BROWNIES BREAK
LOSS STREAK BY
EDGING SENATORS

Gutteridge's 12-Inning Homer Accounts for 5-3 Win; Yanks Whip Tigers.

New York, Aug. 22.—(U.P.)—The "one-day wonder" of the baseball season—the story that the St. Louis Browns were "washed up"—was "washed out" today.

The Browns did the "laundrying" themselves at Washington last night by pulling a hard, 12-inning game out of the fire from the pesky last-place Washington Senators after coming from behind twice to tie the score in the regulation distance.

Flaunting the stubbornness that has featured their plodding progress toward their first American league pennant, the Browns—Missouri mules of baseball—snapped their longest losing streak of the year at four games when Don Gutteridge hit a two-run homer in the third overtime inning to produce a 5-3 victory. The little second baseman, who collected three hits in six appearances, picked a three and two pitch from Mickey Haefner for his first homer of the season to end the ball game.

Boston was stubborn, too, the Cleveland Indians needing 13 innings to eke out a 7-6 win. Home runs featured the contest, Mickey Rocco's being the payoff blow in the 13th.

At New York, the Yankees, with home runs by Herschel Martin and Russ Derry, stopped the pressing Detroit Tigers, 5-1.

Athletics Cop
The Philadelphia Athletics defeated the Chicago White Sox, 3-2, in the circuit's third extra-inning game. Frankie Hayes' single with the bases loaded in the 10th provided the A's with the victory.

In the National league the New York Giants extended their winning "streak" to two games by downing the Chicago Cubs, 4-3, largely through the batting efforts of Catcher Ernie Lombardi, who drove in all of the New York tallies with two homers and a single.

The Brooklyn Dodgers' July losing streak was officially extended to 16 games when the Pittsburgh Pirates defeated them 9-7 in the completion of a game suspended after eight innings on July 9. Adding insult to injury, the Pirates also copped the regularly scheduled

game, 7-6, in 10 innings. Boston at St. Louis, the only other National league game scheduled, was rained out.

Youthful Ed Furgol Fires
Brilliant 67 In O'Shanter

Chicago, Aug. 22.—(U.P.)—Golfdom's topsy-turvy tripleheader, the three-in-one All-American tournament, was still in the preliminaries today as amateurs and women golfers played 18-hole qualifying rounds over the Tam O'Shanter fairways, still warm from the blistering five-under-par 67 shot by 24-year-old Ed Furgol, a Detroit amateur, yesterday.

The three-play tournament—composed of an amateur, a women's open and a men's open—began yesterday as 250 amateurs completed 18-hole qualifying rounds highlighted by the remarkably near-record score of Furgol, whose left arm is 10 inches shorter than his right and whose left elbow is permanently stiffened as the result of an accident 12 years ago.

Played in the carnival atmosphere of brightly colored tents, pennants, and soda vendors, the All-American was a two-round show today as some 42 women sought 17 places in the championship flight of their open, and 134 amateurs—the overflow from an original 384 entrants—tried for near-par scores in order to qualify for the amateur.

The women's championship finals contains 24 posts, but the available spots have been pared because of the automatic qualification of Patty Berg, 1943 champion; Betty Hicks, last year's runnerup; Catherine Fox, Mary Agnes Wall; Kay Byrne, Jeanne Cline and Dorothy Germain.

The third ring starts tomorrow when about 200 professionals play 18-hole rounds for berths in the All-American open, where Harold (Jug) McSpaden, defending tillist, and Bob Hamilton, the new champion of the Professional Golfers' association, will be very much in evidence.

Yesterday's huge amateur field made a strong move toward monopolizing the available 22 places in the championship amateur flight by turning in numerous border-par scores. Twenty-four finalists will be admitted but Dale Morey, defending amateur king, and Chick Evans, former national amateur tillist, are automatically guaranteed berths by virtue of their records. Bob Cochran, St. Louis, 1943 runner-up, also was an exempted entrant but was unable to attend.

ARMSTRONG WINS
CLOSE DECISION
OVER WILL JOYCE

San Francisco, Aug. 22.—(U.P.)—Perpetual Henry Armstrong, the former triple champion, evened his comeback series with Willie Joyce, the Gary, Ind., boxer, at two-all last night, "clubbing his way with one good hand to a close ten-round decision before a capacity house of 10,000 at Civic auditorium.

Armstrong's once-dangerous right, injured in a draw bout with Slugger White at Hollywood last month, was virtually useless after the third round, he admitted after taking Referee Frankie Brown's decision, 56½ points to 53½.

But his left was good enough to upset 2-1 odds and win his 14th fight in 17 starts this year in his second comeback try, even though the verdict surprised the crowd and ringsiders who thought Joyce had won five rounds and split a sixth.

The two Negro lightweights divided decisions in two Los Angeles fights last year, and Joyce took a disputed decision at Chicago earlier this summer. Last night's win put the 31-year-old Hammerin' Henry all even with 25-year-old Joyce and probably set the stage for a fifth and rubber match.

Armstrong assured reporters after the fight that his right was "all right" and said he would be in shape for his next bout with Tippy Larkin at Madison Square Garden September 22.

There were no knockdowns, although the aging but powerful Henry tried hard for one with his right in the first, before it was injured, and uncorked a beautiful right to the jaw and a wicked left hook in the fifth that had Joyce in trouble.

PAUL BROWN NEW
TRAINING COACH

Great Lakes, Ill., Aug. 22.—(U.P.)—Lt. (jg) Paul E. Brown, former head football coach at Ohio State University, has been named head football coach at the United States naval training center, it was announced last night by Capt. Robert R. M. E. met, commandant.

SAVE YOUR PAPER
FOR COMING DRIVE
IS SALVAGE PLEA

"Start saving paper now, if you haven't done so already," says Wayne Jamison, chairman of county salvage operations, who reported yesterday that plans were rapidly progressing for the next waste paper drive. A central collection depot will be announced soon and as soon as preparations can be completed, citizens may take their collections of paper to the building.

Instructions for preparing the paper are as follows: Flatten card board boxes or cartons and tie in bundles about 12 inches high; tie magazines and books in bundles about 18 inches high, lay newspapers flat and tie in bundles 12 inches high; put waste basket paper, such as old envelopes or wrappers, in cartons or boxes and pack down tightly to conserve space. It is pointed out that the waste basket paper is the least desirable of the salvaged paper since it usually occupies much more space than other types, in shipping, unless baled.
