Submit Slips For Dairy Feed Subsidy

Last date on which Dairy Feed Subsidy payments for May and June sales of milk and cream will be August 31, 1944. Any dairymen who have not collected their subsidy payments for May and June should submit their sales slips to the AAA office, third floor courthouse, before August 31.

The dairy feed subsidy payments for sales during July and August will be payable after September 1.

No Slaughter Limits Says Government

Continued questions from the farmers and others regarding the present cattle slaughter regulations have brought

forth a condensed statement from the War Food Administration emphasizing that there is now no limit on the number of cattle that may be slaughtered either by a farmer or anyone else. Any farmer may slaughter and deliver the meat from any number of livestock owned by him without license or permit and without making a report to the federal government.

Slaughterers must, however, comply with OPA regulations regarding grading of meat and the collection of ration points. Unless meat is graded by an official grader of the USDA, the slaughterer must sell it at least 12½ cents per hundred pounds less than the ceiling price for the appropriate grade.

When a government grader is not available, a request can be filed for exemption by a small slaughterer and he may be permitted to grade his own meat but he must take the same deduction.

Any person other than a farmer slaughtering his own livestock must have a license in order legally to slaughter, but there are no restrictions on the number of livestock that he may slaughter.

Peach Spray Dope Is Expected Soon

Peach growers who have tried to buy paradichlorobenzene and found their dealer's supply exhausted should try again in about ten days. This material has been very short, but a shipment is expected soon at Portland. This delay is unfortunate as it will arrive right during peach harvest. Every effort should be made to apply the treatment as soon as the material is available because its efficiency is greatly reduced as the soil temperature is lowered.

CITRUS BROKERS UPHELD IN OPA DAMAGE SUITS

Los Angeles, Aug. 24—(U.P.)—Office of Price Administration suits against the California Fruit Growers' Exchange and the Mutual Orange Distributors asking \$2,576,202 in treble damages for asserted violation of price ceilings were dismissed today by Federal Judge Paul J. McCormick.

The suits were dismissed after OPA regional authorities in San Francisco had ruled that brokerage charges, on which the asserted overcharges were based, were legal.

The original complaints were filed last January and named as defendants the California Fruit Growers' Exchange, 25 district exchange corporations and 25 unincorporated associations in California and Arizona.

The amounts asked represented treble damages for alleged sale of citrus fruit throughout the country for which a brokerage fee had been charged. The brokerage fee amounted to one and one-half per cent mark up over the packers' ceiling price, the OPA asserted.

Olive Barber's Observations

The following excerpts are from logger-talk.

It ain't any particular honor to be the wife of some of us guys and most of our women have some other talent than just being a wife. It was all right for King Solomon to introduce his concubines as his charming property, though from what I hear he wouldn't even go that far, but our wives don't have exactly that standing. "My goodness! I give you my word, this a direct quotation from a feller. These are not words I've put in his mouth on paper. But after all, we didn't give ourselves the right to vote; our men gave it to us; chaps like the one from whom I've just quoted."

Said another less progressive, "Oh, women don't want to work. It's job enough for them to stay home and have kids." To this inelegant statement, the other replied, "What's the matter with combining jobs and kids! That is, if a woman wants to. Now in Russia (and how often I hear references to this country from working men now that to do so no longer endangers their job) in Russia if a woman wants both a job and a kid, she works as long as she can, lays off when she has to, then goes back, takes the kid with her, puts it in the nursery maintained right in the factory and when she takes time off to nurse it, her pay goes on just the same.

"If a woman wants to work before the baby comes, it don't hurt her. My dad used to work his brood mares right up to foaling time; said it kept 'em limber."
