YANKS IN THIRD, BROWNS LEAD CUT AS MACKS WIN 3

Red Sox Beat Detroit Pirates, Cards and Braves Triumph.

New York, Aug. 19.—(U.P.)—Frankie Crosetti moved the New York Yankees into third place today with one swing of his bat, producing a grand slam homer which started them off to a 9 to 3 victory over Cleveland.

The homer came in the first inning, making Ernie Bonham's pitching chores fairly easy. He doled out only five hits, none after the sixth inning.

The St. Louis Browns, who rode into Philadelphia in high spirits, left tonight minus their tempers and three ball games, all of which they lost to the seventh place Athletics.

They lost the series finale 4 to 3 in 12 innings today, after Pitcher Bob Muncieff blew a 3 to 0 lead in the seventh inning.

The score remained deadlocked until the 12th when Bobby Estalella led off with a triple. Relief Pitcher George Caster purposely passed Haynes and Siebert, then made McGhee foul out.

Kell smashed a sharp single to bring in Estalella with the winning run. The defeat reduced their lead to five and a half games. They salvaged only one victory in the four-game set.

The Boston Red Sox squared their important series with the Detroit Tigers, winning 9 to 1 to take a firmer grip on second place.

In the National league, the New York Giants lured the champion St. Louis Cardinals out in daylight for the first time in the series, but they were no more effective than at night, losing 8 to 4 for their 12th straight defeat.

It was the eighth straight victory for the Cards, with Pitcher Morton Cooper gaining his 17th triumph of the campaign.

Elwin (Preacher) Roe gave Philadelphia two runs in the first inning, then settled down to pitch a 5 to 3 victory for the Pittsburgh Pirates.

The Brooklyn Dodgers, with Manager Leo Durocher sitting out the game in a box near their dugout, defeated the Cincinnati Reds 3 to 2. Durocher, suspended five days for a run-in with umpires yesterday, appeared to be directing the team from the box.

Nate Andrews, beaten in the opening game of the series against Chicago, came back to pitch the Boston Braves to a 4 to 2 victory over the Cubs today.

ODT RESTRICTIONS ON WORLD SERIES GAMES EXPECTED

Only St. Louis Fans May See Contests; Reservations Pour In.

New York, Aug. 19.—(U.P.)—Sports pipelines and grapevines hinted tonight that the impending all-St. Louis world series may be witnessed by an all-St. Louis crowd.

Officials of the Office of Defense Transportation, distressed over the hundreds of advance reservations being made for trains and planes to St. Louis for the first week in October, reportedly are ready to take steps to prevent any but bona-fide business and emergency personal trips.

At Washington, a spokesman said the ODT may ask officials of the teams to see that only bona-fide area residents attend the series. He stressed, however, that the ODT would not issue orders to anyone not to travel, but merely to suggest that they did not.

The restrictions would be similar to those made for the Kentucky Derby and the Army-Navy football games during the past two years, thus relieving the strain on transcontinental railroad coaches and Pullmans, already abuzz with passengers.

The ODT at first considered it a pleasant coincidence that the fall baseball classic was likely to be played in a single city, thus eliminating the necessity of a trip between games.

However, during the past week, when the Browns maintained their comfortable lead in the American league, there were sales of requests for world series tickets in every delivery of mail to the Cardinal and Brown offices. Neither Sam Breadon, the Cardinal president, nor Donald Barnes, head of the Browns, filled any of the requests, stating that they could not act until the pennant races were settled and until they had met with Baseball Commissioner Judge Kenesaw M. Landis to set ticket prices.

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NELSON GOES TO FINALS WITH 8-7 WIN AT SPOKANE

Hamilton of Indiana Will Meet Winner in PGA—Finals Today.

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 19.—(U.P.)—Bob Hamilton, husky 28-year-old golfer from Evansville, Ind., joined Byron Nelson in the finals of the 26th PGA tournament at Manito club tonight, defeating George Schneider of Salt Lake City, 1 up.

In an earlier match, Nelson advanced by beating Chuck Congdon of Tacoma, Wash., 8 and 7.

Four thousand fans, many of whom had watched Nelson, the tournament medalist, defeat Congdon unmercifully earlier in the day, saw the plucky Schneider courageously carry the match to the final green where he came within a grass blade of tying the contest.

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 19.—(U.P.)—Byron Nelson, medalist, advanced to the finals of the 26th National Professional Golfers Association tournament tonight with an 8 and 7 victory over Chuck Congdon of Tacoma, Wash.

Nelson, tall Texan now of Toledo, O., shot a sparkling 67 this morning and started the afternoon round 7 up. He went 8 up on the 19th with a par four when Congdon missed the green with his second shot and required two putts for a five.

They halved the next three holes with par shared the 23rd with fives, one over par, and halved the 24th with par fours.

Congdon, playing in his first PGA tournament, won his only hole of the afternoon on the 412-yard 25th hole where both golfers were short of the green with their second shots. Congdon approached for a one-putt and a par four while Nelson required two putts for a score of five.

Nelson made it 8 up again on the 26th, a 55-yard hole, where he fired a birdie four. They halved the 27th in fours, Nelson making the turn with a medal score of 37, his first over-par card of the week, to Congdon's 38. Both birdied the 28th with fours, and Nelson coasted to victory on the 29th when he matched Congdon's par three.

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MISS ZIMMERMAN LOSES TITLE TO MIDWEST MERMAID

Kansas City, Mo., Aug. 19.—(U.P.)—The Indianapolis Riviera Athletic club's defending 800-meter relay team retained its title handily tonight, in the opening event on the second night's program in the women's senior national AAU swimming and diving championships, being held in the Swope Park pool.

The Riviera team was clocked in at 10:52.2, far slower than the unofficial world, American and NAAU championship time of 10:30.7 the same quartet of swim queens turned in in 1941.

Joan Fogle returned to the pool in the 100-meter backstroke event to give her team another first and to oust a defending titlist, Joan negotiated the distance in 1:20.2 to beat Suzanne Zimmerman, Multnomah club, the titleholder. Suzanne was second, with Marie Corridon of the Women's Swimming association of New York third and Barbara Gesen, unattached, Colma, Cal., fourth.

It was the second title of the tournament for the Indianapolis swimmer. Last night she defended her honors in the 300-meter individual medley.

Ann Curtis, the beautiful 18-year-old from San Francisco, racked up two victories last night by outdistancing her opponents in the 100-meter and 1500-meter free style events. She barely nosed out Brenda Helser of Portland's Multnomah club in the 100-meter race, however, when the Oregon star put on a drive that brought her up into the spray from Miss Curtis' flying feet at the finish.

The Multnomah club, with a strong aggregation including Miss Helser, Suzanne Zimmerman, Nancy Merki and Mary Ann Hanson, came up in third place with eight points after last night's program.

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GERMAN COLLAPSE TO HIT WORKERS

San Francisco, Aug. 19.—(U.P.)—Alfred P. Sloan, president of General Motors Corp., today predicted that the automobile industry would lay off large numbers of workers immediately following the cancellation of war contracts.

He said that this unemployment would probably begin with the collapse of Germany and continue during the period required for reconversion of war industries to production of consumer goods.

General Motors Corp. will be able to accomplish this reconversion within six months after its war contracts are cancelled, if the government gives the corporation use of government-built war plants, Sloan said.

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
