D.A.R. Announces Library Building Is Newest Project

Plans for the construction of permanent libraries at selected government hospitals throughout the country were announced this week by the national society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the announcement being made in Oregon by the state regent, Mrs. Bert B. Lowry, Medford. Twelve of the libraries are contemplated and funds for six are already on hand in the society's war service fund, according to Mrs. Julius Y. The building will conform to the architecture of each local hospital and will consist of two large reading rooms, space for the librarian and a small reception hall. The Daughters will continue to give blood for plasma use. Mrs. Lowry states, this being a continuing project of the group as long as it is needed. Other projects are in the formative stage and will be announced before long by state and national officers.
