V-DAY SERVICE IS MINISTERS' PLAN FOR COMMUNITY

Religious services for the entire community will be held in the Nazarene church, Holly at First street, at 7:30 p. m., on "V-day," under auspices of the Medford Ministerial association. It was announced today by the Rev. Harry Hansen.

At a special meeting of the association held Tuesday, a committee was appointed to arrange a program for the expected forthcoming "Victory Day," when the Allies attain unconditional surrender from Germany. Rev. Hansen said all the services will be held when Germany capitulates, assuming that the war in the Pacific will extend longer. Members of the committee are Rev. Harry Hansen, Rev. Fred Weatherford, Rev. Milo Ross and Rev. Ward Rice.
Rev. Hansen states that it is the feeling of the Ministerial association that "the community would wish to have a service at this time to express our corporate gratitude to God, just as we gathered to seek his help on invasion day." The entire community is invited to participate in the "V-day" services.

He also attended the University of Oregon and Willamette university. He was pastor of the Court Street Christian church in Salem for four years and pastor of the First Christian church of Tillamook for five years. For the past two years he has served the church at Tipton, a church of 750 members, while taking graduate work in Butler university, Indiana. He has completed all of his resident work for a B.D. degree which represents seven full years of college work.

A spokesman for the local church said the congregation feels fortunate in securing a person as pastor with the qualifications possessed by Mr. Daniels. Mrs. Daniels is especially trained in music and is an accomplished soloist and pianist. They have two children, a daughter, seven and a son, five.

Mr. and Mrs. Rice and family are moving to Eugene where he is to be a member of the faculty of Northwest Christian college. He will teach in the department of practical theology. During the year that has elapsed since they came to Medford 77 persons have been added to the church roll and there has been an increase in attendance and interest in all phases of church activity.

CRAFT LAMPOONS ADS WHICH GUSH OVER SERVICEMEN

A recent advertisement in the Saturday Evening Post, in which a copy-writer produced a simulated letter from a soldier to his mother on what he was fighting for, was the basis for a satirical editorial in Le Tomahawk, mimeographed news bulletin published in Normandy by Lt. Col. Roy D. Craft, former public relations officer for the Medford CCC district and well known here.

The ad, in part, said: "Dearest Mom: So old Bess has pups again! That reminds me of so much. She had her last litter two years ago—just about this time of year—when everything was so fresh and new. That's what I want to get back to, Mom—what all of us are fighting to get back to—the world at home where a fellow can give the sort of welcome he ought to give to a litter of setter pups in the spring. To watch them grow up with all the other new, young things in a world that's bright and free..."

Soldiers Grow Men
To which, in his editorial, Col. Craft replied, in part: "We think it's high time the copy-writers learn this war is being fought by grown men. We are soldiers and good ones, and we are fighting because our country is at war and for reasons which grown men understand."

"We get pretty fed up with the sticky ads that begin 'Dear Mom' and end that, Mom, is what I am fighting for—the corner drugstore with its double-extra - special - thick chocolate malteds."

"But since the public seems to think that soldiers are simple asses, drooling slush in the face of machine-gun fire, we offer the following uncopyrighted 'Dear Mom' letters from the front: 'Dear Mom: Well, here we are in Normandy. I saw a cute little piggy-wiggly, Mom, and gracious, was he cute. That's what I'm fighting for, Mom, little piggy-wiggles and little ducky-wuckies and little lambie-wambies and oh, just oodles of young, free things to brighten a brave, new world. Your loving son, Joe.'"

Col. Craft wrote two other "letters" in his editorial, strictly for GI consumption and not of a character to be reprinted in a civilian newspaper, and both ridiculed the advertisement as only Craft could do.

ILLINOIS FELON YIELDS CLUE IN MURDER MYSTERY

Chicago, Aug. 25.—(U.P.)—A Stateville penitentiary convict's story that he may have given a Chicago policeman the revolver used in the Drake hotel slaying of Mrs. Adele Born Williams, wife of a Washington diplomat, last January 19 sent Chicago police to Bloomington, Ill., today to search for some bullets fired from the gun 11 years ago.

The gun used in the slaying was a hammerless Iver-Johnson model and was identified by Walter Brown, a life-term convict, last night when questioned at the penitentiary by First Assistant State's Attorney Wilbert F. Crowley, Detective Chief Walter Storms, and Lt. Phil Breitke of the homicide squad.

Brown, who is serving a life term for murder, is a friend of Policeman Adolph A. Valanis, a brother of Mrs. Ellen Valanis Bennett, 41, key clerk at the Drake hotel at the time Mrs. Williams was slain.

According to Crowley, Brown said he visited Valanis in Chicago in 1933 and gave him a .25 caliber automatic pistol. He had four other guns with him at the time, he said and left two of them in a desk at the Valanis home. Valanis, however, denied that any guns were left there.

Brown said he was not sure if one of the guns was the weapon used in the slaying. He said the gun was stolen from a drug store at Bloomington early in 1933. Shortly after, the convict said he was given the gun by a friend and he fired some bullets into the ground to see if it worked.

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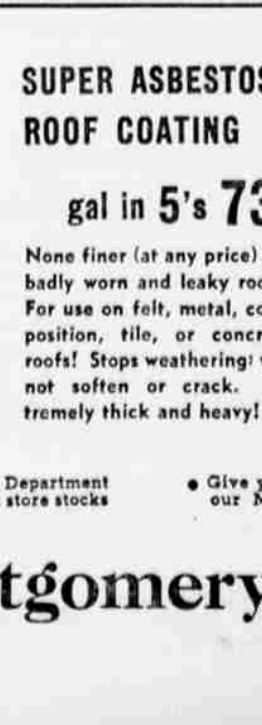
