## CURRY LAMBS TO GET CONCESSION

Coquille, Ore., Aug. 10.—(UP)—Movement of lambs from Coos and Curry counties has been slowed by transportation difficulties but the Coos County Livestock Shippers association will still continue service, County Agent George Jenkins announced today.

The state highway ruling no longer permits the use of the Coast highway by over-length trucks and trailers without flagmen. Ervin L. Peterson, state director of agriculture, recently announced.

Jenkins has assured stockmen of the regular use of two trucks for transporting the livestock and said that others may be arranged for later. To comply with the highway regulations flagmen will go in advance of each truck to warn approaching traffic of the long trucks and trailers.
