disease.

Now the medical name for Burger's disease is, I regret to say, thrombo-angiitis obliterans. However, we're not inclined to be unreasonable about such matters in the profession, as witness the recent dropping of one of the 's from angitis, a concession which, I think, shows that medicine is a liberal art.

In a talk to women about smoking I said here "if a lady cares to chew she is just as well justified in taking a chew as a gentleman is, if a gentleman ever does—tobacco does no more harm to a woman than it does to a man. But there is no argument about the injurious effects of tobacco in youth—and youth, as I see it, is the growing, developing period of life from the age of 10 years to the age of 25 years. I warned young women smokers to look at their legs.

I predicted that, although the great majority of persons with Burger's disease were males who smoked cigarettes excessively, we would probably find a good many women afflicted with thrombo-angiitis obliterans in the next decade or two, now that girls were carrying the thing to such extremes. Mind you, I do not mean to imply that smoking is the only cause of Burger's disease, for there are authentic cases on record of Burger's disease progressing to gangrene and amputation of foot or leg, in persons who have never smoked. But I do believe excessive indulgence, especially in youth, is the chief factor in the causation of the disease in most cases.

I tell what I can of the treatment of Burger's disease in the CVD booklet mentioned above.

After all "Postcard Jennie's" message is hardly worth this notice. It tells me nothing interesting, for instance, whether the victim of Burger's disease smokes and if so how long has been a victim of the habit and did anybody ever admire or like her any better for it?

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Thyroid

Have been taking thyroid now for some time. I weighed 160 pounds and have come down to 145. I lose just two pounds a week. Friends tell me it is dangerous and that I'll get the weight all back as soon as I stop taking thyroid.

Iodine

Years ago I began taking your iodine ration. I still take it, and it seems to help a sinus condition. Now my 13-year-old daughter has asthma and I give her a drop of iodine in water and it helps her. My wife fears it will affect her glands.

PARATROOPERS IN SLIGHT MISTAKE, TAKE WRONG SPOT

St. Tropez, France, Aug. 16.—(U.P.)—Mistakes will happen with amphibious landings—so American paratroopers took this famous resort in France when they should have been somewhere far inland.

I found a group of tough, happy youngsters here this morning and since they were satisfied and so was the high command, there were no complaints.

It was cloudy night before last and navigators went by the so-called precision instruments. At a given time they were supposed to be over the target and they sent the paratroopers out. Three planes of them landed on a peninsula and they realized immediately something was wrong.

The paratroopers, however, had to be resourceful. Germans attacked with small arms fire as they came down and killed several.

Other Nazis blew up a little port where fashionable yachts used to anchor.

So the paratroopers pitched in and took St. Tropez.

Residents of the town highly praised the exactitude of American bombing and shelling.

"They didn't even break a window," said the proprietor of the Hotel de Paris as he hung out an American flag which he had kept hidden in the rafters.

"When the Germans requisitioned the hotel, they put us all out," he said. "When the Americans requisitioned the hotel they let us stay and they gave the children chocolate. It is most different."

Paratroopers said French patriots in the town helped them fight the Germans and showed them where the Germans were caring for their wounded.

Reading, Pa., Aug. 18.—(U.P.)—Clyde G. Portner, 29, a hostler mill knitter, his housekeeper and three children were found shot to death today in the Portner home at West Wyomissing and police believe Portner killed himself and the children after accidentally wounding the housekeeper.

The victims of Portner's gun were Mrs. Marguerite McDermott, about 30, wife of Corp. Robert McDermott, Camp William C. Reid, New Mexico; her daughter, Mary Elizabeth, 17 months old, and Portner's two children, Terrance, 4, and Robert, 9.
