LIKE FINALISTS

Pair Win Easy Matches in
PGA Meet; 5 Other Top
Flighters Are Upset.

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 18.—(U.P.) Byron Nelson and Harold McGinnis, bent on meeting each other in the finals of the National Professional Golfers' association, emerged with easy victories today from a welter of upsets which left five other top flight stars by the wayside.

Nelson, the tournament medalist from Toledo, O., was matched against Willie Goggin, chubby White Plains, N. Y. veteran, in today's quarter-finals, while McGinnis opposes Bob Hamilton, promising young pro from Evansville, Ind.

Other pairings in the round of eight found Chuck Congdon of Tacoma, Wash., playing the P.G.A. president, Ed Dudley of Northfield, N. J., while Arthur Bell of San Francisco meets George Schneider of Salt Lake City, Utah.

Fry Beaten

Nelson, gallery favorite by virtue of his all-around consistency, advanced yesterday with a 7 and 6 victory over Mark Fry of Oakland, Calif., while McGinnis, the Philadelphia veteran, trimmed Freddie Annon of Mamaroneck, N. Y., 8 and 7.

Most of the other favorites, however, tumbled out of the running. The name golfers who dropped out were Tony Manero of Greenwich, Conn., Sammy Byrd of Redford, Mich., Jimmy Hines of Amsterdam, N. Y., Craig Wood of Mamaroneck, N. Y., and Tony Penna of Dayton, O., all given better than an outside chance of coping the title and forest prize of \$3,500.

Goggin, setting a steady pace, eliminated Manero 4 and 3.

Byrd lost to a rank outsider, Congdon, who played consistently on the greens while the former baseball player had putter trouble, to win 2 and 1.

SURFBOARD GIVES
BELCASTRO NOD
OVER TOUGH TONY

Pete Belcastro, substituting for Jack Lipscomb, employed his famous bouncing surfboard in the armory last night to trounce a Tony Morelli who, thoroughly searched before the match, was unable to enlist the support of any sort of gadget.

Meeting in the top half of a double main event, Morelli grabbed the first fall in eight minutes with a body press after literally taking Belcastro's breath away with illegal smother holds.

Feigning grogginess nine minutes later, Belcastro suddenly cut loose with a series of solid blows to Morelli's chin, belted him to the canvas and flipped him over for the surfboard. He bounced and bounced, and when it was all over Morelli was a sick character.

The third fall took less than a minute. Pete came out of his corner, clouted Morelli once on his aching back and Referee Earl Yockley stopped the match and gave Pete the nod. Morelli was in no condition to continue.

In the lower half of the double main event, Panvo Katonen took two straight falls from Elton Owen, who was substituting for Harold Davidson.

Katonen's first fall was obtained in 21 minutes with a reverse back-breaker, after Owen missed a dropkick and knocked himself half giddy when his head struck the mat. Two minutes later Katonen had his second tumble, aided by rabbit punches to Owen's neck.

Pat O'Dowdy and Iven Olson, substituting for Jack Kaiser, each took a fall in the three-round opener. O'Dowdy, though receiving for a neat wrestling lesson, used hair pulls and a Boston crab to take the first fall in the second round. Olson employed flying mares, punches, dropkicks and a body slam to even the match in the next canto.

In a special attraction, Roy Deutschman, 90 pounds, defeated his 92-pound opponent, Roger Hobbs, with a hammerlock. The youngsters, after their pleasing exhibition, gathered up a nice shower of coins.

True Team-Spirit Marks End
On Saipan Of Ex-Grid Star

New York, Aug. 18.—(U.P.)—Carve the name of Alex Santilli high on the plaque of all-American fighting heroes that sports have contributed to the war. He died while displaying the ultimate in team-spirit.

Lieutenant Santilli of the marines, former Fordham football tackle, was killed by a Japanese sniper while leading a charge in the bloody fighting at Saipan on July 8. He wasn't scheduled for action that day. He had been "benched" by shell-shock.

But big Alex, star of Fordham's 1942 Sugar Bowl victory over Missouri, couldn't sit on the bench while his mates were battling down the Saipan field in rough going. The spirit impelled him to join the fray, and the rugged body he had developed on the gridiron permitted him to carry on heroically, despite his shell-shock.

