NELSON, HURLEY TO VISIT CHINA ON SPECIAL MISSION

Washington, Aug. 19—(UPI)—War Production Chief Donald M. Nelson has been directed by President Roosevelt to undertake a special mission to China, the White House announced tonight leaving his chief aide, Charles E. Wilson, in command of the nation's armament program during one of its most crucial periods.

Nelson will be accompanied by Maj. Gen. Patrick J. Hurley, secretary of war under President Hoover, who has carried out numerous personal assignments in far corners of the globe for Mr. Roosevelt during the last two and a half years.

WPB Executive Vice Chairman Wilson, husky, amiable president of the General Electric company, was called to the White House shortly before announcement of the Nelson-Hurley mission. He told reporters he was directed by the president to "turn the heat on" for speed-up output of vitally needed war materials, particularly heavy artillery, heavy trucks and radar.

Wilson has a capacity for getting on well with the military, which has a number of clashes with Nelson. Nelson recently went over the heads of army materiel officials and asked the joint chiefs of staff to re-examine the whole supply situation after the army had challenged validity of a WPB report which held that it had ample supplies in many military items. Nelson agreed with the army, however, that there were specific deficiencies which needed to be made up rapidly.

HEIRESS TO WED FOR THIRD TIME

San Francisco, Aug. 19—(UPI)—The third marriage for Mrs. Muriel Vanderbilt Phelps, heiress to two of America's greatest fortunes, will be on Aug. 29, it was revealed today.

Mrs. Phelps will wed Lt. Comdr. John Payson Adams, USNR, on that date. Adams has just returned from serving two years of service with the 2nd Marine division. He is a graduate of Stanford and McGill universities.

Mrs. Phelps is the granddaughter of William K. Vanderbilt, Sr. and is reportedly one of the nation's wealthiest women. Her maternal grandfather was James Fair, former U. S. senator from California, the "banana king" of Virginia City, Nev.

BOSTONS ATTACK JAPS NEAR SARINI

Allied Headquarters, Southwest Pacific, Aug. 20—(UPI)—A strong force of Bostons bombed and strafed remaining Japanese positions around Oran River Delta near Sarini on Dutch Guinea Friday as other allied airmen maintained light contact activity throughout the southwest Pacific, Gen. MacArthur announced today.

Night air patrols jabbed lightly at the enemy in the Philippine and Halmahera regions.

Friday after nearly two weeks of intensified aerial blows.

Beaumont and Alcobras, continuing their harassment of enemy shipping, destroyed or seriously damaged 14 Japanese barges near Manokwari, former capital of Dutch New Guinea, the communiqué reported. The last major strike in the Manokwari area was on Aug. 14 when Liberators delivered 60 tons of bombs on Japanese installations there.

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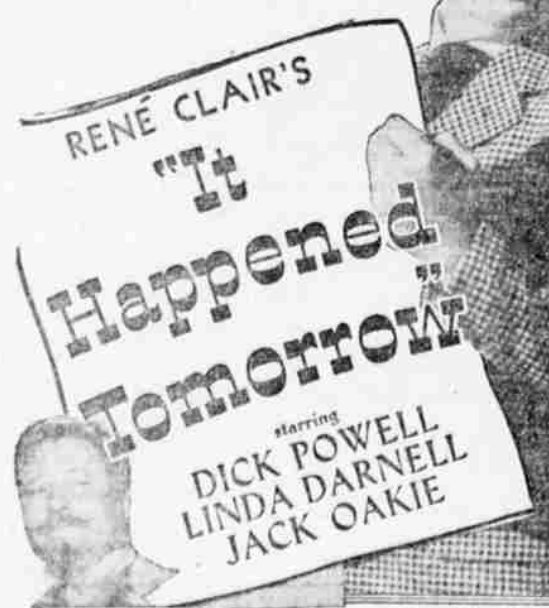
