BULLA FIRES 65
FOR THREE-SWING
LEAD IN TOURNEY

Ties Course Record In All-American Open; Byron Nelson Scored at 68.

Chicago, Aug. 25.—(U.P.)—The 18th green at Tam O'Shanter was a revered spot today as high-flying Johnny Bulla, the commercial airplane pilot from Atlanta, Ga., led the nation's best professionals through their second 18 holes of medal play for the all-American open golf championship.

The large, rolling green—the end of a tough, par-72 course—was the scene of some of the greatest putting of the season yesterday. It was there that Bulla sank a curving 15-foot birdie putt to tie the course record of 65 and take a three-stroke lead with 64 holes to go.

A short time later, Byron Nelson, co-holder of the course record, rapped in a 37-foot putt to give him a 68 and No. 2 position in today's play for the first prize of \$13,642 in war bonds.

Then Cpl. Buck White, runner-up in last year's all-American open, came in to fire a 35-foot putt that rolled back and forth over the sloping green. It dropped to keep the soldier in the running with a 72.

Late in the day, Bill Gordon, Tam O'Shanter professional, finished off a futile 78 by holing out a 50-foot putt from off the green, a feat which few people present had ever seen.

Great Finish
But of all the lengthy shots, nothing will be better remembered than the one that Bulla confidently sank to tie the course record set by Leonard Dodson of Kansas City in 1942 and matched Nelson and Johnny Revolta. It climaxed one of the greatest back-nine finishes seen in golf.

One under par with a 35 at the turn, the Georgia pro shot a birdie on the 460-yard tenth and added a par on the 11th. Playing with Cpl. Chlek Harbert, Battle Creek, Mich., who shot a 69, Bulla then gave a rare golfing exhibition as he fired four straight birdies over the course's toughest stretch. He added two pars, and finished his round with his sensational putt—for a birdie on the par-4 18th.

In addition to Bulla and Nelson, other favored golfers today were the 69 shooters of yesterday, Gene Sarazen, the Connecticut squire who has moved his farming operations to New York; Bud Lewis, Philadelphia; Pete Cooper, Gainesville, Fla., and Harbert.

Of golf's famous money-winning quartet of Sam Byrd, Craig Wood, Nelson and Harold (Jug) McSpaden, only Jug and Nelson were in good positions. McSpaden, the top money winner of the year, was six strokes behind Bulla with a 71.

6 TENNIS STARS
IN ROUND OF 8

Southampton, N. Y., Aug. 25.—(U.P.)—Players expected to fight it out for the national tennis title at Forest Hills, N. Y. next week were scheduled to begin play today in the "blue ribbon" quarter finals of the championship competition for the Meadow club title.

Six players, nationally ranked, qualified automatically for the round-of-eight, joining Jack Jossi of Oakland, Cal., and Charles Oliver of Perth Amboy, N. J., survivors of the qualifying competition.

In today's matches, top seeded Francisco Segura of Guyaquil, Ecuador and Miami, Fla., opposes the veteran Sidney B. Wood, Jr., of New York; Lt. Don McNeill of the naval air station at Norfolk, Va., meets Jossie; Lt. Seymour Greenberg of the army air forces plays Armando Vega, top ranking Mexican player; and Billy Talbert of Indianapolis is matched against Oliver.

TOOLMAKER LEADS
VANDALIA FIELD

Vandalia, O., Aug. 25.—(U.P.)—Defending Champion Jasper Rogers, 37-year-old Dayton, O., toolmaker, led a field of approximately 1,000 gunners into the \$50,000 handicap finale, highlight of the annual Grand American trapshooting tournament today.

The big entry list of shot-gun marksmen, all of whom are furnishing their own shells, was out for first prize of at least \$2,500.

The standpoint of yesterday's competition was F. E. Shaw, 72-year-old veteran from Joliet, Ill., who won the Grand American preliminary title with 96 hits out of 100 for 20 yards distance.

Mrs. Ruth Knuth of Indianapolis won the North American Women's Clay Pigeon Target championship by breaking 183 out of 200.

CREIGHTON MILLER
PLAYS LAST GAME

Two-hit pitching by Southpaw Ray Prim and a four run spurge topped by Eddie Fernandez' home run gave Los Angeles a 4-1 win over Hollywood last night, opening up the Angels' Pacific Coast league lead to eight full games.

San Francisco topped Oakland 5-3, while Sacramento nosed but Portland 2-1. Seattle made it three straight over San Diego's cellar occupants, 12-4.

Prim notched his 19th win of the year, letting Ken Richardson and Ted Davis hit consecutive doubles in the fifth for the only twink batting of the night. Five hits off Joe Mishasek, climaxed by Fernandez' homer, netted the Angels their four tallies in the fourth after two were out, to give them a 3-1 lead.