A letter from Saipan explains this. It was written by Ensign Gerald J. O'Brien, who was graduated from Fordham in 1943. It was received by the Rev. Ignatius W. Cox, S. J., professor of philosophy and religion at Fordham. An excerpt follows:

"A few days before the rough going was over, Al, who had charge of a machine gun outfit, was shell-shocked and one of his fellow officers carried him back behind the dunes, a distance of about two miles. Well, they treated Al back there and the next day they had planned to evacuate him (the medic).

"The next morning Al got up, dressed and sneaked back to his outfit. He told them that he wouldn't let them go through all that fighting while he was taking it easy behind the lines. The officer who had carried Al back was injured that day, so Al took charge of his own outfit and also the injured officer's rifle platoon.

"Well, he led those men so gallantly that they found themselves treading where fools normally fear to go. He accounted for many Japs and it was while leading his men in a charge that Al was shot. He was shot by a Jap who was hiding in a cavity in a coral sector of ground over which Al was charging. Al had blocked his last kick.

"The men told me afterward that they saw many friends killed, but they somehow could take it in stride; but when Al got his they were brought to tears. It seems that Al was known by all, even by men who

BUGS ON FUTILE
WINNING STREAK;
TAKE 11 IN ROW

New York, Aug. 18.—(U.P.)—Maybe it's like trying to bring down a Flying Fortress with a bean bag, but for whatever it's worth, the Pittsburgh Pirates are moving at even a faster clip these days than the St. Louis Cardinals.

The experts are calling it the season's most futile winning streak, but the Pirates have run up 11 victories in a row and even though they are still 17½ games behind the pace setting cards, they are playing as though every game was the pennant clincher.

Yesterday was a good example. They defeated the Philadelphia Phillies in a double header, 7 to 6 and 6 to 5, putting on late "squeeze" rallies to win both games.

The plight of the Pirates in trying to accomplish the "impossible" at this late juncture, simply emphasizes the status of the Cards, who are bidding for the best won and lost record of any team in National league history.

The Cards won their second straight shutout from the New York Giants, 7 to 0, last night, for their 40th victory in their last 49. By winning, they maintained a pace ahead of the Chicago Cubs of 1906, who hold the Major league record for games won in a season—116 out of 154.

The Boston Braves overwhelmed the Cubs at Chicago with a five-run rally in the fifth and went on to win 7 to 5.

The Brooklyn at Cincinnati game in the National was rained out.

The St. Louis Browns increased their first place margin to seven full games in the American, the greatest they have enjoyed thus far, by beating the Athletics at Philadelphia, 10 to 5. The Browns made 15 hits, with Vern Stephens setting his 15th homer to tie Bobby Doerr of the Red Sox for the league lead.

Johnny Lindell tied an American league record with four doubles in pacing the Yankees to a 10 to 3 victory over Cleveland at New York.

Detroit and Boston reached a three-all stalemate in their important series for second place in the Red Sox park, rain ending the game after five innings. Washington lost its second 1 to 0 game in three days, the Chicago White Sox winning in the ninth on a long fly by Hal Trosky which sent Guy Curtright home from third.

DRILLS FOR BEARS

Chicago, Aug. 18.—(U.P.)—With the arrival of the tardy Indianan contingent, the 1944 All-Star varsity began to take shape today as Head Coach Lynn Woldorf of Northwestern stressed defensive workouts in preparation for the T-minded Chicago Bears.

Three-quarters of the 1941-42 Indiana backfield arrived yesterday. Quarterback Lou Saban and Halfbacks Billy Hillenbrand and Chuck Jacoby. Reporting along with the three hoosier lieutenants was Lt. Billy Reinhard of the University of California, who can play either tackle or halfback.

The 67-man squad was practically completed with yesterday's arrivals, and Woldorf has started to build a varsity which will be delegated to carry the brunt of the collegians' offensive against the Bears.

NICHOLSON IRKED
BY WHITE SHIRTS

Chicago, Aug. 18.—(U.P.) White shirts and Sunday doubleheaders today appeared to be the only obstacles in Bill Nicholson's drive toward the 1944 major league home run and runs-batted-in title.

The Chicago Cubs' burly right fielder is far ahead of the field at present with 27 home runs and 90 runs-batted-in, but he openly fears Sunday bleacher fans in clean white shirts more than National league pitchers.

"Wrigley field is tough on Sunday," Nicholson explained, "because all those white shirts get into the center field bleachers and you can't see the ball. You see it about the time it gets next to your head, but then there isn't much time left to swing."
