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THE OLD TRADITIONS DIE HARD

Boy injured in a basketball game had remained partly disabled or crippled for many months. I gather from his father's letter. Three years ago the boy developed rheumatic fever. This the father seems to attribute to the old injury. If the diagnosis is correct, the rheumatic fever is an infectious disease, that is, not contagious or communicable but caused by germs, and the germs (usually a strain of the well known Streptococcus related to if not identical with the strain that causes septic sore throat, scarlet fever, sometimes acute tonsillitis or quinsy. If rheumatic fever was coming to the boy it was coming regardless of whether the boy had ever suffered any injury.

A year ago the boy had acute appendicitis, was operated on. A few days after the operation he suffered a recurrence of the same joint condition as he had had three years ago. But this time the joint inflammation was gone by the time the boy left the hospital.

Now the boy's father thinks it is certain that rheumatic fever manifests itself only when the body has been subjected to some weakening experience. "By this I do not mean simple exposure, change of temperature or that sort of thing," explains the father. "Instead I refer to that weakening process a body experiences from any severe shock, illness or injury."

You see the boy's father is bound and determined to convince me that lowered resistance is a contributing cause of illness. He doesn't use the words "lowered resistance" but instead the words "that weakening process."

90,000 BANDAGES SHIPPED OUT BY RED CROSS HERE

Ninety thousand surgical dressings, 10 huge cartons, left the work rooms of the production department of Jackson county Red Cross Tuesday for shipment to overseas hospital bases. The last two weeks in August are the home stretch in the race of Jackson county women to finish the 210,000 quota by September 1. "There is no let-up in the dogged determination of these splendid and hardworking women to accomplish their goal, regardless of the demands of the fruit season," a chapter spokesman said.

Sixteen thousand dressings are left to be finished in six working days. Business men and women are asked to please note that there are six evening sessions in Medford on Tuesday and Thursday nights and two in Ashland on Friday nights, before the end of the month.

Every woman, who has ever made surgical dressings, is asked by Mrs. Gus Newbury, chairman to come out and help finish up the job on schedule time.

Three Killed in Filming Aerial Combat Picture

Luke Field, Ariz., Aug. 23.—(U.P.)—Search crews today had located the burned bodies of three men killed when their B-25 bomber collided in mid-air with an AT-6 training plane during filming of scenes for "God Is My Co-pilot."

Sgt. James A. Ramsey, 23, Pittsburgh, Kas.

Previously announced as dead was 2nd Lt. Orland L. Lühr, 22, Clayton, Wash., pilot of the AT-6.

The accident resulted when the AT-6, camouflaged as a Japanese Zero, failed to clear the bomber as the "Zero" came up beneath a bomber formation after a diving approach from the opposite side.

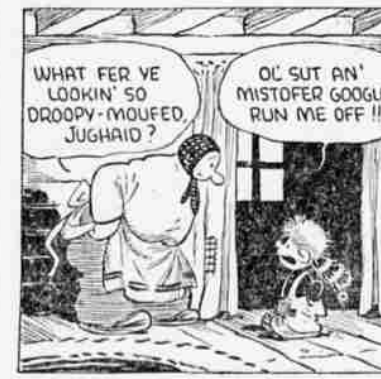