Sacramento took a 2-1 series edge over the third place Portland Beavers, scoring two runs in the fifth on a double by Jim Steiner and singles by Ralph Watson and Forest Rogers to overcome Spence Harris' home run for the Beavers. Steve Legault bested Marino Pieretti on the mound.

Seattle Catcher Hal Spindel batted in seven runs and scored twice himself to lead the Rainiers to a 12-4 win over San Diego behind the six-hit pitching of Johnny Babich. Spindel cleaned the bases in both the first and second innings with two terrific triples to send Frankie Dasso down to defeat.

Los Angeles, Aug. 25.—(U.P.)—The Washington Redskins today were installed 1 to 2 favorites over the March Field Army All-Stars in their football clash tonight at the Memorial Coliseum.

Broken down, that means Singler Sammy Daugh has been picked to outshine the combined efforts of Indian Jack Jacobs, no passing slouch himself; All-American Bill Dudley and Messrs. Bob Kennedy, Bob DeFruiter and company.

In addition to being the top or one of the top men in passing in the National league since his entry into pro football, almost eight years ago, Daugh, the Sweetwater, Tex., rancher, holds the National league record for pass interceptions and has been punting champion for six years in a row.

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Revenge-Bent Tigers Open
Crucial Set With Brownies

New York, Aug. 25.—(U.P.)—Paul (Dizzy) Trout and Lefty Hal Newhouser, top winning pitchers in the major leagues, led a revenge-bent Detroit Tiger team into the vital series with the St. Louis Browns today, seeking to square accounts with the club that has treated them like bush-league bumpkins.

The Tigers might at this moment be leading the league, instead of languishing in fourth place six games off the pace, had they not encountered the equivalent of a minor disaster every time they met the Browns. Reasonably successful against every other club Detroit has won only three games while dropping 11 to St. Louis, with their aces Trout and Newhouser responsible for five of the defeats.

Trout has dropped three games while winning only once against the Browns, who have accounted for a third of his nine defeats. His only victory was acquired in a four-inning relief chore. Newhouser has won two and lost two and hasn't been particularly impressive against them in any lead.

In favor of the Tigers is the fact that the pressure will be on the Browns, who dropped six of their last eight games to the last place Washington Senators and the sixth place Philadelphia A's. Although still maintain a four-and-a-half game margin, they probably will have to win to hold it since the second place Boston Red Sox will be playing at Philadelphia and the third place New York Yankees will be meeting the usually listless Senators at Washington.

Manager Steve O'Neill of the Tigers indicated he would start Trout, while Luke Sewell, the Brownie pilot probably will go with his top flinger, Bob Muncriff, who holds two victories and no defeats against the Tigers. Sewell also is almost certain to use Sigmund Jakucki, his 32-year-old "rookie," who has two successive shutouts over the Tigers and three victories without a loss against them.

The St. Louis Cardinals rolling on relentlessly defeated the Chicago Cubs 2 to 1 last night on the three-hit pitching of Rookie Ted Wilks, who gained his 10th straight triumph. Wilks, who became a regular starter in July when George Mauer left for the army, has pitched 10 complete games out of 11 since that time. Last night's victory was his 13th against one defeat, putting him far in front as the league's leading pitcher.

Great Lakes, Ill., Aug. 25.—(U.P.)—The three-day A.A.U. national men's outdoor swimming and diving tournament opens today in the big indoor swimming tank at the Great Lakes Naval Training center, with 80 swimmers enrolled in 12 championship events.

HOW TO GET NEW
"A" GAS RATION
TOLD BY BOARD

Instructions to persons making application on "A" gasoline ration renewals were issued today by the war price and ration board. It was stated that the forms, R-534, are now available at service stations and at the ration board office.

Applicants were urged to read the instruction on the renewal form carefully and to fill out the form completely, except for the heavy-lined spaces where there are specific instructions not to write. If the form is not filled out in full, it will be returned to the applicant for completion. When the form is filled out, attach the back cover of the holder's present "A" book, or the entire cover if there are no stamps left in it. Mail application, together with the cover, to the board at the city hall in Medford if the applicant lives under the jurisdiction of the Medford board.

If Cover Lost
If the applicant has lost the cover of the "A" book, he should submit the application with proof that he has a car entitling him to an "A" ration, that the car is currently registered and in use, that he has not received a renewed "A" book from another board and that he has no application in at another board.

It was stated that the tire inspection record is not required, since this has been superseded by a mileage rationing record.

STRIKE TIES UP
PLANE FACTORY
Detroit, Aug. 25.—(U.P.)—Production of Pratt & Whitney airplane engines was halted at the Ford Motor company's Highland Park plant today when 2,800 members of the United Automobile Workers Union (UAW) walked off the job in protest of pay classifications and lay-off procedure.

William Oliver, UAW-CIO Local 400 secretary, said that

"although the grievances are justified" union leaders were attempting to persuade workers to return to their jobs.

Oliver charged that the management refused to negotiate grievances with union representatives and contended the complaints should be handled individually.
